Y., has a method loep, twelve to fifteen plants to the linear foot, and crowns even with th surface. The roots are clipped before trenching. The whole surface is mulch ed, the beds (each consisting of three trenches eight inches apart) thoroughly soaked, and a week after sprayed with Bordeaux mixture. 

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
