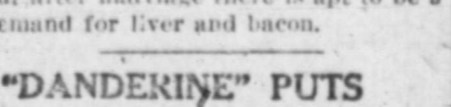

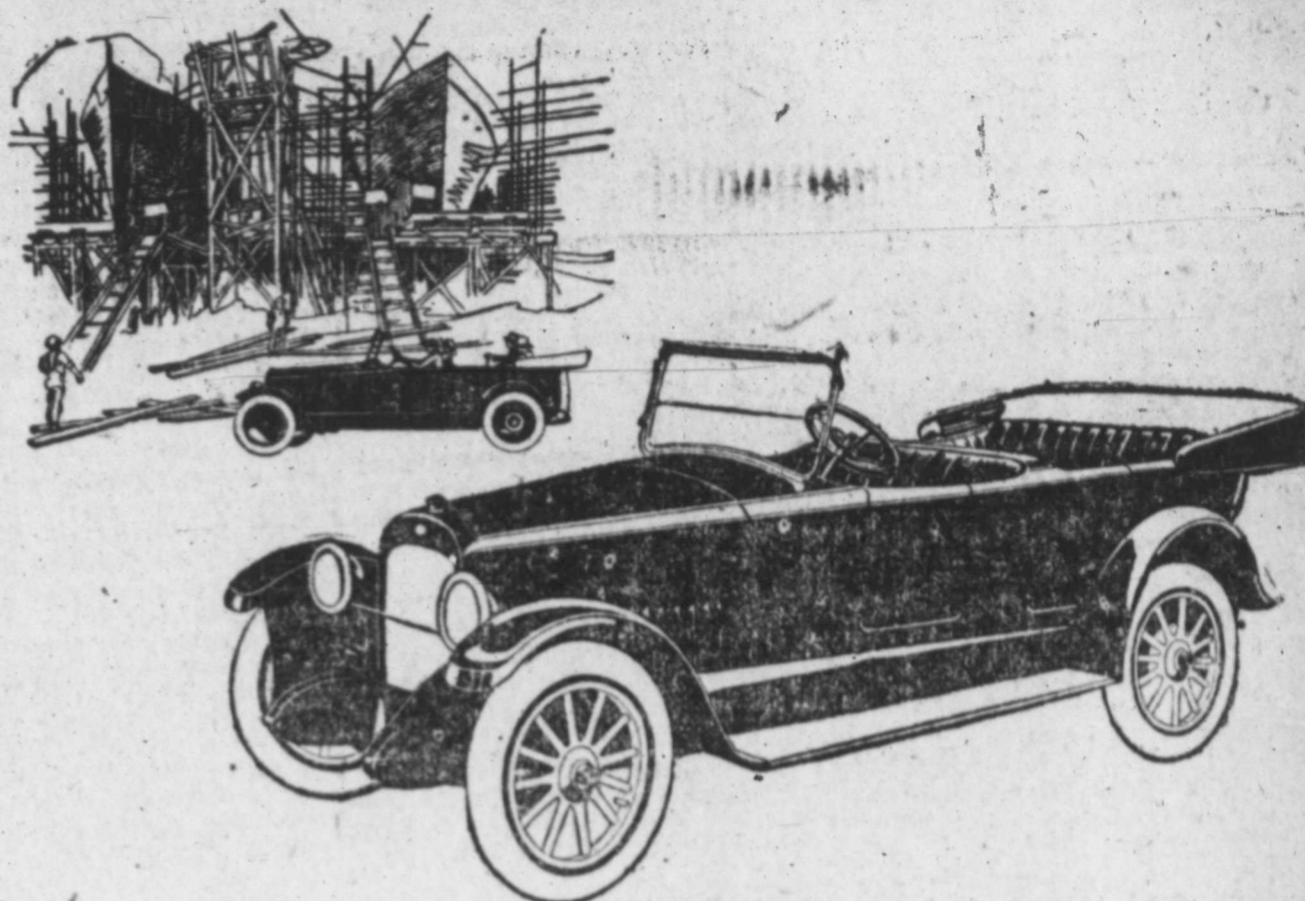

TO "CONQUER AND DESTROY STATE," U. S. COMMUNISTS CALL FOR LABOR REVOLT

Revolutionary Pamphlet, Found in U. S. Department of Justice Investigations, Gives Message of Communists in Chicago to Russian Headquarters.

