## WECHES DISTRICT MAY VOTE BONDS

Word comes from Weches that there is talk of organizing a road district in the Weches section and issuing bonds for the construction of that section of the San Antonio road. It is believed by some that the time is now ripe for such a movement, inasmuch as both state and federal aid can now be secured for that section of the San Antonio highway. The old San Antonio road has the distinction of being the first highway in Texas to receive both state and federal designation as a national and state highway. On account of its historic interest, the Texas legislature a few years ago made an appropriation to place granite markers along its boundaries, and the markers have been placed from the Louisiana line to San Antonio. A highway has been constructed from the Louisiana line through San Augustine, Nacogdoches and Cherokee counties to the east boundary of the Houston county line near Weches. Both state and federal aid was secured for the road through those counties largely on account of the historic interest centering on the road. State and federal aid can now be secured for the road through the Weches district if the Weches district will supplement this aid with a bond issue. On account of the state taking over the maintenance of the highways January 1, 1924, it may not be possible to secure this aid after that time. Therefore it is believed by some of the citizens of the Weches section that the time is now ripe for the organization of a road district and the issuance of bonds in an amount sufficient to supplement state and federal appropriations which can only be secured by the issuance of bonds.

### Paving Progress.

The concrete base is being laid on two blocks of Main street east of the square and the two intersecting blocks on Washington street. Two blocks of Public avenue east of the square and an intersecting block of Washington street have been finished with the sand, brick and topping, and are now in constant use. Court House square will be next to be fine-graded for the concrete.

### More Paving Ordered.

The city council Monday night, acting on the petition of citizens residing on those streets, ordered the paving of Public avenue and Main street through the residence district of east Crockett. This paving will begin at the Baptist and Methodist churches and extend almost to the city limits. We hear of other short stretches of street that may possibly be paved.

## APPROPRIATION FOR CROCKETT ROAD

The state highway commission has appropriated \$7,250 for the improvement of the San Antonio road as it enters west Crockett. That section of this road extending from the city's pavement east of the railroad viaduct where it branches off from the Porter Springs road at the residence of A. W. Ellis will be paved with concrete. This will extend the pavement under the viaduct and to where the San Antonio road intersects the Porter Springs road. The rest of the cost of this paving, which will be small, will be borne by the property owners along the road. Crockett parties interested themselves in this matter several weeks ago and their efforts in getting the appropriation from the state highway commission were successful. The San Antonio road is a designated state highway and in line to receive state aid.

**STATE COMMISSION TO TAKE HIGHWAYS**

Austin, September 22, 1923. To all County Judges, County Commissioners and County Engineers:

In accord with the provisions of H. B. 361 of the regular session of the Thirty-Eighth Legislature, the State Highway Commission expects—on January 1, 1924—to take over the maintenance of all the designated state highways.

For your further information we wish to advise that the State Highway Commission considers maintenance to mean keeping a road in as good condition as it may be at the time that it is taken over. No extensive improvements, either in quality or type, will be made upon any road by the maintenance organization, for the reason that the funds provided are insufficient to make such improvements a part of maintenance, and still have sufficient funds to continue assisting those progressive counties that have voted bond issues, in building their roads.

There is reason to believe that, in a number of counties, the commissioners' courts are not expending their respective portions of the motor vehicle fees in maintaining the designated state highways, but are neglecting the maintenance of such highways in anticipation that the state highway commission will—on January 1st—do the necessary maintenance work which the commissioners' courts have failed so far to do.

If, in these counties, roads are allowed to get in bad condition for lack of maintenance, the highway commission, as stated before, will only maintain these roads in as good condition as they may be in when taken over January 1st, 1924, and the citizens of these counties will have only their respective commissioners' courts to blame for this condition. If funds were available, the highway commission would gladly improve and maintain all the roads on the system for the benefit of the state as a whole, but as a matter of fairness and justice to the counties who have bonded themselves for the purpose of building good roads, the commission must keep in a position to assist them. The law directs the counties to use their registration fees until January 1st, 1924, in maintaining

the designated state highways. Many of the counties of the state are doing this and it would be an injustice to these counties for the highway department to improve the roads of other counties that have failed to do their duty under the law.

It is therefore hoped that the commissioners' courts of the different counties will make every effort to keep the designated highways not only in the best condition possible, but to improve them as far as their funds will permit in order that they can be turned over to the highway department in good condition and be kept this way by our maintenance organization. We know that many counties are loyally trying to do this and we hope that all of them will realize the importance of such action.
