

STATES' RELATIONS **TO BE CONSIDERED**

Governors May Form Plans to Help Each Other Enforce Laws.

Washington, Sept. 30.-The forthcoming conference of governors to be called by President Coolidge during October will have before it a broad program touching the relations between the state and national governments with respect to the enforcement of law and, more particularly, enforcement, or lack of enforcement, of the national prohibition law. In some respects the conference will go farther than intended by President Harding. For one thing, it will bring to the attention of the states along the Mexican and Canadian borders methods of co-operation to stop what has come to be termed "bootlegging in immigrants" and the introduction of narcotics. Assurances have been given the "dry" leaders that the broadening of the conference subjects will not include proposals for repeal or modification of the dry law. There has also been called for Washington a conference of "dry" leaders, through the federal council of churches, to be held Oct. 14 to 16, and which may be in session at the time of governors' the conference. Among the signers of the call are Senator Sheppard of Texas, author of the constitutional prohibition provision, and Bishop Capers of the Episcopal diocese of Western Texas.
