Novel Temperence Scheme.

An interesting experiment in license reform is being made near Haslemer, Eng. The District Refreshment Association of which Sir Frederick Pollock is president has built an inn at Greyshott and laid out some two thousand pounds upon the premises. The idea is to conduct the place on lines which are a mild adaptation of the Gothenburg system. The bishop of Winchester has announced his approval of the project and last week, at the formal opening of the house, many notable persons were present. Professor Nettleship has interested himself in securing the land for the association. Mr. Bernard Shaw, the critic, has furnished the building with a small library, and Mr. Walker Crane, the artist, has undertaken to design gratuitously the sign of "The Fox and the Pelican" for the inn.

AFFECTING SCENE.

Commander Geo. W. Baird Presents Dewey With a Valuable Relic.

A FADED BLUE ADMIRAL'S ENSIGN

The Manila Hero Was So Greatly Affected by the Occurance that He Could Not Suppress Tears of Joy.

New York, Sept. 29 .- Commander George W. Baird, United States navy, who served with Farragut and Dewey in the west gulf squadron in 1861, called on Admiral Dewey yesterday. He unrolled a package which he had the Olympia and displayed a faded blue admiral's ensign, upon which were stitched the four white stars of an admiral.

"Admiral," he said, his voice trembling with emotion, "I wish navy of this country.

"That grand old admiral, whose name and memory we all so revere, first hoisted this ensign upon the good ship Hartford before New Orleans and afterward upon the Franklin, and since it came down from that masthead it has never been whipped by the wind nor worn by the elements.

"And you, the worthy successor of that great admiral, whose tactics you so successfully followed a short while ago, I deem the proper person for Farragut's mantle to fall upon."

FALL OF PORAC.

Details of the Event as Reported by Gen. Otis.

THE POSITION OF OUR ARMY.

The American Army Escaped with None Killer and Only Five Casualities-The Enemy Lost Twenty Killed.

Washington, Sept. 30 .- Otis reserday cabled the following report of the capture of Porac:

Lawton's troops at Calampit and San Fernando, where the concentration was taking place, were ordered to cover the country of Mexico, Guaga, Bacolor and Santa Rita. MacArthur was ordered to take his troops and clear the country west and in the vicinity of Porac, which he did, advancing on Porac at an early hour with the ninth infantry and thirty-sixth volunteers, capturing Porac and driving the enemy north. Wheaton at Angeles kept back the enemy on his north and moved the force westward. The result is a clearing of the country preparatory to future operations.

Our casualties at Porac were five wounded. Wheaton does not report any causalties. Captured one officer and several enlisted men. Some twenty of the enemy were killed, number wounded unknown.

THE HERO

Appreciates Honors Heapen Upon Him, but Says

THEY COME TOO LATE IN LIFE.

George Dewey, Jr., Son of the Grayhaired Hero Visits the Olympia, and the Meeting Is Most Pathetic,

New York, Sept. 27 .- The Olympia, flecked here and there with the rust of a long voyage, passed from the monotonous tossing of the open sea and dropped anchor inside Sandy Hook at

7:30 o'clock yesterday morning. George Dewey, Jr., went aboard in the afternoon. The meeting between father and son was affecting, and there were tears in the eyes of both men as they emerged from the admiral's cabin, where they had been left together.

Admirals Sampson and Philip paid official calls later and then a newspaper reporter was presented to Admiral Dewey.

"I hold, with Von Moltke," said Admiral Dewey, "that no man is known, even to his family, until after he is dead, and that people should not make their estimate of a man until then."

It was hard to realize that the kindly, tactful, modest gentleman who sat in the shadowy little room was the incarnate sea power of the western hemisphere, the world hero, the destroyer. The eyes that searched out the doomed Spanish fleet in the twilight of that eastern morning were full of a gentle mood.

"My honors, too, like Von Moltkes, have come late in life, and while I appreciate every kind word that is said, I feel the people should wait awhile before making me out to be too much of a hero. But I know what the American people are. In fact, the very day after the battle with Montejo's fleet, as we sat in the hot summer evening on the afterdeck, above the place where we are now sitting, I turned and said to the officers about me, 'Gentlemen, I believe we will hear from this. I believe the American people will think well of this. There is a novelty, a picturesqueness, a romance about the Philippines that will appeal to them, and there is completeness about our victory that will arouse enthusiasm,' and sure enough in a few days we heard from America and we saw that I had been very largely right."

Yellow Fever.

Jackson, Miss., Sept. 27 .- The vellow fever situation this morning does not look very encouraging. One new case was announced, the patient being Mrs. O. J. Waite, wife of the cashier of the First National bank. This is a total of three cases since yesterday afternoon. The doctors are greatly puzzled over the origin of the foci and no logical solution has yet been offered although there is slight evidence tracing them to the Porter infection of two weeks ago.

Discharged the Case.

Temple, Tex., Sept. County Health Officer Broiles Monday finally discharged the smallpox case at Echo. This was a negro laborer on the Missouri, Zansas & Texas railway, who contracted the disease in the Sedalia hospital. On the part of the prompt action of the authorities there was no spread, but with the utmost economy the matter cost the county \$70.

In spite of British rule, India is still virtually a soapless country. Throughout the villages of Hindustan soap is indeed regarded as a natural curiosity, and it is rarely, if ever, kept in stock by the native shopkeeper. In the towns it is now sold to a certain extent, but how small this is may be gathered from the fact that the total yearly consumption of soap in India is about 100,000 hundredweight-that is to say, every 2500 persons use on an average only 112 pounds of soap among them, or, in other words, considerably less than an ounce is the average consumption a person.

In consequence of the Morton be quest, the Moravians are about to extend their mission work by establish. ing new stations in South Africa, on the Mosquito coast, Nicaragua and in Labrador. It is expected that \$80,000 will be applied to this new work.



American Mules.

New Orleans, Sept. 27 .--- An order has come and Major Scobell, the ranking officer of the British army squad stationed at the St. Charles hotel received instructions from his government to purchase mules. "I am not at liberty to say how many we will buy," explained Major Scobell, "but the instructions call for thousands of mules." It is understood in St. Louis that first order calls for between 3000 and 5000 pack mules and the telegram further advises that the contract be closed to-day. The order to go ahead and buy these mules is perhaps the best key to the South African situation up to the present hour. It means that war is fully expected.

The scale upon which the Paris exposition is to be constructed is indicated in the fact that the catalogue will cost \$90,000 to print and will contain about 100,000 names. In competition with three firms as contestants the contract was awarded the Lemercier company at 435,000 francs, or about \$90,000. That of the exposition of 1889 cost about \$40,000, or less than half the amount to be paid for that setting forth the exhibits of the 1900 exposition. The catalogue will be printed in eighteen volumes, according to divisions of exhibits, and must contain the names of all exhibitors. Of the estimated 100,000 exhibitors the United States will probably have 2000, though that number could have been greatly increased had there been more space for exhibits.