Extracts from "Manifesto and Program—Constitution—Report to the Communist International" by the Communist Party of America, Chicago, Ill.

Communism does not propose to 'capture' the bourgeois parliamentary state, but to conquer and destroy it. As long as the bourgeois state prevails, the capitalist class can baffle the will of the proletariat.

In those countries in which historical development has furnished the opportunity, the working class has utilized the regime of political democracy for its organization against Capitalism.

The older unionism was based on the craft divisions of small industry. The unions consisted primarily of skilled workers whose skill is itself a form of property. The unions were not organs of the militant class struggle. Today the dominant unionism is actually a bulwark of Capitalism, merging in Imperialism and accepting State Capitalism.

The proletarian revolution comes at the moment of crisis in Capitalism, of a collapse of the old order. Under the impulse of the crisis, the proletariat acts for the conquest of power, by means of mass action. Mass action concentrates and mobilizes the forces of the proletariat, organized and unorganized; it acts equally against the bourgeois state and the conservative organizations of the working class. Strikes of protest develop into general political strikes and then into revolutionary mass action for the conquest of the power of the state. Mass action becomes political in purpose while extra-parliamentary in form; it is equally a process of revolution and the revolution itself in operation.

The Communist Party is the conscious expression of the class struggle of the workers against capitalism. Its aim is to direct this struggle to the conquest of political power, the overthrow of capitalism and the destruction of the bourgeois state.

The Communist Party prepares itself for the revolution in the measure that it develops a program of immediate action, expressing the mass struggles of the proletariat. These struggles must be inspired with revolutionary spirit and purposes.

The Communist Party is fundamentally a party of action. It brings to the workers a consciousness of their oppression, of the impossibility of improving their conditions under capitalism. The Communist Party directs the workers' struggle against capitalism, developing fuller forms and purposes in this struggle, culminating in the mass action of the revolution.

The Communist Party shall make the great industrial struggles of the working class its major campaigns, in order to develop an understanding of the strike in relation to the overthrow of capitalism.

(a) The Communist Party shall participate in mass strikes, not only to achieve the immediate purposes of the strike, but to develop the revolutionary implications of the mass strike.

(b) Mass strikes are vital factors in the process out of which develops the workers' understanding and action for the conquest of power.

(c) In mass strikes under conditions of concentrated capitalism there is latent the tendency toward the general mass strike, which takes on a political character and manifests the impulse toward proletarian dictatorship.

In these general mass strikes the Communist Party shall emphasize the necessity of maintaining industry and the taking over of social functions usually discharged by the capitalists and the institutions of capitalism. The strike must cease being isolated and passive; it must become positive, general and aggressive, preparing the workers for the complete assumption of industrial and social control.

(a) Every local and district organization of the Party shall establish contact with industrial units in its territory, the shops, mills and mines—and direct its agitation accordingly.

(b) Shop Committees shall be organized wherever possible for the purpose of Communist agitation in a particular shop or industry by the workers employed there. These committees shall be united with each other and with the Communist Party, so that the party shall have actual contact with the workers and mobilize them for action against capitalism.

The Communist Party must engage actively in the struggle to revolutionize the trade unions. As against the unionism of the American Federation of Labor, the Communist Party propagandizes industrial unionism and industrial union organization, emphasizing their revolutionary implications. Industrial Unionism is not simply a means for the everyday struggle against capitalism; its ultimate purpose is revolutionary, implying the necessity of ending the capitalist parliamentary state. Industrial Unionism is a factor in the final mass action for the conquest of power, as it will constitute the basis for the industrial administration of the Communist Commonwealth.

