His life was long and useful as a practicing physician and neighbor.

Dr. T. M. Sherman died at his home at Kennard Sunday night, death following a long illness. He was 76 years of age and had been a resident of Houston county 49 years, locating here to practice his profession when 27 years old. As an evidence of the esteem in which he was held by his neighbors, the funeral procession of automobiles was almost a mile in length, many of his neighbors, both white and colored, following the hearse to Crockett.

Funeral services were held Tuesday morning at 10:30 o'clock in the First Baptist church of Crockett. Rev. A. S. Lee, Baptist pastor, conducted the services, assisted by Dr. S. F. Tenney and Rev. R. F. Hodges Mr. Hodges had been a life-long friend and neighbor of the deceased, while Dr. Tenney had known him since his residence in Houston county. All had words of commendation and assurance. It was noted that many colored people, mostly from the deceased's home community, occupied a section in the church.

Besides being a life-long member of the Baptist church, Dr. Sherman was a member of the Masonic lodge, and the burial services were with Masonic rites, the Masons taking charge of the remains at the church. Interment was in Glenwood cemetery following church service, where a profusion of flowers covered the grave as a last token of respect.



How to Field Select Corn.

When seed for any plant is sought for the next year's crop, care should be exercised to get the best and to maintain its vitality by proper care in storing it away. To get the best results from corn when you are to use your home-grown corn, the following points should be observed:

1. Have a fair idea of the development of the crop generally before attempting to select.

2. Select stalks which have plenty of foliage blades. The blades are to the stalk what the leaves are to the tree; that is, they are the breathing organs and hence should be plentiful.

3. Select stalks that are fairly equally distanced apart in drill and row and with two ears if

possible. 4. The ears should hang at approximately an angle of 45 degrees, which will give a good drainage and will not decay from



This is a question in which hundreds of commercial secretaries, and officials of other civic organizations, are very much interested. Many have answered it to their entire satisfaction, while others have let doubt and fear deter them from taking definite action in the affirmative.
