COTTON CONDITION BELOW 50 PER CENT

Texas Shows Gain of .08 Per Cent Despite Damag. ing Rains.

New York, Sept. 30.-A detailed analysis of cotton crop re turns, received under an aver age date of Sept. 25, shows that as a result of continued unfavorable weather during the greater parts of the belt is barely many ing its own, although there has been very little more than the normal amount of deterioration for this time of the year. More than 1,600 special correspondents of the Journal of Commerce now place their average esti mate of percentage condition a 49.m, a loss of 7.3 per cent. This compares with. 56.8 per cent las
month, 70.4 per cent in a ten-year average of 60.6 an a ten-year average of 60.6 per
cent. The percentage condition on Oct. 1 last year was 52.5 , decline of 7.5 per cent, while in September, 1921, there had been a drop of 10.4 to 44.7 . The present condition figure, however, is the lowest, with the exception of 1921, for September of any year since 1901. It is, in fact, 24.2 per cent under the high record year, 1924, and would seem to put an end to all expeca large crop. According to th government formula and using government formuia and using, 287,000 , a per cent condition of 49.5 indicates that (allowing 1 per cent for abandonment) $10,-$ 950,000 bales of cotton might be produced, in the event that reasonably favorable weather
conditions are encountered durconditions are encountered dur This, however merely sents the opinion of cotton observers throughout the South, and is not to be construed as a prediction. why the modern descendants of
the tribes of Israel seem to turn so naturally to commerce and other metropolitan activities for a livelihood. A recent number of the Interpreter, a bulletin published by the foreign language information ser-
vice, in an interesting article vice, in an interesting article
chronicles a movement of Jewish chronicies a movement of Jewish
immigrants back to the soil, and also expounds a theory which perhaps accounts for the Ghettos
of our larger American cities. According to this account, 75 , 000 Jewish immigrants and their families are now engaged in tilling the soil of the United States, the amount of their holdings being $1,000,000$ acres, with a land thing like $\$ 100,000,000$. An organization known as the Jewish Agricultural Society, with headquarters in New York and several branch offices in the East, serves as a regulating agency in the drift of Jews toward the land. Last year, the Interpreter reports, it directed 1,160 persons who "wished to turn away from commerce and the professions
and join the oldest calling known to man. says: "To understand the scope and must be kept in mind that these new farmers came to the United States from countries in Eastern Europe where prejudice and persecution have for many genera-
tions forbidden the Jew, not only to own land, but even to dwell in to own land, but even to dwell in
rural districts. These immigrant farmers return to the soil after a lapse of centuries, during which all the power of mistaken government was exerted to divorce the race from everything pertaining to agriculture," not yet become a problem, the
movement has little practical movement has little practical
significance; but in the North significance; but in the North
and East it should be hailed as a splendid omen and given liberal encouragement. One of the harassing phases of the immi-
gration problem has been the tendency of the newly arrived
immigrant to look no further immigrant to look no further
than New York for his western home. That tendency has made quarters where, generation after generation, thought, customs and lazguage remain almost impervious to the influence of
Americanism. No such condition is possible where the newcomers are distributed in rural communities. It is a repetition
of the process by which America's pioneers proceeded from a sural to an urban civilization. is handicapped by underproduc
tion in agriculture, but the immigrant with small means can land of his adoption by shunning the overcrowded cities. There is no restriction of this principle to immigrants of any particular race or origin. The native-born American farmer suring his own living by the pro duction of his land. A sense of hrift, ingrained by centuries of hardship, impels the farmer of his own larder. The mistake of placing all his dependence on one crop can not as a rule be laid to the door of the immigrant farmer.
