

Coolidge, in the living room of the latter's home here.

President Coolidge issued the following statement early today: "Reports have reached me, which I fear are correct, that President Harding is gone. The world has lost a great and good man. I mourn his loss. He was my chief and my friend.

"It will be my purpose to carry out the policies which he has begun for the service of the American people and for meeting the responsibilities whereever they may arise. For this purpose I shall seek the co-operation of all those who have been associated with the president during his term of office. 
