We do not like the premium idea as usually applied for gaining circulation. Its effect is to create a desire for the premium. but not for the newspaper. It does not sell the newspaper. Where a publisher gives away 50 per cent or even 25 per cent of the subscription in the form of premiums he is likely to create the idea that his subscription price is too high. People who think-and there is a considerable portion of them in every community-are likely to say to themselves that he must be charging a pretty stiff price for a cheap article, otherwise he could not afford to refund so


