Very many of these women and girls came from the smaller towns and rural communities of Texas and Louisiana. Adjutant Ida L. Anderson, a Salvation Army officer with years of experience in ma ternity home management, is is located at San Antonio texas is located at San Antonio, Texas. No effort is spared to make of this Salvation Army place of nate girls who have been betrayed, and who, outside, face social ostracism and moral disaster. One of the first things many of these women and girls
do upon entering the home is to do upon entering the home is to learn to sew garments for the
expected infants. Plain and fancy needlework and domestic science are taught and many
mothers, formerly of this home mothers, formerly of this home are now supportmg themselves as a direct result of this training.
Just a few of the scores of chilare seen here. One of the rules of the home is that the mother must agree to keep her babe unless she is physically or men-
tally disabled, and if such disability exists, every effort is made to correct this. Records show
that of the hundreds of girls that of the hundreds of girls and women who have been cared for in this Salvation Army home fully 85 per cent have been permanently reclaimed and are now leading
lives.
The large cities are attractive to hundreds of young women who arrive and disappear, annually into the community life. Wages for women do not keep pace with wages for men. The matter of car-fare, rent, meals and laundry is a vital matter to the young woman of today, hence the Salvation Army boarding home, located at Dallas, Texas. young wo a point where ife of a young wonare the securplace in a decent may mark the path of ascent or descent. The girl who has been alone in a big town, seeking employment with perhaps only a few dollars between her and the cold world, will thoroughly understand this condition.
