DECIDED AGAINST THE COMMISSIONERS

The mandamus suit by the ounty commissioners against the county clerk to force pay ment of warrents issued to them selves for services rendered the county came up for hearing in the district court last week. The suit was decided against the commissioners and in favor of had been advised by County At torney Adams that the commis sioners were drawing their pay under the wrong law and that Collins could be held liable if he issued their warrants. ## FULLER'S EARTH.

By D. M. Phillips.
Fuller's earth is a variety of clay that has a high capacity for absorbing organic and mineral impurities from solution in various liquids. It is of particula interest to the petroleum indus try for the reason that it wil remove basic coloring matter
from mineral oils. It consists essentially of hydrous sili cates of aluminum with more hygroscopic moisture than most clays. Physical structure is o more importance than chemica composition as the surface and porosity of the clay seem large ly to determine its value as an absorptive medium.
The original use of this clay was for removing grease and fat process of fulling, hence the name "Fuller's Earth." Prob-
