



## SPANISH PASSENGER STEAMER IS LOST

FATE OF CREW OF 150 AND 300 PASSENGERS HAS NOT BEEN ASCERTAINED.

Key West, Fla.-The Spanish passenger steamer Valbanera, bound from Spain to Havana and missing since the gulf hurricane, sank in 40 feet of water after going aground in quicksand at Half Moon Key. The fate of the passengers, said to number 300, and the crew has not been learned. In addition to the passengers, the steamer carried a crew of 150, it was said here. No trace of either passengers or crew has been found.

The Spanish steamer Valbanera arrived off Moro Castle, Havana, Sept. 9, but due to the tropical hurricane which swept these waters at that time was unable to enter port. She put to sea, and although wireless calls supposed to have come from the Valbanera have been reported, she has not been found. Cuban gunboats have been sent to search for her and it was vitality so much before the breeding suggested that seaplanes might go out from Key West on the same mission The steamer found in 40 feet of water in the quicksands, the United States coast guard vessel reported, appeared to be a 6.000-ton vessel. The missing spanish steamer was of 3,291 tons net. The Cuban consul on being informed of the find, however, employed divers to make an examination. on the theory that it might be the Valbanera. Divers said the name was clearly visible. Further investigations are expected to clear beyond all doubt the identity of the ship and possibly throw some light on the fate of the 450 persons aboard.

Governor Hobby took this action following information from civil authorities of their inability to cope with the situation.

#### BULGARIAN MISSION GETS PEACE TREATY

Representatives of Each of 27 Governments are Present at Ceremony.

Paris.-The treaty of peace between the allied and associated powers and Bulgaria has been presented to the

After the delegates had assembled Georges Clemenceau, president of the peace conference, spoke briefly in opening the session. M. Theodoroff, head of the Bulgarian mission. M. Thederoff spoke for fifteen minutes, pleading that the Bulgarian government/had not thrown the country into the struggle. TO RAISE HEALTHY CHICKENS

Lack of Vigor in Newly Hatched Chicks Is Often Traceable to Weakness of Parents.

(Prepared by the United States Depart ment of Agriculture.)

To be successful in raising chickens it is necessary to have healthy and vigorous breeding stock, for the lack of vigor in the newly hatched chicks is often traceable to weak parents. Only the most vigorous and the best grown birds should be put in the breeding yards. Each bird should be full of life and energy and free from any serious deformity. Yearling hens are usually better than pullets for breeders, for the reason that the hens are more mature and do not lay so many eggs during the early winter, and consequently do not reduce their season. Vigorous hens 2 to 4 years old can often be advantageously retained in the breeding yard. The male bird chosen should be young and active. An early hatched, well-devel-

eped cockerel is usually satisfactory. or a good vigorous yearling or 2-yearold cock may be chosen. The hens used for breeding purposes should be given the best care possible; they should be provided with large runs, and should not be forced for heavy egg production during the early win-

#### DIPPING CHICKENS FOR LICE

Dipping Cattle Because Pest ts More Numerous.

(Prepared by the United States Depart-

ment of Agriculture.) "Dip that chick!" It isn't done just for the sake of making a rhyme for "dip that tick," either. Dipping chickens is likely to become more general than dipping cattle, because the chicken louse is a more widely distributed insect than the cattle tick. The "dip" consists of 1 ounce of sodium fluoride to the gallon of water, which should be at a temperature of 70 to 85 degrees. The dipping should be done on a clear, warm day-never on a cold day. The old way of getting rld of chicken lice was by dusting with dry sodium fluoride. It was effective, but in the case of large flocks it was slow and wasteful, a great deal of the dusting material being inevitably lost. Recent dipping experiments proved successful, and the results promise a sure and speedy means of getting rid of one of the worst pests of poultry.





SKILL, SYSTEM AND GOOD ROADS

Texas counties are providing means for a system of highways unsurpassed by any State in the Union. That is to say, Texas' system of highways will in the near future be unsurpassed by those of any sister State. provided they are laid out with wisdom and supervised by engineering and road building capacity of the first class.

Texas has had none too much experience in highway construction, but it has had enough to demonstrate beyond all question that highways that are built with due regard to engineering supervision are almost worse than no highways at all. Many counties have heretofore voted road bonds well into the millions and laid out and constructed many miles of public highways. In almost every instance provision for an adequate maintenance fund and a systematic application of the same, has been neglected. This has resulted inevitably in the deterioration of the highways and, in some instances, to their utter undoing.

The lesson has been taught, if it has not been learned, that it would be a criminal waste of public money and public effort to continue the old haphazord highway system. From all this it may be asserted with verfty that the State Highway Department has the chance to put the entire State in its eternal debt if it will but meet these responsibilities with courage and wisdom.

