## THE GRAHAM SCHOOLS.

In all schools people are fond of who object to the teacher's methods of discipline, time of opening the school, the way the house is furnished, the classes his children are in, the price and number of books, the teachers employed by the board or superintendent, object if the teacher be imported or local, rates of tuition and for personal matters for which no one can give a valid reason.

Herein are appended a few facts for the consideration of the reading public. There is or will be enough money to pay six teachers seven months and pay other expenses of the school. No money will be in the treasury before taxes are paid in December or January. Should the public free school be taught now no money will be on hand to pay the teachers, and no one will advance money on the school claims; hence the teachers could not get a dollar for their services; therefore all practical business men would desire to teach the private term first. The school will continue three scholastic months and the public free school will be taught seven months, making a ten months term—the same as taught in most towns and villages like Graham. No student has ever been denied admission to the school who was unable to pay at entrance, or not able to pay at intervals.

This of course is very necessary as the Supt. contracts to pay all the teachers, both in the private and public school, looking to the patrons and the school trustees for the means to pay the teachers' salaries. Last year the Superintendent, during the nine months term, received \$2,000 from the board of trustees for teachers' salaries, and the fund from the private schools, and paid \$1,500 to various teachers for services rendered, making almost five entire salary units, the private tuition of the school.

But he is satisfied with what he makes from the business of teaching else he would quit the profession. All the teachers for the scholastic year have been received and the amount promised them by the Supt. for the entire year, \$2,100, cash. Not one has been asked to contribute a cent as a gift for the support of the school. Not one cent has been collected to defray a dollar.

No person has been requested to bear part of the risk the management has assumed. The expenses of the school in the private term have been paid by the trustees for that year and then the Supt. paid \$500 of himself.

The rates of tuition in this school are the same as in any other school of the same grade in Texas by law. Where the rates are the same as all professional teachers charge, when can be verified by an examination of any or all catalogues of this state. Moreover, a student paying at the rate of \$2 per month, for instance, pays the same rate through the entire term though he is promoted to any higher grade that year. The student may be promoted in grades but no increase in tuition the same year.

The prospects indicate that the new school building which is ready for occupancy by February or March. It is, as most of the public school will be taught in the new house. This will be a great benefit to both pupils and teachers. The students are progressing rapidly, better than at any time since the organization, thirteen months ago. There is a good attendance at a private school, and all that is needed is for the people of Graham to keep it going, for it is cheaper to educate at home than abroad. Two gold medals have been offered, one for the best essay and one for the best recitation or declamation.

The desire of every one should be to make this school a success. The teachers are enthusiastic and progressive. None but professional have been employed. No incompetent teacher need apply. We thank the people of Graham for their liberal patronage and prompt payments of tuition, for in no town can people be found who patronize a school so liberally and pay so promptly. Just think! The largest private, non-sectarian school within 200 miles is at Graham, Young county, Texas, and the people will double the enrollment.
