from Farmer to Austin. On Thursday morning, the 10th of September, 1896, in company with feel and mother, my sister and I, having bid our brothers, sisters and friends a loving good-bye, started for the railroad at Bowie, Texas. After watching the last glimpse of home disappear from our observation, we nettled down to enjoy the trip, and we certainly did.

We passed through several little villages and small towns and at last arrived at Bowie on the 11th, and prepared to take the train at half past 2 o'clock p. m.

At the depot we met Miss Nannie Adams pupil of the Institute, and Miss Sallie Thernton, a young lady who spent vacation

After buying our tickets and bidding our father and mother good-bye, we took the Fort Worth and Denver bound for Fort Worth. We arrived at Fort Worth at half past 5 o'clock p. m., and after a few minutes delay boarded the M. K. & T. south bound. We passed stations too numerous to count and too hard to spell, but at each I looked for school mates to join our party. At last my anticipations were more than gratified, for when aroused from a pleasant nap I heard a familiar voice exclaim, "Why, Raymond, is that you." Turning, I recognized my teacher, Prof. Gay, who I was surprised though glad to see. Among the first questions that I asked him was: "Are you married?" 
