How to Field Select Corn.

## OHIO MOUND TOMB GIVES UP JEWELS

Pearls as Large as Hickory Nuts Found With Bodies of Ancient Notables.

Chillicothe, Ohio, Sept. 11. Discovery Friday of thousands of pearls, many of enormous size and exquisite color, which ages ago swathed the bodies of four mound builders, believed to day
have been of royal lineage, as they were laid to rest in the end of the charnel house, of what is known as the Pricer Mound of the Seip group, near Banbridge, what is expected to be the most valuable find of the mound builders in recent years.
Curator Harry C. Shetrone of the Ohio Archaeological and Historical museum, in charge of the
opening of the mound, named to-
day's find as "the burial of pearls." He declared the four occupants of the grave undoubtedly were personages of high rank among the ancient inhabi-
tants of Ohio. Copper helmets covered the skulls of two, while ornaments of copper and silver were found in profusion.
Armed guards were posted about the mound to prevent souvenir hunters, collectors or vanalich is disturbing the find, day.
Dr. C. W. Mills, director of the Ohio museum, and Girard Fowks, tere present when the find was unearthed.

Frankly, a fair that is conducted for the sole purpose of making money is doomed to failure sooner or later. Finances are to be considered, yes, for the ultimate success of future
celebrations depend largely upon the financial outcome of preceeding ones; but the management must not lose sight of the many other important features while thinking in terms of dollars and cents
A fair can be one of the great est influences for good in a county; second only to relig ious and educational institutions. Unless there is some celebration to take its place, and there are few that can successfully do so, the annual county fair is the best place for the making of new friends and the drawing closer of old friendships; it is the place where rural and urban classes meet on common ground, and where one class becomes more familiar with and interested in the problems of the other.
