

To Rob the Sen of Its Wealth. A submarine ship, unlike any other vessel ever planned, is build-

No part of the sea will he inacocean's bed, picking up here and there the stupendous fortunes that are known to be in Neptune's keep. ing. The owner of the submarine mous wealth in a short time.

The length of the vessel over all is 80 feet, The beam is 14 feet When fully submerged the ship's displacement will be about 130 tons.

The surface buoyancy is overcome by means of heavy weights attached to long wire cables connected with drums at either end of the vessel, By the operation of these drums the vessel is drawn to the bottom of the sea.

Transversing the keel, fore and aft, are axles with broad tired wheels. By adjusting the water ballast in the lower compartments the ship may be made to rest lightly on the bed of the ocean. The wheels are connected by gearing to an electric motor. In this way the ship will be transformed to a vehicle

Because of the possibility of finely adjusting the ship's weight and buoyancy, comparatively little power is necessary to move the hull on

The question of keeping a fresh supply of air in the ship has been olved by a simple plan. The stor age batteries can be renewed at will.

When it is desired to come to the surface the drums are reversed, the cables unwind and the ship ascends. Then sufficient water is pumped out of the compartments to make it water and red lemonade for my

The coast of the United States is well adapted for the use of such submarine prowlers, as the bottom of the ocean for a long way out is more nearly level than the pavement of Broadway-in fact, having a slope seaward of not much more than six teet to the mile for a dis tance of twenty to sixty miles.

Almost the entire distance from New Foundland to the Florida Keys and out to the Gulf Stream is suitable for exploration.

The value of the gold, silver and precious stones which have gone to the bottom in ships can scarcely be computed.

Lieutenant-Commander Richardson Clover of the United States Navy, in his published report of Feb. 20, 1893, says: "The most reliable statistics show an average total loss of 2,172 vessels. The estimated value of these vessels and cargoes is about one hundred millions of dollars. This loss has been going on from time immemorial, and it is going on at the rate of about \$300,000 per day."

Dampness Should Be Avoided.

Dampness in dairy houses should be studiously avoided. Dampness produces fungoid growth, not only developing but increasing organic germs; and there are, when the conditions are favorable, countless invisible germs floating in the air to attack the milk and spoil it and the butter. Then beware of damp floors. A little lime scattered around, or placed in a box in the dairy house, will absorb a large quantity of the moisture. But the first important step to take is to see to the drainage; see that it is as perfect as possible.-Farmers' Review.
