Football in France.

Football has conquered France and the Gallic desire for excitement finds vent among the students in the struggle for the ball. The Rugby game is played, and the association play that draws enormous crowds to the professional matches in England has no popularity in France.

In an article in La Revue Encyclepedie Larousse, which comments on the popularity of "balloon at pied," claim is made that the game is of French origin. It is claimed that William the Conquerar imported it from Brittany. The Breton peasants who flocked to England brought it with them, and in proof the French journal asserts that the game is still played in that part of France much as it was a thousand. years ago. The old Breton game bears slight resemblance, however, to the college game of today. It was and still is the custon for residents of rival villages to meet and dispute for the possession of a big ball. The contest was engaged in by hundreds of men on each side, and was much like the cane rush or bowl fight of the college students of today. large percentage of the players were wounded and many died in the fierce struggle for the possession for the

The writer in the French weekly asserts that the English, "less ardent and less warlike and of colder temperament," found the game too rough. So they modified it and made it less dangerous, and it flourished for centuries as the harmless kicking game of football, until the present generation of students introduced the running and fighting features that make the modern game. Thus modified it suits the French temperament.

With scores of football clubs in France, the time may not be distant when they will meet to settle the question of Anglo-Saxon or Latin superiority. It would be a better way than a war, and if every Frenchman's dream is, as was that of Athos, to kill an Englishman, they might have a chance.

Beat Reed at His Own Game.

Congressman John B. Corliss, giving his reminiscences of ex-Speaker Reed the other day, said: "I remember I reported a bill upon the election of senators by the people. But Mr. Reed didn't want the bill considered. I insisted. He refused to recognize me, and said if I wanted to insist upon bringing the bill before the house, in spite of him, that I knew how to do it, and I said I did know how to get it and I would. 

Her Scepter Eas Passed.

California's prestige as the banner gold-bearing state of the Union has been taken away. Its scepter as the queen of auriferous production has passed into the hands of a rival commonwealth.

The contest between California and Colorado has been officially decided by the figures of the director great exchanges, besides carefully of the mint. These credit the Centennial state with one-third of the entire gold output of the United States and 50 per cent more than California turned out in the last twelve months.

> In 1898 the gold product of Colorado was \$23,195,300, while that of California was but \$15,637,900. The respective yields of the two states in 1897 were \$19,104,200 for Colorado and only \$14,618,300 for California.

In the early days California yielded enormously from placer mining, but invention intensified and developed the methods of extracting mineral wealth of late years, and she fell behind. Although many California mines are steadily maintaining their output, nearly all the new strikes have been made in Colorado. From the newer mines are extracted a vast quantity of low-grade ores, and these ores are being discovered in greater abundance in Colorado than on the Pacific coast.

The Next Population Center.

Census experts estimate that the center of population will be found next year to be in Indiana, close to the Illinois line, at a point not far removed from the town of Vincennes. The last census showed the population center to be between Columbus, Ind., and Cincinnati. The increase in the population of Georgia, Texas, the Indian Territory, Oklahoma, New Mexico and Arizona during the last ten years has been sufficient, it is thought, to offset any increase in the Northwest and to possibly pull the center somewhat to the south of the 1890 parallel. The wealth center is thought to be in the neighborhood of Sandusky, Ohio.

Grace Church and Its Saloon.

Grace church, New York, has bought a bit of property on Fourth avenue, which contains a saloon. Rev. Dr. Huntington says the object is to extend the church buildings when need is, and not primarily to expel the saloon, which is held under a lease that continues for two years. and which, he adds, has never been a nuisance. For the present the saloonkeeper is tenant of Grace church, but that body will not, as Trinity. has done, maintain such leases when the time comes that it can get rid of them. Dr. Huntington does not even believe in the regulated church saloon, which Dr. Rainsford has advocated.

Only Seems So.



The Teachers' Institute.


