Texas News

The bond election in Austin County was defeated by a small margin.

The pecan crop around Smithville is the largest in a number of years and the nuts are now beginning to be brought in and are bringing a good

A permit to do business in Texas has been granted tle Guffey-Gillespie Oil Company of Wilmington, Del., capital stock \$52,090,000, with headquarters at Austin.

The Texas railroad commission has formally fixed the valuation of the Sugarland Railroad at \$638,746. This is a short line operating from Sugarland, on the Southern Pacific, into the sugar plantations.

The department of marketing has succeeded in filling an order from France for 5.000,000 bushels of oats, most of this having been shipped from a part of the order.

F. C. Weinert, chairman of the drouth relief committee, is returning to those who are paying the notes due the fund all interest. The notes were originally made out bearing interest, but it was afterward determined that this was not fair and no interest is being collected.

Cost of building Dallas County's road system will be almost prohibitive on the basis of bids submitted. County Judge Simpson says. The commissioners rejected the first of a series of bids for the proposed \$6,500,000 road system. The bid was 25 per cent higher than the engineer's estimate.

It was decided to take steps to urge the legislation to appoint a state board for the equalization of taxes at the next session, at the annual meeting of the Tax Equalization Association held in San Antonio. A board of directors, consisting of 13 leading citizens of San Antonio, was appointed, and \$5000 appropriated for immediate expenses. Organizers will be sent out through the state to further the cause and interest other counties in the movement.

The remaining stock of spring wool held in storage at Mertson by the West Texas Wool and Mohair Association has been sold to H. F. Roddle of Brady. Four hundred thousand pounds changed hands at a price that approximated \$250,000. The Merton warehouse has so far during 1919 disposed of more than, 1,000,000 pounds of wool, and the prospects for the spring clip are regarded as so good that it is expected that 2,000,000 sunds will be handled in 1920.

The logical consequences of the "fee system," in its relation to the new game laws, effective Oct. 22, in the state of Texas, were outlined this week by T. R. Legett, deputy oyster, fish and game warden, at Galveston, as follows: "A fact that may not be generally known," said Mr. Legett, "is that any peace officer, from a sheriff down to a town marshal, is authorized to demand that he be shown the ifcense of a hunter encountered in the field, and that such peace officer, under the "fee system," is allowed the sum of \$10 for every arrest be makes under the new laws."

It was announced this week by the industrial welfare commission that the initial session will be held in Houston. Oct. 22 to 25, inclusive, for the purpost of taking testimony, of all persons interested in the working conditions and wages paid women and minors by mercantile establishments, factories, laundries and telephone companies. The initial session was to have been held in Dallas, but it was postponed to a date in November yet to be fixed. Hearings will be held generally over the state: Only the um wage is considered.





Washington. - Deadlocked in the committee of fifteen, or the "steering committee." over labor's proposal to arbitrate the steel strike, has brought about adjournment of the National Industrial conference until Tuesday. In the meantime the "steering committee" will hold a meeting in an attempt to agree on a report to lay before the conference when it reassembles.

Adjournment came after the conference bad received the proposals of the employers' group declaring for the principle of the open shop and affirming that "no employer should be reguired to deal with men or groups of men who are not his employes or chosen by or from among them."

The latter principle created quite a stir in the conference and was considered by some of the delegates as approval of the stand taken by Judge Elbert H. Gary, chairman of the United Steel corporation, in refusing to meet the steel strikers,

TREATY RESERVATIONS SUPPORTED BY WALSH

Vice President Promptly Puts Stop to Demonstration in Senate Galleries.

Washington.-A quick, barking command from Vice President Marshal at the conclusion of a dramatic appeal by Senator Walsh (Dem.) of Massachusetts, for a league of nations that would do justice to the oppressed nations of the world, and for reservations to the pending league covenant, broke up in its very beginning a demonstration that threatened for a moment to sweep through the senate

For more than an hour senators and visitors had listened intently to the address, and as Senator Walsh laid down the last page of his manuscript and with arms raised high pleaded against approval for the Shantung settlement, and the "dangers lurking in Art. 10 of the league covenant, a faint ripple of applause was instantly followed by a more pronounced outburst.

LIPTON CHALLENGES AMERICA TO DEFEND YACHT RACING CUP

Famous English Sportsman Will Make Fourth Attempt Next Year.

New York .- Sir Thomas Lipton, in behalf of the Royal Ulster yacht club. has again challenged the New York yacht club to defend America's cup, it is officially announced. The challenge is expected to be accepted and

a race arranged for next year. The Irish sportsman named the Shamrock IV as the challenger. She left for this country under her own sail in July, 1914, but was forced to put into Bermuda when war was declared. Later she was brought to New York, dismantled and placed in dry dock in the Erie Basin. The defender is expected to be the Resolute.

Wreckage of Balloon Picked Up. St. Louis, Mo .- The wreckage of the balloon "Wichita" in which Capt. Carl W. Dammann and Lieutenant Edward J. Verhayden Jr., St. Louislans, left here in the national championship race Oct. 1, was picked up Oct. 4 in Lake Huron, according to a telegrom received by officials of the race here. No trace of the two balloonists was found, the message amplified.

