RELIGIOUS CODE AS ANTIDOTE FOR CRIME

Chicago, Feb. .19 .- "Youth must remain true to religious principle if we are to stem criminal activity. The criminals of today are boys, not men. The average age of convicted crimmals here is 22 years. Lack of guidance leads these youths to crime."

These were the declarations of State's Attorney Robert E. Crowe, famed Franks case prosecutor, when he discussed crime and crime news before the annual meeting of the Inland Daily Press association Wednesday.

"It makes no difference what the religion might be," Crowe continued. "Had the two smart Aleck boys, (Richard Loeb and Nathan Leopold) who were tried here last summer, been true to the religion of their fathers they now would be occupying a high place in society instead of being lodged in the penitentiary."

Crowe declared that in view of the fact that the majority of crimes are committed by youths, youth should not be considered a defense in prosecution of criminals.

The State's attorney made a strong plea for greater willingness to undertake jury duty on he part of business leaders of he community, saying that without the proper kind of men in the jury box the hands of the aw are tied." He deplored the act that the Illinois law does not ermit all men to act as jurors, and expressed the belief that urors could do inestimable good a protection of children and the tome.

Turning to newspaper treatment of crime news, Crowe said that he had "no quarrel" with