(a) The Communist Party recognizes that the A. F. of L. is reactionary and a bulwark of capitalism.

(b) Councils of workers shall be organized in the shops as circumstances allow, for the purpose of carrying on the industrial union struggle in the old unions, uniting and mobilizing the militant elements; these councils to be united in a Central Council wherever possible.

(c) It shall be a major task of the Communist Party to agitate for the construction of a general industrial union organization, embracing the I. W. W., W. I. U., Independent and secession unions, militant unions of the A. F. of L., and the unorganized workers, on the basis of the revolutionary class struggle.

The Communist Party shall encourage movements of the workers in the shops seeking to realize workers' control of industry, while indicating their limitations under capitalism; concretely, any movement analogous to the Shop Stewards of England. These movements (equally directed against the union bureaucracy) should be related to the Communist Party.

The unorganized unskilled workers (including the agricultural proletariat) constitute the bulk of the working class. The Communist Party shall directly and systematically agitate among these workers, awakening them to industrial union organization and action.

\$92,000 IN TAXES BEING WITHHELD BY OIL COMPANIES

In round numbers, \$92,500 taxes is being withheld from payment to Stephens county and the State by the different oil companies holding leases in the county. The oil companies allege that the county and State has no legal right to place a tax on leases carrying the clause "deemise, lease and let" and have thus far refused to pay the tax levied. They are also withholding the payment on leases carrying the clause "grant, sell and convey," but do not allege illegal taxation in these cases.

The Mid-Kansas Company has recently enjoined the commissioners' court and tax collector from collecting the taxes first mentioned above and it is expected that all other oil companies will take the same action in the near future. The decision of the question in the district court is awaited with much interest. In the meantime the county is without the money due it and a number of schools will have the present term of school cut short by reason thereof.—Brock-eridge Democrat.

MRS. PARKS DIES IN FT. WORTH

Mrs. Mary S. Parks, 95, who came to Fort Worth in a wagon forty-six years ago, died Monday morning at the home of her son, J. H. Parks, in Riverside. Mrs. Parkes came to Texas in 1874 from Illinois. She came to Sherman on the Missouri, Kansas & Texas, and from there overlaid to Fort Worth. She lived in Fort Worth only a short time, moving to Dallas and then to Graham. EARLY HISTORY OF PARKER COUNTY FRONTIER DAYS

The early history of Parker county is only the history of all frontier counties and the trials of the good people were possibly as numerous as those of this day and time with the addition of the Indian troubles and troubles from lawless people who followed the frontier, according to the Weatherford Herald, telling of a remarkable document filed in Weatherford reciting an incident in the early history of Parker county. This is a story of mob violence, when an entire family was wiped out. The story follows:

History tells us of numerous cases where people of a marauding disposition caused the frontiersman equally as much trouble as the savages who roamed the prairies. When people of this class were caught in their depredations their cases were handled in ways peculiar to the frontiersmen, and they were either put where they could not ply their nefarious trades or driven from the country in short order. The filing of a document in the county clerk's office in this city this week, to clear the title to a piece of land that is situated in the Springtown community, places on record a bit of ancient history of Parker county, and shows just how lawless people were dealt with by the men who blazed the path of civilization and made Parker county a veritable garden spot in this section of Texas. The following affidavit was made by two of Parker county frontiersmen, and the circumstances therein will be remembered by a number of the older citizens of the county.

