To the Voters of Young County.

We beg to submit for the consideration of the people of Young county the following facts in reply to the circular recently issued by a few of our citizens, wherein they seek to show that our county has not been benefitted by the adoption of local option.

This circular begins with the alarming statement that the adoption of this measure has cost our county \$2,307.65, but unfortunately for its promulgators they have attached an itemized statement of these expenditures which shows that not one should or could be legitimately charged against this measure and that they have undertaken to impose upon the people with a false statement of facts.]

Item No. 1 charges the sum of \$1800.00 as a loss to our county, this being the amount of occupation tax which would have been paid had the saloons been permitted to run. Every well posted school boy in this county knowns that had this amount been collected that the county would have received only \$600.00, out of which the sheriff would be entitled to \$30.00, leaving the net sum of \$570.00 received by the county to compensate us for the ruin and degradation of our boys.

Item No. 2 of \$152.00 is the expense for holding the election. Any fair-minded man will readily admit that this is an unjust charge, inasmuch as it was an election participated in by both pro and anti.

Why not charge it to the anti? Item No. 3 charges local option with \$223.40, the expense of the grand jury at the last term of our District Court. The statute requires that a grand jury shall be organized by our District Court and at our last term it is true they made a dilligent search for the violators of the local option law, and only succeeded in finding 11 bills. This grand jury would have been organized and would have been an item of expense against this county, regardless of whether

we had such law in force or not. The grand jury is for the violators of law only. The County Attorney and Magistrate have examined six of the citizens who signed the above circular and all have testified before these officers that they do not know of a single case where intoxicademption bill was engrossed after ting liquors have been sold in this county, nor do they know of any being fought by land sharps and one having committed perjury, and these witnesses have signally failed to establish a wicked dive where intoxicating liquors can be

obtained by boys. With reference to our former statement as to the number of cases upon our County Docket, a reference to this docket will show that out of twenty cases tried, fifteen were convicted and five acquitted and not nine, as contended by the opposition.


