Shells of Light.

A new illuminating shell, a marine device, has been invented by Col. William J. Wilson, the acet ylene gas expert.

When this shell falls into the water, after being fired from a gun, it floats a quarter of its length above the surface and the water, entering small holes near the base, comes in contact with calcium carbide. Acetylene gas is generated, and is at once ignited by an electric spark. The electric current is automatically groduced when the shell strikes the water, the gas being ignited by its means.

The wide reaching possibilities of this device in merchant marine, life-saving corps and army and navy use will be readily recognized. The sea may be brilliantly illuminated at night by the employment of these projectiles. They may be thrown from a gun in the direction of an ene-

A Curious Find.

A squad of workman employed in constructing a large dry plock at Cherburg made a strange discovery a day or two ago. For some time they had used an enormous oak log as a sort of fulcrum in moving about the granite blocks. On Saturday this log suddenly burst open under an extraordinary pressure and to the amazement of the workman a stiff parchment fell out, together with a shower of gold coins. It was ascertained that the log had been originally part of the Galet fortification, and that at the time of the laying of the first stone thereof Louis Philippe had placed the document and coins in the log, according to the usual custom.-Paris Daily Messenger.

Desolation and Death Near Calvert and Brenham.

FOURTEEN BODIES RECOVERED.

Trains Get to Calvert Again--Terrible Dar the Vicinity of the City

Fourteen Bodies.

On Monday a train arrived at Calvert, the first one since the previous Wednesday.

The drowning of T. S. Dawson, a highly respected grocery merchant, makes the fourteenth victim of the flood's work reported up to the 4th. He lived near the Port Sullivan bridge, between the Little and Big Brazos rivers. in the driftwood floating down It seems he was trying to save the river. some livestock and was carried away by the current.

The plantation hands were carried in boats to places where food was obtainable.

Corn is generally considered a total loss, but the fate of cotton is as yet uncertain.

The waters began receding on Monday.

Mr. Attie Dever, who has the management of a logging camp in the swamp near Brenham, at the confluence of the Yegua, Oid river and the Brazos, arrived at that city Monday. He says the distress and destruction between Clay and Stone utterly defies all attempts at description. From farm after farm everything living has been swept away by the rethe number of cattle, horses and hogs. Chickens sought places of safetv in trees and on the seventh day they were starved out and fell from their perches. Hundreds of persons, white and colored, after all avenues of escape were shut off, took refuge in tall trees, which in some instances succumbed to the pitiless power of the water. Some of them remained in trees three days.

The Bernard river, near Richmond, was higher Sunday than it has been for over fifty years and large numbers of cattle have been drowned. A young man named John Sims was drowned.

A report from the detention camp near Little Elm, about sixteen miles from Denton, says four new cases of small-pox have developed there, making five cases in all. One patient, however, is nearly well.

The recent decision of the supreme court of Missouri upholding the insurance feature of the anti-trust law of that state, forcing about seventy insurance companies to withdraw from that commonwealth, may have an important bearing on the anti-trust cases now pending against the alleged insurance rating bureau at

The railroad commission is undecided in the matter of forcing the Houston and Texas Central Northern trains to make close connection at Hearne. Judge Reagan, it is reported, can find no authority under the commission law to make train [schedules, and matter is in statu quo.

Mirth at Manila.

Fireworks, balls, speeches and decorations everywhere, all nationalities participating, were the counties in central Texas, but the features of the Fourth of July farmers do not give these products celebration at Manila. All foreign vessels, including Spanish, floated with their own colors the stars and stripes. The Baltimore fired a national salute. What the Spanish papers termed the "fiestas of North America" were participated in by all nationalities. Filipino bands played American airs and several hundred Filipino. Spanish and Chinese children, each carrying an American flag, sang "America" in a curious mixture of dialects. Chaplain Knudsden of the Washington regiment read the Declaration of Independence. The river was ten miles wide Tuesday night and rose six inches. The horrors are known only to those who were in the waters.

Sylvian Blum of the firm of L. & H. Blum, Galveston, died at that city, aged 56 years. He was a native of the province of Alsace, Germany, and came to Texas before the civil war.

President McKinley spent the Fourth quietly at the white house.