Before me, the undersigned authority, personally appeared G. W. Tackett and A. L. Thomas, both of whom are well known by me to be credible citizens of Parker county, Texas, and each whom deposes and says that he has resided in Parker county, Texas, since 1854 and that he was well acquainted with Allen C. Hill and wife, Dusky Hill, and that the said Allen C. Hill and Dusky Hill were the parents of only the following named children: Nance, Jack, Katherine (known as Kate), Martha, Adeline, Eliza, Belle and Allen Hill. Neither Jack, Nance, Katherine, Adeline, Eliza, Martha or Eliza were ever married, and neither left any heirs of their bodies. Allen C. Hill was killed during the winter of 1863 in Parker county, Texas, over what was supposed to be, at that time prejudices growing out of the Civil War, he being a Union sympathizer; Jack Hill, the elder of the two sons, was killed in Palo Pinto county, Texas, in a difficulty with Aaron Bloomer, in either 1869 or 1870. Nance Hill, the oldest of the two daughters, was supposed to have been a bad character a disturbing element in the community, and having gotten wind of the fact that she was to be waited upon by a posse of citizens of the Springtown neighborhood endeavored to make her escape but was followed, captured and hung by the enraged mob seeking her. This capture and hanging taking place in 1877, near the line between Wichita and Clay counties, Texas. A few days after the death of Nance Hill and the return to the Springtown community of those who had hanged her, the mob (spirit still prevailing, Martha and Katherine Hill were taken from their home and hung at a spot about three miles southwest from Springtown in Parker county, Texas. Only a day or so after Martha and Katherine were hung, the spirit of the mob not having changed, and its vengeance not being complete, the farm house of the Hills was burned, Mrs. Dusky Hill with her daughters, Adeline, Eliza and Belle and son, Allen, escaping at this time, but they were followed and overtaken when Allen and Belle, the two youngest of the Hill children, were driven back while Mrs. Dusky Hill and her two daughters, Adeline and Eliza, were taken to a point near the present sight of Agnes, Parker county, Texas, where they were shot and killed. The entire Hill family were thus wiped out with the exception of the two youngest children, Belle and Allen. These two remaining children of the ill-fated family were cared for a time by friendly disposed people in the Springtown community and finally were taken over by one Wes Hedrick, at the time

Carrying a Ton a Mile for less than a Cent

Freight rates have played a very small part in the rising cost of living.

Other causes—the waste of war, under-production, credit inflation—have added dollars to the cost of the necessities of life, while freight charges have added only cents.

The average charge for hauling a ton of freight a mile is less than a cent.

A suit of clothing that sold for \$30 before the war was carried 2,265 miles by rail from Chicago to Los Angeles for 16½ cents.

Now the freight charge is 22 cents and the suit sells for \$50.

The cost of the suit has increased 20 dollars.

The freight on it has increased only 5½ cents.

Other transportation charges enter into the cost of the finished article—carrying the wool to the mills and the cloth to the tailors—but these other charges amount to but a few cents more.

The \$10 pair of shoes that used to sell for \$5 goes from the New England factory to the Florida dealer for a freight charge of 5½ cents—only one cent more than the pre-war rate.

Beef pays only two-thirds of a cent a pound freight from Chicago to New York.

American freight rates are the lowest in the world.

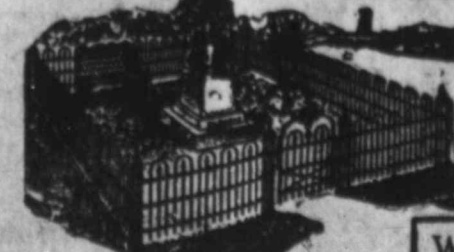
Henry Wesley was under treatment of the doctor for an affection of the head, but we believe now he is almost fully recovered.

WARNS NATION OF RED PERIL

U. S. Department of Justice Urges Americans to Guard Against Bolshevism Menace.

CALLS RED PLANS CRIMINAL

Press, Church, Schools, Labor Unions and Civic Bodies Called Upon to Teach True Purpose of Bolshevik Propaganda.

