





Washington Nov. 8 -The cam paign for the free coinage of silver will be waged with vigor during the next four years in preparation for the election in 1900. The directors of the American Bimetallic union, who constitute the bulk of the silver leaders in the three partles, have cecided to maintain head quarters in this city, from which to fice at Chicago will be consolidated with the Washington office, but the San Francisco branch is to be continued. At the request of the di rectors Gen: A. J. Warner, the president of the union, has issued Cornthian Lodge, No. 148, Knights the following address to the silver Mot. ay ni bt.
