**Chairman Jones on the Situation.**  
Chairman Jones, in discussing the situation, said: "What defeated us was the action of large employers in telling their men they need not return to work on Wednesday if McKinley was defeated. This unquestionably lost us thousands of votes, for the man to work with a wife and five children cannot help being moved by a prospect which threatens to deprive him of work and consequent means of support."

"But we have won a victory just the same, for I do not believe that any political party in this country will dare include the word 'gold' in its platform in 1900. Whatever happens, however, we shall not abandon our fight for silver, which is a just one and one that is bound to triumph."

"I think it will be the aim of the republicans to deprive us of success on this question and I fully believe that Mr. McKinley will bend all his efforts towards the securing of an international agreement. He is friendly toward silver. There can be no doubt regarding that. His public record proves that, and he is confronted with a free silver bill, as I have little doubt he will, he will sign it. I believe moreover that before the close of his administration he will stand in about the same relation toward his party that President Cleveland does toward the democratic party. The western republicans will unquestionably urge silver legislation upon him, which of course will be bitterly opposed by eastern republicans. He cannot please one without giving deadly offense to the other and I think the result will be that he will alienate the republicans of the east."

**Mark Hanna Indicted.**  
Monday's St. Louis Republic contained the following special telegram:

Dallas, Tex., Nov. 1.—There is no doubt of Hanna's indictment. The vote in the Grand Jury room stood 9 to 3 in favor of indicting. The compromise was made like this: Eight jurors were positively in favor of returning the bill at once. One juror refused to vote for the bill unless his name was put in court as a defendant for the election. In order to get the necessary eight votes the eight other jurors agreed with the one who demanded a deferral, and voted as requested on deferring.

The Grand Jury adjourned until next Thursday. The bill is found on a telegram from Mark Hanna sent from Republican National Headquarters to John Huston at Dallas between October 1 and October 4, offering \$40,000 to populist leaders to secure the populist vote of Texas for McKinley. Huston has not been indicted for the reason that, up to date, no dispatches bearing his signature have been obtained by the Grand Jury from the Western Union Telegraph Company. It is known, however, that a telegram did go to Hanna bearing the signature of John Grant, National Republican Committeeman of Texas, saying:

"Think can make deal. Forty thousand refused. Sixty thousand demanded."

It is also known that Gould and Rockefeller of New York, by their representatives, in telegrams offered to contribute \$100,000 if the populist leaders endorsed the McKinley electors, and \$100,000 additional if McKinley electors secured the vote of Texas. More indictments are certain to be returned after the Grand Jury resumes work next Thursday.

**Battle For Silver Must Go On Without Abatement, Says Gen. Warner.**  
Washington Nov. 8.—The campaign for the free coinage of silver will be waged with vigor during the next four years in preparation for the election in 1900. The directors of the American Bimetallic union, who constitute the bulk of the silver leaders in the three parties, have decided to maintain headquarters in this city, from which to send out literature. The branch office at Chicago will be consolidated with the Washington office, but the San Francisco branch is to be continued. At the request of the directors Gen. A. J. Warner, the president of the union, has issued the following address to the silver leagues and bimetallic unions of the United States:

"Silver has lost in this election, but the battle for the overthrow of the gold standard has not ended. The disastrous consequences that must attend upon the continuance of this standard make it impossible to relinquish the struggle against it until it is finally overthrown."

"The gold standard can not be maintained by increasing revenues because revenues are not paid in gold. The attempt to maintain the gold standard by perpetual loans must also sooner or later fail. The only way is by contracting the currency and forcing down prices so low that gold will come here of itself in such quantities as to constitute in part at least the currency with which revenues are paid and no debt or nation can long maintain such a policy. Either course therefore leads to inevitable ruin, the one by bankrupting the government and the other by bankrupting the people. Either policy will subject the United States absolutely to British domination, and hence the rejoicing of the British press over the defeat of silver here."

"The victory of gold is a victory of trusts and syndicated wealth, brought about by corruption and coercion, and not a victory of the people or for the people and it can not last. There must be an end at last to the constant appreciation of money. The appreciation of money alone, if allowed to go on at the rate it has gone on for the past twenty years, will in half a generation more transfer the bulk of all the wealth of this country from those who have created it to the hands of the few who control the money and own the debts. No power can be conceived so potent to gather wealth into a few hands as the ceaseless, all pervading power of an appreciating money standard. No civilization can stand against it. It must end: the foundations upon which free institutions rest will be broken."

"The battle therefore for the restoration of silver must go on without abatement, leagues and I urge upon all silver and bimetallic leagues and unions to keep up their organizations and to continue the fight until victory for the people is fully won."

"The noble fight made by our intrepid leader in the campaign just ended endears him to all who believe in the righteousness of our cause, and under his leadership we believe victory will be won in 1900."

**Edison's Debt to His Wife.**  
Thomas A. Edison has been married twice. To his two wives he owes considerable of his success as the greatest living inventor and greatest inventor that ever lived. They looked after his health and physical welfare, enabling him to retain that vigor without which he could not stand the strain of day after day in his laboratory without a wink of sleep.

Twenty-two years ago Edison's friends urged him to marry, hoping that domestic life would compel him to eat at least one meal a day and sleep with some regularity. Edison said he had no time to court, but if some decent girl wanted to marry him he had no objections. One day while watching a young girl working one of his instruments and to whom he never before had spoken, he asked her, somewhat anxiously, if she would be his wife.

She said "yes," and in three days they were married, though he came near forgetting the hour for the ceremony, being busy on a complex machine.