Washington.—Calling for the patriotic support of all true Americans in their fight to protect their homes, religion and property from the spreading menace of Bolshevism, the United States Department of Justice has issued a warning against the insidious propaganda of the "Reds" during the new year. It reads:

"It would be extremely helpful to the cause of good government, the maintenance of law and order and the preservation of peace and happiness in our country if the people on this New Year's day would resolve to study, understand and appreciate the so-called 'Red' movement. They can counteract it most effectively by teaching its purpose through the press, the church, the schools, patriotic organizations and labor unions, all of which are within the range of its insidious attacks.

"Red" Theories Criminal.
 "The 'Red' movement does not mean an attitude of protest against alleged defects in our present political and economic organization of society. It does not represent the radicalism of progress. It represents a specific doctrine—namely, the introduction of dictatorships the world over by force and violence. It is not a movement of liberty-loving persons, but a distinctly criminal and dishonest movement. Lenin himself made the statement at the Third Soviet Conference, 'Among one hundred so-called Bolsheviks there is one real Bolshevik, thirty-nine criminals and sixty fools.' It advocates the destruction of all ownership in property, the destruction of all religion and belief in God. It is a movement organized against Democracy and in favor of the power of the few built by force. Bolshevism, syndicalism, the Soviet Government, sabotage, etc., are only names for old theories of violence and criminality.

Russian Labor Crushed.
 "Though their adherents in this country are advocating and fomenting strikes, Lenin and Trotsky forbid strikes, and trade unions are being broken up and completely subordinated to the will of the few demagogues in control in Russia. This Bolshevik experiment on the living body of the Russian people has not proven in any sense of the word an experiment in Democracy. The Bolshevik leadership frankly repudiate democratic principles as we understand them. It has been a gamble which meant for Russia, and indeed, for the whole of humanity, enormous losses in lives as well as in material resources. The Bolsheviks have run up a colossal bill which the Russian workmen and peasants will have to pay.

"Reds" Menace America.
 "Having lived at the expense of the Russian people for two years, these speculators in human lives and other social savings are trying to move a new bill to the east and to the west, hoping to take advantage of the economic distress and confusion of our people. Humanity finds itself free to the north of the Arctic circle.

"The insidious propaganda of this country are spreading chiefly by means of the press, the church, the schools, patriotic organizations and labor unions. It is the duty of all of us to guard against the insidious propaganda of this country.

Types of Communist agitators deported by U. S. Department of Justice.
 "This department, as far as existing laws allow, intends during the forthcoming year to keep up an unflinching, persistent, aggressive warfare against any movement, no matter how cloaked or disguised, having for its purpose (other than the promulgation of these ideas) the excitation of sympathy for those who spread them. The movement will not be permitted to go far enough in this country to disturb our peace and well-being or create any widespread distrust of the people's government. It will fall away before the light of popular knowledge and recognition of its aims and purposes."

Protection Promised.
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"OVERTHROW WORLD ORDER!" CRY COMMUNISTS

Manifesto of Communist International, Seized in U. S. Department of Justice Raids, Tells "Reds" Own Story of Their Plans for World Wide Plunder.

Extracts from "Manifesto of the Communist International—Adopted by the Congress of the Communist International at Moscow, March 2-6, 1919, and signed by Comrades C. Rakovsky, N. Lenine, M. Zinovjev, L. Trotzky and Fritz Platten."

Alongside the dethroned dynasties of the Romanoffs, Hohenzollerns and Hapsburgs, and the capitalistic cliques of these lands, the rulers of France, England, Italy and the United States stand revealed in the light of unfolding events and diplomatic disclosures in their immeasurable villainy.

Spurning the half-heartedness, hypocrisy and corruption of the decadent official socialist parties we, the Communists assembled in the Third International, feel ourselves to be the direct successors of the heroic efforts and martyrdom of a long series of revolutionary generations from Babeuf to Karl Liebknecht and Rosa Luxemburg. As the First International foresaw the future development and pointed the way; as the Second International gathered together and organized millions of the proletariat, so the Third International is the international of open-mass-action of the revolutionary realization of the international of deeds. Socialist criticism has sufficiently stigmatized the bourgeois world order. The task of the International Communist Party is now to overthrow this order and to erect in its place the structure of the socialist world order. We urge the working men and women of all countries to unite under the Communist banner, the emblem under which the first great victories have already been won.

