OIL FRAUD RING IS DEMORALIZED, SAYS PROSECUTOR

NEXT CASE ON DOCKET TO BE CALLED WITHIN TWO WEEKS.

Fort Worth, Texas, Nov. 22 .--To convince the oil swindlers' ring that the government will continue relentless prosecution of all those who have violated trict Number Four of Houston let down in its campaign of extermination, United States Discase on the Fort Worth docket will be called within two weeks.

The guiding minds here of the prosecution which resulted in the conviction of Dr. Frederick A. Cook and his co-defendants said today that they believe oil fraud operators are "on the run."

Proof of this came Thursday from Washington. Assistant Attorney General John Crim wired from Washington that not a single complaint of mail swindling reaching the department of justice relates to recent operation. Recent complaints are based, said Crim, on fraudulent operations of many months ago before the government launched its drive.

Mr. Zweifel, who was successful in the Cook case, discussed that trial Thursday. He said:

"We have no animosity toward Dr. Cook and his associates, but the thing they represent, this mulcting the poor, the gullible, the aged, and the widow, has stirred the indignation of the entire nation.

"Dr. Cook was a part of that thing, he was an outstanding figure."

A Titus county man who robbed a bank and then planned the murder of a boy who was an important witness against him in the robbery, made a plea of mental trouble, when tried for his crime. Doubtless the man had mental trouble, but it's the kind of mental trouble that is rendering life and property unsafe all over the country. A man who has sense enough and the will to break into a bank, and sense enough to put a witness out of the way, may be insane, but insanity of this type is best treated by a rope or within the walls of the penitentiary. - Honey Grove Signal.



An Ordinance Regulating the Parking of Motor Vehicles in the City of Crockett, Texas, and Providing for Penalties for Violation Thereof.

Council of Crockett, Texas, that chison of this city, surprised her 1863 by H. Henri Durant. it shall be unlawful to park motor driven vehicles within the following prescribed limits, except in manner set forth below, towit:

On all streets composing the Court House Square make left turn, park straight in, in the middle of street; on leaving, drive straight ahead, turning to left, and following the direction of traffic.

On Public Avenue, except on the square, from Baptist church (Church Street) to Masonic Building (North LeGory Street); Main Street from Methodist church (Church Street) to Federal Lot (Washington Street): Washington Street from City Hall (Pearl Street) to Smith Bros. Office (Main Street); Houston Street from porth end to paving (Pearl Street) to a point opposite south corner of Towery Motor Co. building; LeGory Street from Highway Filling Station (Pearl Street) to a point opposite south line of property of Mrs. W. A. Norris; vehicles shall park to right, head-on, at an angle of 45 degrees, against curb.

On Main Street from Smith Bros. Office (Washington Street) to square, and from west boundary of square to Magnolia Filling Station (Arch Street) vehicles shall park on south side of street only, parking head-on to curb, and at an angle of 45 degrees.

No vehicle shall park closer than 10 feet of street corner or a fire hydrant.

Marked space of 20 feet in front of Post Office is non-parking zone, and no vehicle shall park within same for any pur-

Vehicles may park in front of stores on the square, right to curb, and parallel with same, provided that owner shall remain in said car, or be in store adjacent, and the limit of time for such parking shall not exceed 30 min-
