





YANCY MERIWETHER WRITES OF GERMANY

Washington, Oct. 10, 1923.

Dear Mr. Aiken:

One whose knowledge of Germany is gleaned from newspapers and magazines alone might possess the idea that conditions there are exaggerated. He probably scoffs at the report that a nation of so industrious, thrifty people is sinking deeper into the mire of national insolvency, starvation and intellectual, scientific and industrial stagnation. But that is Germany today. Once a nation of efficient industries, remarkable institutions and exceptional financial stability, it is now a land of indifferent industries, sluggish institutions and a money system that reminds one of profit-sharing coupons. What it is the result of nobody has been able to truthfully say. It might be the French, it might be caused by the practices of selfish German industrial leaders and financial giants, or it might be the natural product of war on the modern scale. Whatever the cause the condition exists.