Proletarians of all lands! In the war against imperialistic barbarity, against monarchy, against the privileged classes, against the bourgeois state and bourgeois property, against all forms and varieties of social and national oppression—UNITE!

Under the standard of the Workingmen's Councils, under the banner of the Third International, in the revolutionary struggle for power and the Dictatorship of the Proletariat, proletarians of all countries UNITE!

The revolutionary era compels the proletariat to make use of the means of battle which will concentrate its entire energies, namely, mass action, with its logical resultant, direct conflict with the governmental machinery in open combat. All other methods, such as revolutionary use of bourgeois parliamentarism, will be of only secondary significance.

The indispensable condition for successful struggle is separation not only from the direct servitors of Capitalism and enemies of the communist revolution, in which role the Social Democrats of the Right appear, but also from the Party of the Center (Kautskians), who desert the proletariat at the critical moment in order to come to terms with its open antagonists.

The growth of the revolutionary movement in all lands, the dangers of suppression of this revolution through the coalition of capitalistic States, the attempts of the Socialist betrayers to unite with one another (the formation of the Yellow "International" at Berne), and to give their services to the Wilsonian League; finally, the absolute necessity for co-ordination of proletarian actions—all these demand the formation of a real revolutionary and real proletarian Communist International. This International, which subordinates the so-called national interests to the interests of the international revolution, will personally the mutual help of the proletariat of the different countries, for without economic and other mutual helpfulness the proletariat will not be able to organize the new society.

Incumbent are the sacrifices of the working class. Their best—Liebknecht, Rosa Luxemburg—they have lost. Against this the proletariat must defend itself, defend at any price. The Communist International calls the entire world proletariat to this final struggle.

