ECHOES FROM WAR SEATS.

Japan Will Co operate With England and America in the Philippines.

AGUINALDO MUST BE CHECKED.

Rico---Yellow Fever.

London, July 26 .- A special dispatch from Shanghai says the Japanese warships Woshino, Chin Yen, Itsukushima and Sai Yen, have been hastily dispatched to Saesho to reinforce the Japanese squadron there, making it the strongest in those waters. It has been ordered to co-operate with British and American admirals in the event of international complieations.

While the dispatch does not explain the matter, it is inferred the squadron is desired to be in readiness for Philippine operations.

Instructions to Dewey.

Washington, July 26 .- The pub lic commendation of Admiral Dewey's power of diplomacy by the secretary of state in Secretary Long's official letter to the admiral is regarded here as of more than erdinary importance. It is taken as a proof that matters are now in such shape that Admiral Dewey can be informed of the safety of this country from all complications growing out of the conditions at Manila. With all foreign troubles out of the way, Dewey will be able to turn his entire attention to the insurgent chief, Aguinaldo.

The administration has decided, so it is stated on the highest authority, that Admiral Dewey shall be directed to notify Aguinaldo that he must at once acknowledge the precedence of American control or take the consequences of a refusal. With the arrival of the third expedition within the next few days, Admiral Dewey will be in a position to enforce this ultimatum. The president expects that Manila will be in our possession by the end of the present week, after which nothing will be left for Capt. Gen. Augusti but to surrender.

Bringing Their Wealth Home

Seattle, Wash., July 27 .- The steamer Charles Nelson has just arrived here from St. Michaels with 173 passengers from Dawson, bringing gold dust estimated all the way from \$1,000,000 to \$1,-500,000. Purser M. A. Tucker

"I believe that \$1,500,000 is a fair estimate. Of that amount I can vouch for \$600,000, which was turned over to me and placed in the steamer's safe.'

One man named Tucker had \$175,000 and another \$225,000, Prof. T. S. Lippy, his father and two brothers earried off the steamer nine canvas sacks which weighed about 100 pounds each. Charles Randall, ane of the old-timers, has \$40,000.

Other individual amounts range from \$1000 to 10,000, \$5000 being an average. About one-third of the passengers brought no gold. Some of them had gone in the spring and not liking the prospects. they sold their outfits and returned. Parties are arriving at St. Michaels every day from up the Yukon and the steamers from there will be crowded ta their full capacity.

And Still It Comes.

Seattle July 24 .- The Steam Roanoke has just arrived from St. Mchaels, with 240 passengers and between \$1,500,000 and \$2,000,000 of gold dust. Probably 50 per cent of the returning miners have fortunes averaging \$20,000 each.

The schooner Samoa has also arrived with 36 Klondikers and gold dust to value of \$490,000.

Joaquin Miller, the well known poet, who was among the returning miners, said :

"The Klondike mines are cer tainly the richest ever found on the face of the earth, but this gold is ten-feld harder to get than in any camp I have ever seen."

Dr. Folsetter Tells of the Epidemic Among Wharton County Horses.

Dr. William Folsetter of Dallas, probably the best known veterinarian in Texas, passed through Houston yesterday en route home from Wharton county, where he had been sent by Gov. Cnlberson at the instance of the State sanitary board to make an investigation of the many cases of charbon and cerebro spinal meningitis that were affecting the horses of that communiy. PROCLAMATION

OF TEXAS.

Whereas, the Twenty-fifth Legislature, at its regular blennial session, which convened on the 12th day of Juhusty. A. D. 1897, and adjourned on the 21st day of May. A. D. 1897, passed the following Joint Resolution, in the manner prescribed by the Constitution of this State, proposing the fellowing amendment to the Constitution of this State, to-wit:

Joint Resolution to amend Section 51, of Article 3, of the Constitution of the State of Texas, so as to authorize the grant of aid to disribled, and dependent Confederate soldiers and sailors, and their widows, and to grant aid to the establishment and maintenance of a home for said soldiers and sailors.

Section 1 Be it resolved by the Legislatof the State of Texas. That Section 51, of Article 3, of the Constitution of the State of Texas, be so amended as to hereafter read as follows:

Article 3.
