### Westward Bound.

Westward the star of empire takes its way!

The United States have just pushed their Western outposts about 2400 miles beyond San Francisco towards Asia, and the fact is doubtless to exert a wonerful influence on the future policies of this country.

The vote in both the senate and house on the resolutions annexing Hawaiian Islands showed an overhelming sentiment in congress in favor of the extension of our territory. Whether this same majority will be found indorsing still futher expansion, can not now be said, but it is more than probable that it would respond to a call for unfurling our flag in permanent dominion over any other islands the administration might take a fancy to absorb.

The first step, at any rate, has been taken in our territorial posnessions beyond the boundaries of the United States proper. Where the march will stop only the future can tell.

In view of the fact that Hawaii is now virtually a part of the great American Republic it is interesting to speculate as to some of the immediate results and inquire into the extent and character of our new possessions. There are fifteen islands in the Hawaiian group, with a combined area slightly larger than that of Contotal population being 109,000. Some 40,000 of the inhabitants are natives, 40,000 more are Chinese and Japanese, about 15,000 or 20,-000 are Portuguese, while the whites number possibly 10,000. French Liner Bourgogne Sunk in a Collision With the Cromartyshire.

OVER FIVE HUNDRED LIVES LOST.

A Chapter of Horrors Related in the Struggle for Self-Preservation.

Halifax, N. ADMIRAL CERVERA CAST DOWN.

Feels His Misfortune and Appears as if Broken-Hearted.

Portsmouth, N. H. July 10 .- The auxiliary cruiser St. Louis with 746 Spanish prisoners, including 54 officers, dropped anchor in Portsmouth harbor this morning. Including the prisoners there were 1036 people on the boat and out of this number there were 91 one sick and wounded Spanlards under the care of surgeons.

Admiral Cervera is confined to his Washington, July 11 .- The war cabin, having been quite ill for the past three days, although he was able to be dressed this morning.

Capt. Eulate, who was commander July 10 .- Adjutant general, of the Vizcaya, is among the prisoners and is also quite ill, having been wounded in the head during the San-

tiago battle. The health officer made an examination of the vessel, visited the sick and found that most of the sickness was due to wounds or from exposure. He says there is no evidence of yellow

fever or other contagious diseases. All of the Spanish commissioned officers have been on parole and had the freedom of the ship with one exception, and he was the governor of Santiago de Cuba, who was trying to escape from the city on Admiral Cervera's flagship when she was destroyed on that memorable day of July 3. He refused to sign the parole papers and was consequently confined in one of the cabins under guard.

The remainder of the prisoners were confined between decks and closely

Admiral Cervera remained in his cabin during the trip. He shook hands with the health officer and in good English said he was situated very pleasantly on the boat and had received nothing but the kindnest and most cordial treatment from both officers and men ever since he had been taken prisoner. He had not been feeling well for the past three or four days, but expected to be all right in a short time. He presents the appearance of a broken-hearted man and keenly feels the loss of his fleet containing the pick of the Spanish navy.

No one is allowed on board the prison ship and none of the officers or crew are allowed on shore.

Admiral Cervera came on deck and consented to talk with representatives of the press. "You ask me," he said, "how I like

America, and I answer you that I have always liked, and I may say, loved your people, but this war has been a duty with me and the men under me. I knew that the American fleet clearly outclassed us, but it was a question of fighting either inside or outside the harbor. I have many friends in America and have only the kindliest feelings for them, but every man has a duty to perform to his country, and all Spaniards tried to perform that duty. There has been much feeling in Spain, and I want all Spain to know the truth, that every ship of my squadron fought until the last and when we could do no more we surrendered." He said he received three cablegrams from the minister of marine at Madrid ordering him to leave Santiago. Knowing the force he would have to encounter, he felt convinced that obedience to these orders would spell "suicide" to the imprisoned fleet that faced it. Then came another dispatch. a peremptory one, that left no choice but to obey. It said: "No matter what the consequences are, go to sea at once and fight the enemy.

"So I went out," the admiral said. "and my plan was to attack your Brooklyn, sink or disable it if possible, then run to Havana raise the blockade there and seek refuge in the harbor: but I failed in my purpose, as you know, and lost all I had, my fleet and everything.
