Commissioner. Fasting Carried to Extremes.

The people of Servia are forever fasting. The most severe fast is that of Lent, which lasts seven whole weeks. Then, on the 30th of June, is the fast of St. Peter, which lasts two weeks, and is observed by some persons for four weeks. From the 1st to the 15th of August, the fast of St. Mary, and Christmas is preceded by a forty days' fast. Apart from these lengthy fasts every Friday and every Wednesday throughout the year is held to be a fast day. Fasting in Servia is no mere change of diet; it means real abstinence and privation. At Pirot this fasting has assumed such serious proportion as to constitute a grave medical problem and a national danger, for it affects seriously the health of the population the strength and fighting capabilities of the soldiers. For ten years he served the Federal government as a weather observer and severed his connection therewith, leaving a record of unsurpassed excellence. About the year 1885, while engaged at the military post of Fort Bridger, Wyo., he sustained a serious illness, that left him for many years thereafter more or less an invalid, and resulted in a serious impairment of his vision.