Americans at Trau Prevented Fighting Washington. - Intervention by the American naval forces at Trau, Dalmatia, prevented bloodshed "which would perhaps have resulted in a state of actual war between Italy and Jugo Slavia," according to a report from Admiral Knapp, commanding American naval forces in European waters, transmitted to the senate by Secretary Daniels.

Germans Are Marching on Riga. London.-The Germans are march ng on Riga, according to a dispatch to the Daily Mail from its helsingfers, Finland correspondent, dated on Thursday.

Great Britain Completes Ratification. London.-King George has completed Great Britain's ratification of the German peace treaty. The document ratified by him has been dispatched to Paris.

Suit to Test War Time Dry Law. Louisville, Ky .- Suit to test the constitutionality of the war time prohibition law has been filed in federal district court here by Attorney Levi Mayer of Chicago and Marshall Bullitt of Louisville



MAKE PROFITABLE SIDE LINE

Success May Be Attained With Pigcons by Careful Attention to Many Little Details.

(Prepared by the United States Department of Agriculture.)

Many people can keep pigeons successfully as a side issue, although this requires constant oversight and careful attention to details. The greatest difficulties confronting the successful raiser of pigeons seem to be in securing good breeding stock, and finding a market for the produce of a small flock. Pigeons are a profitable source of income on general farms where they may secure much of their feed from the fields, provided they are not a nuisance and the loss by shooting and by hawks, owls and cats is not large. They can also be raised successfully on farms where they are closely confined, provided the squabs can be marketed to good advantage.

Of the squab-raising varieties the Homer is considered the most popular variety. The habit of this bird of returning home if allowed freedom makes ed from other lofts. The Carneaux stated is about as prolific. Several other varieties of pigeons larger than the Homer are used on a small scale in squab raising, especially in crossing with the Homer and Carneaux, to increase the size of squabs. The Runt

BIG RETURNS FROM POULTRY

Arizona Farmer Made Profit of Nearly \$300 From Small Flock in Short Space of Time,

(Prepared by the United States Depart-

A net return of nearly \$300 in two and one-half months from a side line on the farm is the record made by a Glendale, Ariz., farmer who is carrying on his operations under the direction of a poultry extension expert of the United States department of agriculture. In connection with his genera! farm work he kept a flock of 210 hens, which produced an average of ten dozen eggs during the four winter months. During February the eggs brought an average of 55 cents. a dozen, or approximately \$150, while the feed bill, including the feed for the young chicks, amounted to \$50. The following month the flock showed a profit of a little over \$100. During the first half of April the gross receipts were \$97.50. In April the extension specialist conducted a culling demonstration on this farm and weeded 56 hens from the flock. The culled hens were kept in a separate pen for a week following the demonstration, and made practically no returns in egg yields. This indicates, the specialist says, that the remaining 154 hens probably made the record with which the entire 210 had been credited.

To rid the house of disease germs and vermin drive cut the fowls, close the house tightly and burn sulphur in it until the entire house is full of blue fumes. Let it remain closed an hour and then air it thoroughly before the fowls return.





COTTON DELEGATES **NOW IN CONFERENCE**

TWO THOUSAND EXPECTED TO ATTEND FOUR DAY GATHER-

Specialists From All Quarters to Devise Improvements for Handling and Marketing.

New Orleans, La.—The case of King Cotton will be discussed from every. angle and standpoint by experts and specialists of this country and Europe who are gathered here attending a four-day conference. Two thousand. delegates are expected, of whom several hundred are from Europe.

Classes into which the delegates will be divided to constitute the sectional meeting are cotton growers. ginners, seed products, merchants, transportation and insurance men, bankers, spinners and manufacturers, foreign and domestic textile merchants.

Texas as well as every other cottongrowing state is well represented. Governor Hobby of Texas is on the program as chairman of the second general session of the conference.

The object of the conference is to devise means to generally improve the methods of handling cotton, to pre vent waste and to see that hereafter the producer receives a just reward for his toil so that the production of cotton shall never again be placed on an unprofitable basis. An effort will be made to stabilize the cotton market so that the producer and manufacturer may not have to occupy a speculative. position in their particular line. To this end a warehousing scheme may be adopted that will require the investment of millions.

Pastors Want Sundays Off Hereafter.

Dallas. - Undertakers, cemetery workers and members of the Dallas Pastors association have agreed to abandon the practice of holding funerals on Sunday in so far as it is possible consistent with public health.

"At a meeting of the General Pastors' association Hood F. Smith, representing the undertakers and the cemetery companies, appeared and made the following statement of facts,





As far back as the first winter of the war, the Red Cross sent to Serbla a sanitary-commission that effectivey checked the scourge of typhus, but after the United States entered the conflict, the Red Cross was able, in August, 1917, to send a full commission that carried on extensive relief operations among the suffering refugees of the tortured nation, Rospitals were established, the refugees fed, clothed and given medical attention, the army supplied with much needed dental treatment, farm machinery, and seeds provided to help the Serbs redeem their land to productivity, and, not least, measures undertaken for the succor of the children. The terrible condition into which these helpless victims of the war had fallen is well portrayed by this photograph of a little Serbian girl wearing the rags and expression of hopeless dismay that were all she possessed when the Red Cross came.
