A SNYOPSIS OF IMPORTANT MEASURES.

War on Gold Contracts in t state Legislature-Seriously Opposed.

Austin, Tex., Feb. 4-Senate commitee on state affairs met and considered Senator Kearby's bill pronibiting the contracting of debts to be paid in either gold or silver. This is to prohibit the contracting of debts payable in gold. The bill aroused serious opposition and was postponed for ten days. The following is the bill: Section 1. That gold and silver as coined at the mints of the United

States of America shall be received without discrimination in favor of either metal in the payment of all debts collected within the state of Texas.

Sec. 2. That it shall not be lawful to contract for the payment of any dept in this state in either one of said metals, or to discriminate in favor of the one against the other.
