Another Amendment. WASHINGTON, Oct. 7 .- In the senate yesterterday Mr. Blackburn of Kentucky submitted an amendment to the bill repealing the silver purchasing clause of the act of 1890. It strikes out the Voorhees substitute, leaving A the bill as it passed the house; it then provides for the free coinage of silver of American production. The secretary of the treasury is authorized on the first day of each month to establish the seignorrage to be charged for the following month, which is to be the difference between the market price of silver bullion and the minted value after coinage. This seigniorage will not be coined, but will be sold by the secretary for gold to be used for the purpose of maintaining the parity of gold and silver.

Two Strong Amendments.

WASHINGTON, Oct. 2 .- After some time spent in getting a quorum and disposing of the morning business Saturday, Mr. Wolcott offered an amendment to the silver repeal bill which provides for the refunding the cotton tax to the various states. the moneys to be disposed of as the legislatures of the states affected after passage of the act shall determine. Mr. Perkins also presented an amendment to the same bill providing that the mints shall hereafter be open to the coinage of crude American silver, to be coined at the existing parity with gold at a seigniorage of 20 per cent; that no gold coin of less de nomination than ten shall be coined; that no legal tender or treasury note of smaller denomination than \$5 shall government department shall be appointed, whose duty it shall be to advise congress on all questions of finance.