A fire which broke out in the Memphis (Tenn.) Paper company's establishment destroyed that structure and the Gayoso hotel, adjoining, and during the conflagration ex-Fire Chief Cleary was fatally and Assistant Fire Chief Ryan seriously injured. The fire raged six hours. The property loss is about \$450,000. A colored man was killed.

Organization Wanted.

Navarro county is one of the best melon and vegetable raising as much attention as would be given if there was such an organization among producers as would enable them to get better ailroad rates than they can get as matters are now run. Plenty of melons and vegetables are raised in the county, but no one producer can gather enough of them at one time to fill a car so as to give him car load rates. As there is no organization among the farmers, and no set day for shipping, when, by a number making up a carload or more, they could get the lowest rates, the products are disposed of in the fields. A gentleman who gives much time and work to the raising of both vegetables and melons, stated that if there was a growers' association the business could be made much more remunerative than it is now, "and," said he, "I shall try by the time the next melon season comes to have such an association as is needed organized."

About Fencing Land.

The citizens of the Indian Territory have been very much har. assed and confused as to the amount of land they were entitled to fence as members of the different tribes of Indians. The Curtis bill provides:

That it shall be unlawful for any citizen of any one of said tribes to inclose or in any manner. by himself or through another, di_ rectly or indirectly, to hold possession of any greater amount of land or other property belonging to any such nation or tribe than that which would be his approximate share of the lands belonging to commanding officer at San Anto- such nation or tribe and that of sistless torrent. He says that the nio to place at his disposal for his wife and minor children as per allottment herein provided, wife and she witnessed it, but says and any person found in possession of lands or other property in excess of his share and that of his share or that of his family, as aforesaid, or having the same in any manner inclosed, after the expiration of nine months after the passage of this act, shall be deem-

ed guilty of a misdemeanor. Attorney Johnson of Ardmore district, in endeavoring to enforce above law, has had some of the most wealthy and prominent cattle men in the territory indicted, and this law will be thoroughly tested at the fall term of court. Attorney Johnson issued a statement that he will not prosecute any citizen for holding 500 acres of land or less.

New Telephone Exchange.

The Fort Worth Exchange building for the Southwestern Telegraph and Telephone company is now under great headway. Rapid progress is being is being made in the errection of the new structure. It is being built of red pressed brick with stone trimmings and will cost \$15,000. The dimensions are 45x65 feet. The basement will include a hall, waiting room, operators' room, manager's room, work shop, inspector's room and storage and heating.

The second floor will be devoted to an operating apparatus and battery room. Above the operating room will be the magazine room, which will contain locker, kitchen and dining-room and laboratories. The structure is lo. cated on Throckmorton at the head of Eighth street and will be completed probably by Aug. 1.

The blade is of the famous Toledo make and is a little longer than that of the American sword. It comes to a point as sharp as that of a needle. Near the hilt is engraved the Spanish coat of arms. Lime-Producing Stone.

George Figh, who has been en. gaged on several contracts for bricklaying at McKinney the past few months, has discovered that good lime can be made of the stone so plentifully found in the hills just east of McKinney. He will begin burning a kiln at once, and has arranged to burn several during the summer.

Mr. Figh, who is an experienced man at the business, says there is no use shipping lime in here when it abounds so plentifully at our very door. If his experiment proves successful it will open up an industry that will be worth many dollars to McKindey.

Prospective Railroad,

The people in Texas will be interested to learn of a new railroad being built. The stockholders and directors of the Red River and Southwestern railroad met at Henrietta a few days ago. W. B. Worsham was elected president, W. H. Featherstone, vice president and treasurer; E. B. Carver, secretary and general manager. Work will be commenced at once and the road will be pushed through Archer City to or near Abilene, where it will connect with the Texas and Pacific railroad. The road will run through the copper mining lands in Archer county and the rich coal fields and cattle regions in western

Road Improvement.

County Commissioner Dugan of Grayson county was asked at Denison by a gentleman:

"Why don't the county commissioners of this county consider the use of burned gumbo for improving the county roads?"

Said the commissioner: "I have thought of that several times. I see where the railroads are making a success of it, and if it is so much better for railroads than other ballast it ought to be the same for country roads. There is plenty of rock here to macadamize the country roads, but the trouble is that it would have to be hauled a long distance to get to some parts of the county. I believe that the time is not far distant in Grayson county when we will have a general movement for good roads. The legislature had up for consideration last ses] sion a blil that, in my opinion, would be very valuable for Texas. The bill provided for the working of all short-term state convicts on the county roads, the same as county convicts are now worked. This would increase the road forces in the counties and would be a valuable aid in making good roads.

