

A FAMOUS LOCOMOTIVE. Wreck of the Engine that Gave the Alarm

famous locomotive was wreekedately at BO office, just above Altoona, It was No. 1,149, the engine that on the memorable day of the Johnstown flood went rushing down the Pan-nsylvania railroad tracks from nemaugh to Johnstown with

shricking whistle giving the alarm of he oncoming deluge of water.

After the flood No 1,149 was found, bottom upward, buried under a great bank of sand, near where the engineer had abandoned it to flee for his life

from the flood. Relic hunters cleared away the sand TEXAS and proceeded to dismantle it of every thing they could secure. The bell and all the brass fixtures were carried away, and even the big wooden bumper was hacked into splinters, which now stand first among the treasures of many an enthusiastic

After things had quieted down about the flooded city the railroad company began looking around to see wirat it could rescue from the debris. Among a score or more locomotives they found the dismantled No. 1,149. It was set on its feet and brought to Altoona. After a week in the shop it came out again, showing no signs of the ordeal it had passed through. Since then it has been run as a shifter. About noon one day No. 1,149 was standing on the track near the & and O. telegraph station. Just or w it was a heavy coal train; stanonary, with all brakes set. Engineer W. D. Thomas happened to look back over the track and another coal train. without an engine, came tearing down the steep grade. The switch had not been turned to allow it to draw on the next track, as was intended. Thomas jumped before the crash and escaped, but No. 1.149 was turned bottom up and terribly demolished between the two heavy coal trains.

> WASHINGTON'S . CHINA. A St. Louis Man Belleves That He Has

3 an Authentic Cream-Pitcher. Mr. J. L. Bernard, an employe of the Missouri Pacific railroad, St. Louis has in his possession a rare relic in chinaware. It is in the form of a pitcher, which, it is claimed, was a part of china set belonging to George Washington. It has a purplish blue band two inches wide around the bowl and another band of the same color and about half an inch wide near the top. The handle of the pit her is white and partly ridged, represent-ing two scanthus leaves. It is cracked near the bottom. The bowl contains two allegorical pictures in white relief on the colored band on each side of the pitcher, and one in front of the

The representations on the sides are encircled by white bands, with a fun in the middle of the top line. The picture on the right side of the pitcher represents a chariot drawn by two boys and occupied by a female with an infant in ner lap. In her left hand she holds a fan at arm's length, and in her right hand over her right shoulder an ornament. In front of the chariot and between the two boys is a rod encircled by a vine. The infant in the voman's lap has its right arm elevated and its left arm hanging by its side. The representation on the left side of the pitcher is a charlot drawn by two panthers and occupied by a female, who is holding a wreath by both hands at arm's length over the left side of the chariot. Above and between the female and the panthers is a male figure in a walking position and carrying a balance over his shoulders, with his arms resting upon the bal-

In front of the pitcher and under the spout is an oak tree, on the right of which is a fence. There are two cracks on the rim of the pitcher and a piece is broken from the left side of

Gilt Letters on Books. Gilt letters on bindings are imressed by a hot tool or stamp. The tool bearing the letters should be first arranged in order on a rack before clear fire, so as to be well-heated wi out becoming red hot. The leather be stamped is first dusted over with very finely powdered rosin or gum mastic, over which lay a leaf of gold. The well-heated stamp is now pressed down on the gold leaf, which will, o course, be indested and show, figure or letter impressed upon it.
