



THE PLATFORM.

Resolved, by the democrats of Texas in convention assembled, that we indorse in every particular the platform adopted by the national democratic convention at Chicago in 1896, but we especially commend and approve the declarations in favor of an income tax; against the power of banks to issue money; for a tariff for revenue that will operate without discrimination against classes or sections, and for the free and unlimited coinage of gold and silver at the ratio of 16 to 1, with full legal tender qualities and without reference to the action of other governments.

2. We denounce the republican party for the passage of the Dingley bill, which places the burden of tariff taxation upon those least able to bear it and which has resulted in a great deficit of reve-

3. GREAT COST OF THE WAR.

Total Cost Will Probably Reach One Billion Dollars.

Washington, Aug. 10 .- This Spanish affair of ours at an inside estimate will cost the United States \$900,000,000.

The expense may reach the even \$1,000,000,000 notch. The figures are based on the assumption that the volunteer army will be mustered out and paid off as soon as ent force is continued any length of time and the navy maintained at its present size the expense will be much heavier than the estimate

But as the finance expert who gave the figures said: "What is done concerning the army and subsequent to cutting off of hostilities can not properly be regarded as a Spanish war expense, even though the incentive and reason for altering the respective essablishments were the

results of war." The figures herewithin given were furnished by one of the auditing force of the treasury department. They are the sum totals of the various warrants daily drawn on the treasury. They represent eighteen or twenty bureaus and thousands of items. Here are the actual disbursements with the total for the first eight days of August in both departments, war and navy:

War \$81,480,366, navy \$40,750,-809; total both army and navy \$122,231,175. This statement be included largely in the August expenditures.

As to the general expenses payable in the future in addition to the foregoing the estimate furnished is as follows:

Expenses of the army and navy to date \$120,000,000, expenses probable before mustering out \$250,000,000, state expenses \$12,interest on war debt \$90,000,000, pensions (future) \$350,000,000, industrial losses (soldiers' labor) \$75,000,000; total \$927,000,000.

It might be proper to deduct from the four months' expenses of the army and navy of this year the cost of maintaining the regular establishments in time of peace. April, May, June and July of last year show a cost of cost of \$33 .-766,000 for the two branches of of this year for the months of hostilities \$88,500,000 in round numbers.

In the matter of casualties the United States fared well.