"Where the roads are handy to stone it would be well to macadamize, but where it is too far to rock, as some portions of this county are, I believe it would be a good idea to burn gumbo or ballast. I believe it would make a fine, lasting road, and that in a little while Grayson county could and would have the finest roads

in the southwest. "I believe that if the county ever gets in shape to go to work to build good roads that the railroad companies would haul the rock to points remote from stone and would make no charge for it. I know it has been done sometimes and may be done again."

Rich Strike.

Great excitement has been created in the vicinity of Jarilla, N. M., by the discovery near there of rich placer gold deposits, the first strike of the kind in that vicinity on record. This find was made by W. B. Bates and J. A-Bruce, two well known prospectors, in a canyon close by the famous Nannie Baird mine.

Messrs. Bruce and Bates dug down to bed rock just as an experiment and to their astonishment gold dust and small nuggets were visible in the black sand to the naked eye. They scooped up a sackful of the sand, weighing about fifty pounds, and hastened to a spot where water could be had. The sand panned out gold to the value of about \$5 and they were consequently elated over their discovery.

The two prospectors arrived at El Paso and exhibited the dust and nuggets. It is said their find will cause a rush of prospectors to that region.

The spot where the rich finds were made is only fifty miles northeast of El Paso.

Dr. William Folsetter, state veterinarian, returned to Dallas from Jefferson and Orange counties, where he had been trying to prevent the spread of charbon among the livestock of that section. Dr. Folsetter says hundreds of animals have died and that the losses will aggregate thousands of dollars.

On the 22d inst. the Masons of McKinney intend laying the cornerstone of their new temple. It is to be conducted with impressive ceremonies and a large attendance from other cities is looked for.

Many Inquiries About the Mighty Common wealth, Particularly the Fish and Oyster Law,

Interested in Texas.

Mr. L. Seabrook of Port Lavaca, who has recently returned from a northwestern trip in the interest of immigration, has this to say:

"I found the capitalists and representative business men in the cities I visited at the north deeply interested in Texas. This was especially the case at Des Moines, the large and growing capital of the prosperous state of Iowa. intercourse with Texas is increasing constantly, and they not only know much of the state's vast undeveloped resources, but speak of her as a commonwealth occupying an initial position on the map and which will bear in the future the same relations to the great trans-Mississippi country that New York does to the northeast. The commerce of the large territory this side of the big river, they predict, will find an outlet through her borders to the foreign world and enrich her fully as much as the development of her own vast local resources. While I was in Iowa the Chicago papers were full of the cheap railroad lie school fund. rates to and from the Texas ports and were calling on the east-bound lines to protect the commerce of the Windy city. These in discuss these matters more toan our own people, and it is not strange that a good deal of capital from that section has lately been put into Texas investments. Most of the money now developing the east Texas rice fields comes, as is known, from Iowa

"While in Iowa I had many to inquire of me about the new Texas fish and oyster law-the law perfected at the late sitting of the legislature and which is considered by many competent to judge as the best in the Union on that subject. But who can find any Texas people talking about it and the advantages it affords for enterprise and investment? Texas has now a paid state commission and its duties are to protect those who put their means into oyster and fish culture, especially the former, for in the future we must raise our bivalves, as they do on the north Atlantic coast or go without them in the winter menths. The plan of depending on the supplies of nature -the great natural reefs of the coast-has about proved unsatisfactory. The law not only gives protection, but under it the state makes liberal donations of oystergrowing water, and it is not strange that our smart northern friends are catching on and will be in the field to obtain grants under the law. It must be remembered that a company can secure 640 acres of oyster waters and individuals as much as fifty acres. The water is passed upon by the state commission, who make headquarters at Port Lavaca, or one of his county deputies, and is marked and transferred, as in the case of land. Some Tax Figures.

The fact that several unorganized counties have recently paid handsome sums to counties to which they are attached occasions the giving of a little history and some figures about the tax business along this line which very few people have taken the trouble to examine into.

Since 1879 the comptroller has been the assessor and collector of taxes on lands owned by non-residents in unorganized counties.