Competent engineers can be had if the work they are called upon to execute is made attractive to them by means of adequate compensation, and in no other way. What other States have accomplished in road building, notably California, can be accomplished by Texas. The bulletin re-Commission ery clearly indicates that the department proposes to construct all highways under its supervision by means of well laid out plans and specifications and by recourse to skilled engineers and supervision. 

### STATE TROOPS CHARGE STRIKING STEEL MEN

SEVERAL INJURED WHEN MASS MEETING IS DISPERSED BY STATE FORCES.

#### **GATHERINGS ARE FORBIDDEN**

Barbed Wire Strung Around Plants Searchlights Provided and Deputies Begin Patrol.

Pittsburgh, Pa. - Clashes between Pennsylvania state police and crowds bent on holding labor mass meetings and 30. in the Pittsburgh district Sunday ushered in the strike in the iron and steel industry. The most serious disturbances occurred at North Clairton, 20 miles from Pittsburgh, where the state troopers charged a crowd of union men holding a mass meeting and breke it up. Resistance was offered and it is charged by the union leaders that the mounted policemen used their clubs vigorously and injured a number in the crowd. Nineteen persons were arrested, some of whom were brought to the county jail. The meeting was broken up at the request of lacal authorities.

According to eye witnesses, the meeting was preceeding quietly when the state pouce brake it up. The erowd soattered and soon ran up a railroad embankment and threw stones and other missiles at the treepers. During the melee several in the crowd were struck on the head by the policemen, it was said. The crowd soen scattered and, as far as can be learned, no one was seriously injured.

Special barbed wire fences have been constructed about exposed property and searchlights have been installed. Deputy sheriffs are patrolling the company properties.







# DANGER OF WOOD FAMINE IS SEEN

Trees in Forests Must Be Replaced or Great Scarcity Will Result.

#### MILLS SMALL FACTOR

Pulp Mills Eat Up Many Millions of Spruce Every Year - Scientific Forestry Has Not Caught Up to Tree Slaughter.

Bangor, Me.-When the world gets through with its arguments about war, peace, the (or a) League of Nations and all that is expressed in the short and ugly word "rum," it should turn its most serious and intelligent attention to tree farming. Positively, there must be many more trees, or s the existing supply, or presently we shall suffer great inconvenience from the scarcity of many useful and some ornamental things. In the simple and innocent old times

a tree was just so much standing lumher, and lumber was cheap. Within the memory of men of middle age Desdemona sees a cloud of dust along first-class spruce logs sold in Bangor the sinuous road, and unconsciously at \$11 to \$14 per thousand feet. The men who cut the logs were paid \$18 to \$20 a month and board, the board consisting chiefly of a bunk to sleep in and "beans twenty-one times a Instead of the laboriously moving week," The men who "drove" the same logs, that is, personally con-\$3 a day, according to their athletic skill and their fame as "white water men," and of course all hands were fed, although the menu was characterized by monotonous simplicity and the service subject to many irregu-larities and postponements. These same logs were sawed in mills that ornamented the banks of the Penobscot for fifty miles or more, chiefly between Milford and Banger, a distance of about fifteen miles. The mill hands went to work very early in the morning and kept at it until long after everyone else had quit for the day, being rewarded to the extent of about \$30 a month and all the corned beef, cabbage, etc., they could eat in twenty to thirty minutes, three or four times a day, according to sea-

In dull times lumber was carried from Bangor to Boston as cheaply as \$1.25 to \$1.50 per thousand, to Long Island sound ports at \$1.75 to \$2, and to New

York at \$2 to \$2.25. Now everything is changed. Of Maine's normal log cut of 1,000,000,-000 feet, at least 60 per cent goes into pulp and paper. The native logger, who swung a sharp ax skillfully at \$18 to \$20 a month and was content to live on baked beans and salted fish, has been succeeded by a polyglot mob that uses saws languidly at \$50, to \$60 a month, demands hotel fare, frequent payments, polite treatment and every few weeks a vacation. The logs for the most part, are cut into four-foot lengths, and they go to the big pulp and paper mills owned by corporations that long ago bought up hundreds of thousands of acres of the best timber in Maine. Logging used to begin in November and end in March. Now it goes on at all seasons.

Saw Mills Small Factor. The saw mill is a small factor in the great game of turning Maine forests. into money. The long logger, that is, he who cuts for sawmills. is almost extinct. The big sawmill drives are seen no more. This is the day of the "four-foot stuff" which makes up most of the drives and gives business to the railroads. The pulp mills eat up so many millions of feet of spruce that speculative and statistical persons wonder where it all comes from and how long the supply will last. So far as Maine is concerned there need be no fear of a wood famine very soon, but at the present rate of cutting there is bound to be a scarcity in the United States within a few years that will send prices


