### An Open Letter.

Dr. Clark, the man who exhibited the "petrified man" at the reunion, having threatened to sue the county unless the occupation tax collected from him be refunded, County Attorney Kay wrote him the following letter, which was picked up by THE LEADER reporter:

GRAHAM, TEXAS, Sept. 7, 1897.  
Dr. C. L. Clark, Wilson, Tex.:  
Dear Sir: I am just in receipt of your very kind letter of the date of Sep. 1st, concerning the occupation tax collected off you by the collector at the Confederate Veterans' reunion at El Paso, Tex., and also I note the cheerful bit of news therein that you propose to sue us unless the tax is refunded.

Now, doctor, we explained this matter pretty fully at the time, and it was my opinion then and is now, that your exhibit was subject to a tax of ten dollars state and five dollars county tax. #### From Cleveland, Oklahoma.

THE LEADER is a regular weekly visitor to our home in the Jordan valley, and the mention of names familiar to us make interesting reading.

Our boys drove in last Sunday at noon, looking rather tough, as though a bath and a visit to the barber shop might improve their looks. The report a jolly, good time while there.

Crops here are good, considering the late cool weather in the spring, though not an average year for corn. The best corn will make forty or fifty bushels per acre. On the upland it was cut short by the dry weather in June. The cotton crop is good and will average one-half bale. Some will make three-fourths and the best will make one bale per acre. We will need cotton pickers, and if you see any standing around idle, tell them they might do well to come over and help us.

We have had all the vegetables of all kinds that we could use and more. Put up a fifty gallon barrel of nice, white kraut. If you were Dutch enough I would send you a mess.

Wheat crops are good. Not much sown just here. One crop near town made twenty-six bushels to the acre. In the Territory west of us the crop is very good. This strip being only four years old, fruit trees are young, yet we had quite a crop of peaches and grapes, and in a few years will have an abundance of fruit of all kinds.

Fire broke out in our town on the night of the fifth of August, and in spite of all effort eight business houses, including the bank, were burned.

Our mill and gin company is getting ready for the cotton crop; putting in some new machinery and fixing things up with all the modern improvements. As our market is so far off, our merchants have made arrangements for buyers in our town.

Those in position to know say we will have a railroad here inside the next twelve months.

Rev. W. M. Voils left a few days ago for Ellis county, Texas, where he has been called to the care of three or four churches. I hear expressions of regret that he thought it best to leave here. A Baptist minister who came down from Missouri, has bought a claim and settled in one-half mile of town. We have preaching by both northern and southern Methodist ministers. We have a well-attended union Sunday school. We hope as the country develops more good people may be induced to come and live among us, and that soon we will have a people who love and fear God. # A FEATHERED GIANT

MEREDITH NUGENT IN NEW YORK LEDGER

While in Paris a few years ago I was surprised to see in one of the museums there an egg of gigantic proportions that I could hardly believe to be a real egg until the descriptive card, lying at its base, cured me of my skepticism. "That," I exclaimed to my friend, "must be the egg of the roc!"

There was no fable about this egg. Its history was well known, and there it lay before us, under the protection of a strong glass case, one of the prized treasures of the most renowned museum of the world. "But what an enormous egg!" "Look at the size of it!" my friend kept on remarking. "Why, it is a very mammoth mammoth egg!"

Perhaps some of my readers may think we were unduly amazed over our find, but let me tell them that this great egg measured three feet—a yard in circumference. Realize if you can for a moment an egg so large that it measures a yard around. Not less startling was the information that it held more than two gallons! Eight quarts of egg! Is it any wonder we were surprised?

The contents of a common hen's egg fill about one-third of an ordinary teacup; compare this to an egg the contents of which are something more than eight quarts, why it would require a large-sized wash bowl to break such an egg in and not lose any of it. In capacity it equaled one hundred and fifty hens' eggs! or seventeen of those of the casowary—a bird almost as large as an ostrich—or six eggs of the great ostrich itself!

If, again, we compare it with the egg of our jeweled humming bird, for instance, it would take two thousand of these tiny eggs to equal in bulk the giant I saw in Paris. With such an egg one could give a breakfast on Easter morn to seventy-five persons and to each serve enough of the feast equaling two hens' eggs!

