

A Fabled Egg. A large specimen of the egg of the fabled "roc" of the "Arabian Nights" or Epyornis, as the extinct gigantic bird of Madagascar is called, has recently been secured by J. Proctor of Tamatave and London. It was discovered by some natives about twenty miles to the southward of St. Augustine Bay, on the southwest coast of Madagascar. The egg, which it whitybrown in color and unbroken, is a fine specimen 334 inches by 28 inches, and an even higher value is placed upor it than upon the egg of the great auk, which lived within the memory of man. An ostrich's egg is about 17 inches by 15 inches, and the contents of six such are only equal to one of the Epyornis.
