The first person to reduce it to a system was, according to Cicero, the poet Simonides, who lived 500 B. C. His plan is known as the topical, or locality plan, and was in substance as follows: Choose a large house, with a number of differently furnished apartments in it. Impress upon the mind carefally all that is noticeable in the house, so that the mind can readily go over all its parts. Then place a series of ideas in the house; the first in the hall, the next in the sitting-room, and so on

MILK PURIFIER.

is for the purpose of purifying and aerating milk. This is an apparatus adapted for purifying milk by the process of eliminating from it all taints and odors immediately after it is drawn from the cow. It has been found that milk so treated will keep and will even withstard the influence of thunderstorms. To the chresemaker this is a matter of special imnot be made from tainted milk while in the case of milk for town supply the preservation of its freshness

consisting of tinned wire cloth so arranged on a stand that the milk flowing from the vessel above passes over stream, thus allowing every part of it to be treated by the atmosphere. The aerator is equally useful to the dairy farmer for the purpose of purifying milk preparatory to cream raising or separating, and it is desirable to note that all milk should be aerated before refrigerated. At present the refrigerator is generally used to gool impure milk, from which results the fact that refrigerater milk goes sour very quickly when brought to a temperature exceeding 60 degrees. This appliance is undoubteily a new and valuable adjunct to the dairy.
