

Practical Use of Water.

In certain portions of the west where water is used for purposes of irriga-tion, experiments have been tried in first utilizing the water for power. Suitable pumps carry it to high reservoirs, where it is used to generate electricity. It acquires an enormous power by its weight and is in no wise injured for freigating purposes. Cotes' Magnetie Motor-

Professor Coles, the famous Kingston (Pa.) scientist, writes that he has discovered how to run machinery by magnetism, and has incidentally hit upon perpetual motion. The gist of his communication follows: The magnetic motor is so simple in construction that almost any schoolboy will be able to a common horse shoe magnet and a at a distance of a quarter of an inch. so that it will jump to the magnet; and, non-magnetic substance over the face off the attraction. Professor Coles, working upon this theory for years, has at last discovered, in aluminum glass, a substance that will cut off the magnetic attraction as completely as snow cuts off the attraction of the earth from steel'sled shoes. The motor may magnet metals, and so woven that each metal forms a complete and independent junction of its own, and is said to arrest the magnetic currents as they pass from pole to pole. B B shows the ending of the magnets, through a glass rim or case, as the whole machine is encased in glass and works in glass grooves. The Developments of Wheat. Statisticians say that in sixteen years from one kernel of wheat no less than 76,886,718,750 bushels could be raised. The first year the single kernel would produce some twenty heads, say three hundred grains of wheat after the inferior ones had been thrown away. The next three hundred grains tieth of an acre. The next year a twen-tieth of an acre would be planted, yielding two bushels of good seed wheat. These two bushels would be sufficient to seed two acres of ground.
Allowing that they would yield but
fifteen bushels of good kernels that fifteen bushels of good kernels that year, at the spring-time of the fifth year there would be enough grain produce a harvest of four hundred and fifty bushels. The next year the in crease would be fifteen-fold, and that point on the ratio is one of eno mous progression, reaching nearly eighty billion of bushels at the end of the sixteenth year.

Since the cities of this country have begun to give attention to the matter of street cleanliness the resulting benefits have been so striking that the movement has received an impetus that nothing can check. Clean streets mean a low mortality rate, and no other recommendation is of so great advantage to a city. One of the first requirements. to enable a city to be clean in respect to its streets is smooth pavements.
