After some time the surg on in charge of the case deeided to amputate the lower jaw, hopcer, but it did not have that result and five successive operations have been performed up to date, with the result that the lower jaw, tongue and soft parts of the throat have been cut away, leaving nothing but the upper palate and uvula suspended over the cavity which extends down to the neck and the breast.

Respiration is effected directly through the throat, the nose being use less for breathing, and is in no connected with the organs which it was originally intended to supply with air. Food is conducted to the stomach by means of a funnel and soft rubber

Notwithstanding this terrible experience Mr. Sullivan is of a cheerful disposition, and whiles away the time reading. He makes futile attempts at talking, but as nothing other than a mumbling sound escapes him he has to convey a knowledge of his wants by means of pencil and paper.

A WAR AGAINST SMOKE Louis Grappling With the Smoke Nulsance A New Bridge Across the Mississippi.

St. Louis, Feb. 24.-In a group of business men smoking cigars after din ner at the Mercantile club the other afternoon, the statement was made by a manufacturer that the city would spend fully a quarter of a million dol-lars in testing smoke-preventing de-vices this year. He meant, of course, the manufacturers of the city who have joined the club which intends to clear the air of the smoke. This club got up the bills organizing the city crusade against the smoke nuisance, which the Mayor has just signed. The laws es tablish a bureau with inspectors, whose duty it is to prosecute those who will not use smoke preventing devices on their furnaces. A pre iarity of the law that distinguis, ses it from those proposed in other cities is that any in-ventor can have his device tested and its merit decided upon by a board of experts paid by the city. The club

hopes to rid the city of half of its smoke cloud by the beginning of summer. Ever since the Merchants' bridg was completed it has been seen that St. Louis would have to have another one to cross the Mississippi for the four years and pay them an annual special use of foot passengers and salary of \$500 a year and no mileage. vehicles. 

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
