

Spreading in New York.
Adispatch from New York to the St. Louis Republic, dated August 4th, says:
"Elliott Danforth, the New York member of the notification committee, returned to-day after a hurried tour of the state. He expects to meet Senator Jones here tomorrow, or later in the week.
"The people in the center of the state," Mr. Danforth said, "and particularly in the counties of Tioga, Tompkins, Broome, Delaware and Chepango, are enthusiastic for Bryan and Sewall. I say the people, because in the interior of the state the silver issue has obliterated party lines, and the masses are flocking under the popular standard of Bryan and Sewall. PROCLAMATION
By the Governor of the State of Texas.

Whereas, the Twenty-fourth Legislature, at its late regular biennial session, which adjourned the 30th day of April, A. D. 1895, passed the following Joint Resolutions, in the manner prescribed by the Constitution of this State, proposing certain amendments to the Constitution of the State, to-wit:
Joint resolution to amend section 3, of article 7, of the Constitution of the State of Texas.
Section 1. Be it resolved by the Legislature of the State of Texas: That section 4, of article 7, of the Constitution of the State of Texas, be so amended as to read hereafter as follows:
Section 4. The lands herein set apart to the public free school fund shall be sold under such regulations, at such times, and on such terms, as may be prescribed by law; and the Legislature shall not have power to grant any relief to purchasers thereof. The Comptroller shall invest the proceeds of such sales, and of those heretofore made, as may be directed by the Board of Education, herein provided for, in the bonds of the United States, the State of Texas, or counties in said State, or in such other securities as may be prescribed by law, or in agricultural lands, for the benefit of the penitentiary system of the State, under such restrictions as may be prescribed by law, and the State shall be responsible for all such investments.
Sec. 2. The foregoing amendment shall be submitted to the qualified voters of the State at the next general election. Those favoring its adoption shall have written or printed on their ballots the words "For the amendment to section 4, article 7, of the Constitution," and those opposed to its adoption shall have written or printed on their ballots the words "Against the amendment to section 4, article 7, of the Constitution." For the amendment to section 7, of the Constitution of the State is hereby directed to issue the necessary proclamation of said election and have the same published, as required by the Constitution and existing laws of the State.
Approved April 27, 1895.
Joint resolution amending article 6, section 2, of the Constitution of the State of Texas, requiring persons of foreign birth to declare their intention to become citizens of the United States six months before any election at which such persons may offer to vote.
Section 1. Be it resolved by the Legislature of the State of Texas: That article 6, section 2, of the Constitution of the State of Texas, be amended so as to hereafter read as follows:
Section 2. Every male person subject to none of the foregoing disqualifications, who shall have attained the age of twenty-one years, and who shall be a citizen of the United States, and who shall have resided in this State one year next preceding an election, and the last six months within the district or county in which he offers to vote, shall be deemed a qualified elector. And every male person of foreign birth subject to none of the foregoing disqualifications, who, not less than six months before any election at which he offers to vote, shall have declared his intention to become a citizen of the United States, in accordance with the Federal naturalization laws, and who shall have resided in this State one year next preceding such election, and the last six months within the district or county in which he offers to vote, shall also be deemed a qualified elector; and all electors shall vote in the election precinct of their residences. Provided, that electors living in any unorganized county may vote at any election precinct in the county to which such county is attached for judicial purposes.
Sec. 2. The Governor of this State is hereby directed to issue the necessary proclamation ordering an election for the submission of said joint resolutions to the qualified electors of the State for their adoption or rejection on Tuesday after the first Monday in November, A. D. 1896, which will be the 3d day of said month.
Now, therefore, I, C. A. Culberson, Governor of Texas, in accordance with the provisions of said joint resolutions, and by the authority vested in me by the Constitution and laws of this State, do hereby issue this my proclamation ordering that an election, as required by said joint resolutions, be held on the day designated therein, to-wit, on Tuesday, the 3d day of November, A. D. 1896, in the several counties of this State, for the adoption or rejection of said proposed amendments to the Constitution of the State of Texas. Said election shall be held at the several polling places of the election precincts of the several counties of this State, and will be conducted by the officers holding the same in conformity with the laws of this State and in accordance with the provisions of this proclamation.
In testimony whereof, I hereunto sign my name and cause the seal of the State to be hereunto affixed, at the City of Austin, this 4th day of July, A. D. 1895.

The Judge gave the Grand Jury a brief but very clear and explicit charge as to their duties and among the special instructions were charges to investigate specially the late case of attempted arson in Graham, and also local option law cases if any were to be found. He congratulated our county upon the apparent good enforcement of the local option law. Jno. E. Morrison was appointed foreman and P. L. Gibson was sworn as office bailiff. R. H. Burns, T. F. Dixon, Ed. Parson, Lawrence McLaran, Allen Casey, Troy Stewart, Jake Schlitter and J. W. Cornelius were sworn as bailiffs to serve the Grand jury.

The civil jury docket was taken up by the court and the case of the Texas Loan Agency vs. W. W. Slack, et al., was tried Monday and Tuesday, resulting in a verdict for the plaintiff. Wednesday the criminal docket was called, the case of the State vs. Nick Wooley continued and case of State vs. J. W. Collins, charged with perjury, tried.

These were the only criminal cases on the docket. The Grand Jury are still busy and may hatch out more business before they quit. There are several civil cases yet to try, but it is thought the court will adjourn this week.

Among the visiting attorneys are Robertson of Fort Worth, Scarborough of Waco, Neblett and Kerr of Corsicana, Hodges of Wichita, and Girand of Palo Pinto.
