The Indiana steamed in this morning about 7 o'clock with about 900 of the 'boys in blue' all right side up with care. am getting along all O. 

THAT FLAG RAISING

The Incident Worth All the Blood and Treasure it Cost.

In describing the hoisting of the stars and stripes over the governor's palace at Santiago, a telegraphic correspondent says:

The ceremony of hoisting the Stars and Stripes was worth all the blood and treasure it cost. A vast concourse of 10,000 people witnessed the stirring and thrilling scene, that will live forever in the minds of all the Americans present. A finer stage setting for a dramatic episode it would be difficult to imagine. The Palace, a picturesque old dwelling, in the Moorish style of architecture, faces the Plaza de la Reina, the principal public

square. Opposite, rises the imposing Catholic cathedral. On one side is a quaint, brilliantly painted building, with broad verandas-the elub of San Carlos; on the other side a building of much the same description is the Cafe de la Venus.

Across the plaza was drawn up the Ninth Infantry, headed by the Fifth Catalry band. In the street facing the Palace stood picked troops of the Second Cavalry, with drawn sabers; under command of Captain Brett. Massed on the stone flagging between the band and the line of horsemen were the brigade commanders of General Shafter's division, with their staffs.

On the red-tiled roof of the Palace stood Captain McKittrick. Lieutenant Miley and Lieutenant Immediately above Wheeler. them, upon the flagstaff, the illuminated Spanish arms and the le-

All about, pressing against the veranda rails, crowding to windows and doors and lining the roofs, were the people of the town, principally women and noncombatants. As the chimes of the old Cathedral rang out the hour 12 the infantry and cavalry presented arms. Every American uncovered, and Captain McKittrick hoisted the Stars and Stripes. As the brilliant folds unfurled in a gentle breeze against a fleckless sky, the cavalry band broke into the strains of "The Star Spangled Banner." and the American heart throb

At the same instant the sound of the distant booming of Captain Capron's battery, firing a salute of 21 guns, drifted in. When the music ceased, from all directions around our line came floating acrass the plaza the strain of the regimental bands and the muffled, hoarse cheers of our troops.

The infantry came to "order arms" a moment later, after the flag was up, and the band played "Rally Round the Flag, Boys." Instanlly General McKibbon called for three cheers for General Shafter, which was given with great enthusiam, the band playing Sonsa's "The Stars and Stripes Forever."

The ceremoney over, General Shafter and his staff returned to the American lines, leaving the city in the possession of the municipal authorities, subject to the control of General Mc Kibbon.

Interesting Comparison.

In the battle of Manila and Sanago, there must be astonishment when the world notes the relative strength of opposing fleets and contrasts the results.

In the former battle the Spanish force consisted of twelve ships and a compliment of 1,948 men, and the American fleet was composed of seven ships, and 1,708 men. The Spanish loss was twelve ships, two forts, 424 killed and 210 wounded; we sustained no loss in ships or men, only six wounded.

At Santiago the Spanish force consisted of six ships with the support of shore batteries, and a complement of 2,250 men; American force, of seven ships and 3,336 men.

The Spanish loss was 450 in killed and wounded and 1,800 prisoners; our loss, one killed and two wounded.

Surely these contrasts are with out a parallel in the history o naval warfare, and can only be accounted for on the basis of superiority of vessels and marksmanship,
