

Into It, Drying Up Below. TWENTY-EIGHT MEN LOSE THEIR LIVES.

CRYSTAL FALLS, Mich., Sept. 30.

A mine casualty without parallel in the history of this country occurred at Mansfield, the only producer of Bessemer ore in the Crystal Falls min-ing district and located six miles from here, Thursday night. The mine caved in from top to bottom, burying twenty-eight workmen and entailing a loss of \$600,000. The Mansfield shaft is located on the west bank of the Michigamme river and the working levels run directly under the stream and parallel with it for several hundred feet. The first level is thirty-five feet below the bottom of the river, and the lower levels, five in number, parallel the first. The bottom is 428 feet below the surface of the water. The accident is supposed to have been caused by giving way of the timbers on the fifth evel allowing those above to follow and at last the river to pour in upon the fated men. After the cave in the river bed below the mine was dry in an hour and forty minutes. Fortyday night. Of this number twenty escaped and twenty-eight found watery graves. Their bodies will never be recovered. Most of the survivors were at the bottom level, which has not yet been sloped out. 