Why, a native of Madagascar—the country in which these eggs were discovered—could have entertained a whole band of savages after such a large and such fine find, indeed; to the contrary, they were apparently quite plentiful.

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# A YEAR'S SHIPWRECKS

Record of the Vessels That Have Gone to the Bottom.

The year's shipwreck make the subject of an interesting compilation in a recent issue of the *Journal of Commerce*. It appears from this that during the past year 984 vessels of 708,459 tons were wrecked, lost or burned, or passed through a narrow channel.

This is about an average record, higher in 1895 there were 1,237 vessels of 806,273 tons on the list; but then the average for several years was exceeded by 120,000 tons, so that this year's statistics are only a return to the former state.

This is a very satisfactory fact, for the total volume of shipping continues to increase, and thus the death rate is not so high. The ratio is only 34 per cent on the tonnage.

At the present time the largest steam dredge ever used in placer mining is earning \$600 a day in the bed of the Colorado River, in Beaverhead county. It can handle from 4,000 to 5,000 yards of dirt every twenty-four hours.

A large dredge is being built in Milwaukee for the same company. There is perhaps no place in Montana where the dredge can be used with so much success as in Grasshopper gulch.

For many years, in fact, from the earliest placer mining in the Territory, the bed of the creek has benefited all ordinary methods of working.

A LIFE—AND A DEATH.

From the Whitehall district of London, coming from the name of Isaac, who had been by turns a cab driver and a peddler, went a twenty-five year old man to South Africa.

Twenty-two years later, he returned to London, this time as Barney Barnato, the richest man in the world.

Soon he began to organize companies to take over old mines or develop new ones. He skillfully won the promotion that conservative England would not give.

Other shares that sold on Wednesday for five dollars commanded on Friday five hundred.

It was estimated that by 1904, a year ago, the British public had expended seven hundred and fifty million dollars in the Barnato schemes.

The tide turned with the failure of the Johannesburg mine. Barnato spent vast sums to bolster his enterprises, but public faith had been overstrained and the stocks continued to fall.

Suddenly Barnato went to South Africa, and he had expended seven hundred and fifty million dollars in the Barnato schemes.

He was largely gained by the ruin of others. It was said of him that, though he inhabited a palace in Piccadilly, his soul still lived in Whitechapel.

New Methods in Montana to Increase the Placer Production.

Montana is experiencing a revival in placer mining. Many new diggings have been opened, and placer grounds abandoned years ago are being reclaimed.

There is every promise that the placer production of gold in that state will in a few years reach a colossal figure, and there are reasons why this branch of Montana's greatest industry should steadily increase in importance.

The greatest impetus to placer mining, according to a Helena dispatch to the *Minneapolis Journal*, has come through the application of the steam dredge to difficult bars and creek beds that could not be mined in the ordinary way.

The Price of Cotton.

There is probably no better authority on cotton than Mr. Julius Runge, of Galveston. He predicts higher prices because of the very considerable improvement of trade in the United States, the moderate supply of cotton on hand and the fact that the American crop is needed for present consumption.

He says that the supply, visible and invisible, is the smallest ever known, and that it has been demonstrated by the shutting down of Eastern and Southern mills for lack of raw material. It is now thought that the world will require 9,500,000 bales to meet increased demands.

He advises cotton growers to follow the methods adopted this season by wheat growers who obtained the benefit of higher prices by waiting instead of crowding the market. The former marketed their grain slowly and cautiously, and the result is that, instead of speculators, obtained its enhanced value. Mr. Runge thinks the advance in cotton will be quite as great as the advance in wheat to date.

It seems that purchasers abroad, believing in a large crop and lower prices, are buying only for present necessities. The stock in Liverpool is larger than at this date last year, but the falling off of receipts at American ports and interior towns and in amount added more than offset the Liverpool excess. All things considered, a waiting policy seems best for our planters.—Texas Stock and Farm Journal.

Just where the idea or custom of free entertainment for church gatherings originated is hard to determine, but it is an abominable one and should be abolished.—Weatherford News.
