Statistics promise by the New York state excise commissioner show a considerable reduction in the number of saloons in the state as the result of the operations of the Raines law. That law has now been in operation about thirteen months, and in that time the number of satoons has been decreased by 7,437. When the law went into total receipts under the law from May 1 to October 31, 1896, were \$11,038,322, and after deducting rebates and expenses of collection the recepits smounted to \$10,556,192. Under the old law the net revenue for twelve months to all towns and cities in the state was \$2,919,593.

TALMAGE'S ' SERMON.

"A QUEEN'S REIGN" LAST SUN DAY'S SUBJECT.
