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COMMISSIONERS ANSWER CRITICISM

Criticism has been directed against the commissioners' court for not allowing \$300 for expenses of office to the county school superintendent in addition to the \$300 now allowed her by the county school board.

Acts of the legislature of 1907, page 212, section 40, reads as follows: "In every county that has a scholastic population greater than five thousand, the county school superintendent shall receive an annual salary of fifteen hundred dollars; provided that the county school superintendent shall be allowed any sum not to exceed one hundred dollars per year for stamps, stationery, expressage and printing, to be paid by the commissioners' court out of the county general fund. The compensation herein provided for shall be paid quarterly, by the county treasurer, on the order of the commissioners' court."

Acts of 1919 at the fourth called session of the 30th legislature, chapter 41 and section 1 amends the foregoing act of 1907 as follows: "In every county that has a population greater than five thousand, the county school superintendent shall receive twenty-one hundred dollars as an annual salary. The county for salary and expenses of the office of the county superintendent of public instruction. The compensation herein provided for shall be paid monthly on the order of the county school trustees. It is further provided, however, that no county superintendent of public instruction shall be allowed to exceed \$200 annually for office and traveling expenses."

This article seems to convey the intention of the legislature to relieve the commissioners' court of any further responsibility in making future payments to the county school superintendent and seems to place the matter solely within the power of the county school trustees.

Acts of the 36th legislature at the third called session in chapter 57 the foregoing act is amended as follows: "In all counties that have a scholastic population of 10,000 or more, the county superintendent shall re-

Washington, May 20.—Charges of heavy campaign contributions by the Ku Klux Klan to secure the election of Senator Mayfield in Texas in 1922 were formally denied on half of the klan today on the special senate committee investigating the contest brought against Mayfield by George E. B. Peddy.

J. E. McQuinn, national auditor of the klan, told the commitexpenditure of a cent by the klan in the senatorial primary or election which resulted in the choice of Senator Mayfield. Seconded by other klan officials, he spread on the committee table a great mass of official records which he said would support completely his statement.

During his explanation counsel for the senator declared they were prepared to prove by other witnesses that no klan organization contributed to the Mayfield campaign fund, although one local in Texas spent \$6 for postage in connection with the election.

J. A. Jett of White Path, Ga., called to the stand by cousel for Peddy, told of his former employment by the klan and was questioned at length about the attitude of its officials. At the request of the Peddy counsel klan officers who were present to testify later, retired from the committee room during Jett's testimony.

The witness said he was in the employ of the klan from its organization until last April. Asked what he knew of the connections of H. W. Evans, T. J. Mc-Kinnon and John D. Maher, he said Maher's activities were largely to find out about the purpose of Gaston B. Means, who was investigating the klan.

W. F. Zumbrunn, counsel for Mayfield, objected to an investigation of the klan generally, and Chairman Spence ruled that the inquiry into the Klan would be confined to its activities in Texas in the election of 1922 when Senator Mayfield was a candi-