The counties' taxes so collected by the comptroller formerly were deposited in the state treasury to the credit of the unorganized county, to be paid over to it upon its organization. AN ALASKAN ADVENTURE.

For some time, early in the present year, the belief prevailed at Washington that Lieut. Joseph P. Castner, of the Fourth United States infantry, was a member of a military exploring expedition in Alaska, had perished of cold and starvation.

With two private soldiers of the Fourteenth Infantry, Blich and Mc-Gregor by name, Mr. Castner left the commander of the main expedition, Capt. Glenn, near the Tanana river, in the summer of 1898, in an attempt to follow up the Volkmar river to the headwaters of Birch creek, and follow that stream down to Circle City. He found that the maps indicating the possibility of such a trip were grievously wrong.

He lost his mules in rafting them across the Tanana, or within a short time after this passage, but the three men went on afoot. They traveled one hundred miles over a country which was all mountains or marshes. They pressed on farther and farther, their provisions rapidly giving out and their clothes being torn from their backs by thorns. On Sept. 15 they found they had provisions for one day only, and then they attempted to find their way back.

Castner climbed a lofty hill, and saw only range after range of snow-capped mountains. The next morning the three breakfasted off their last scrap of bacon. "For several days," Mr. Castner says, "our rations had run so low that the privilege of licking the frying pan was one which we almost fought for. That afternoon I managed to shoot two small ducks. We ate them, bones and all.

"Next day we heard the howls of an old she-wolf across the canon. Looking up, we saw her standing in front of two half-grown cubs. She was howling to call the attention of a third, which was out of sight down the canon, but which presently came into view within easy

"One of the men fired and missed. He fired five times before he killed it, and each time the cub came closer out of sheer curiosity, till it fell dead fifty yards from the slayer. It had never seen a human being before. We got the skin off that wolf in double-quick time, and found the flesh delicious."

They hoped to live on little birds till they could get back to the carcass of the last mule they had killed. They built a raft, tearing up their last blankets for lashing lines, and launched out on the rapid mountain torrent called the Vekmar.

They shot rapids after rapids, getting soaked to the skin. Presently the raft was sucked under a log-jam; the three men clung to the logs for their lives, and their raft and everything on it was swept away. Their guns and ammunition and their shoes were gone. They could shoot no more game.

Barefooted and wet, they kept on their way, leaving tracks of blood on the snow, which had now, toward the end of September, begun to fall, By and by they reached the carcass of their lost mule, but wolves and carrion birds had picked its bones clean,

There were a few berries here and there, and on these the travelers lived for the next six days. "Here and there," says Lieut. Castner, "a cranberry-bush would be found, and around it we would gather for breakfast. The red seed-pods on the rose-bushes were plentiful, and I believe they saved our lives, for they were almost all we could find to eat. They had been bitten by the frost and had a sweet taste-at least, so it seemed to our famished stomachs."

At the end of the sixth day, when their feet were so sore that every step was torture, and when they were ready to lie down and die, they heard the sound of an axe. Seeking it, they found a party of Indians, who received them hospitably and fed them on moose-meat. In a few days they had recovered strength sufficient to enable them to start out again.

Eventually they reached-in November-the military post at Rampart, and they started with a dog-team on a thirteen-hundred-mile journey to Skagway. They arrived there Feb. 24, 1899.

Washington, June 29 .-- The expense of the war with Spain and our present war in the Philippines, as shown by official treasury figures which will be issued next month, have averaged during the past fisical year \$800,000 a day; or a total of \$283,000,000.

To this expense must be added a large increase in civil expenditures, which swells the grand total chargable to maintaining the army and navy establishments to more than \$300,000,000.

The direct war expenses have been for the fiscal year 1899:

War \$229,000,000. Navy, \$65,000,000.

Those same items in the year 1898 were:

War, \$92,000,000. Navy, \$59,000,000.

The total war and navy expend itures of 1898 and 1899 compare as follows:

1898-\$151,000,000. 1899-\$294,000,000.

To these excess expenditures for this fiscal year over 1898, in maintianing the army and navy establishment must be added \$23-000,000 of civil and miscellaneous expenditures of the government in excess of the same class

While the Doctors are Doubting

Scientists have discovered the germs of many diseases, but, unfortunately, not as yet the means of destruction of these germs.

At present the "culture" and not the destruction of the deadly bacteria seems to absorb their attention.