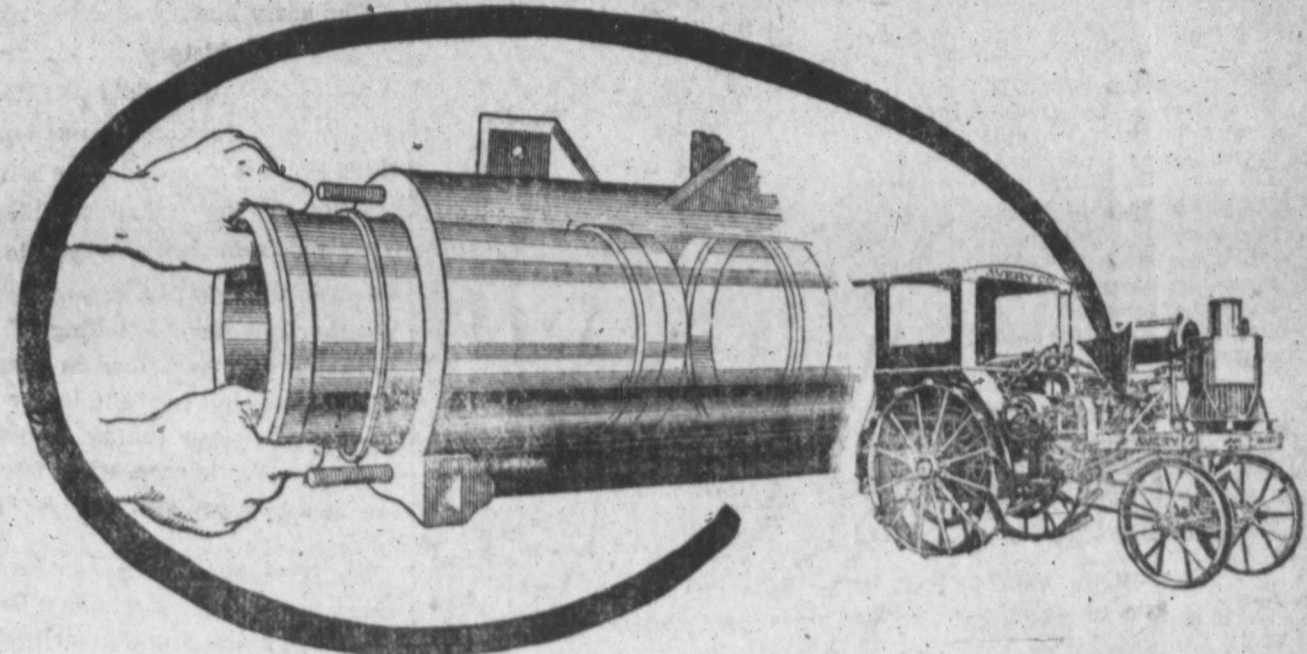

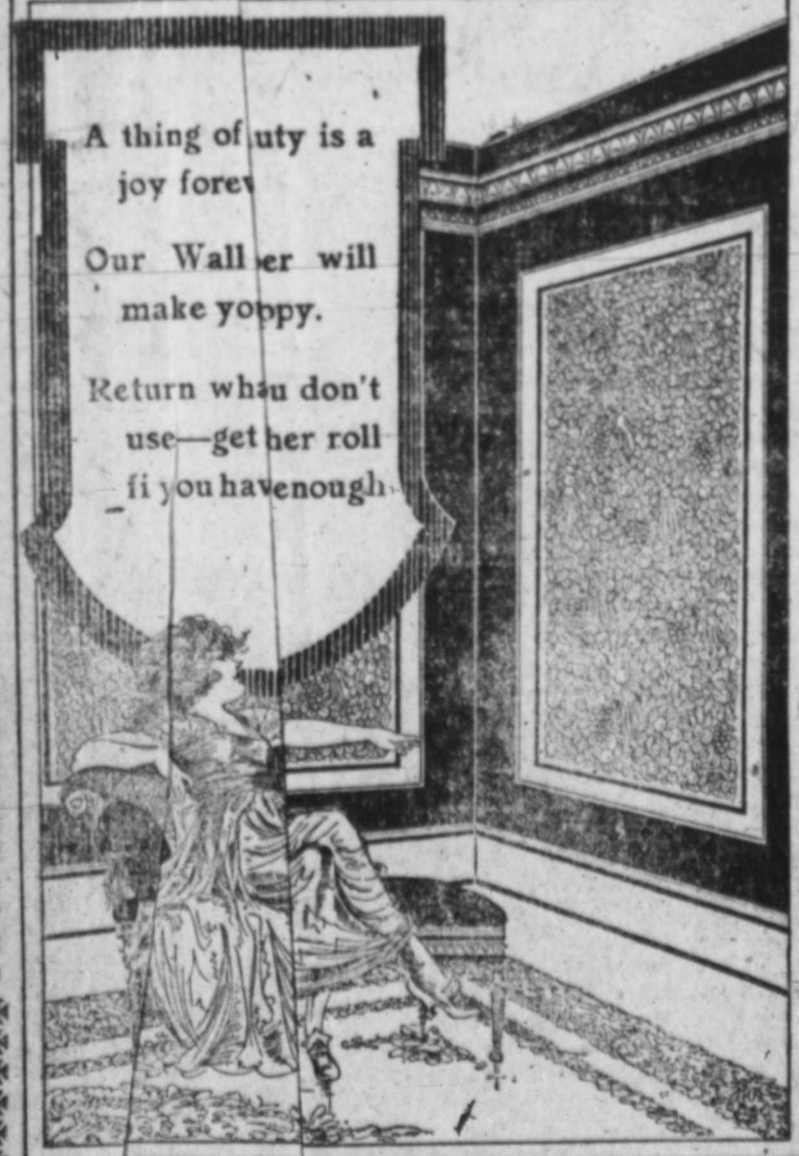

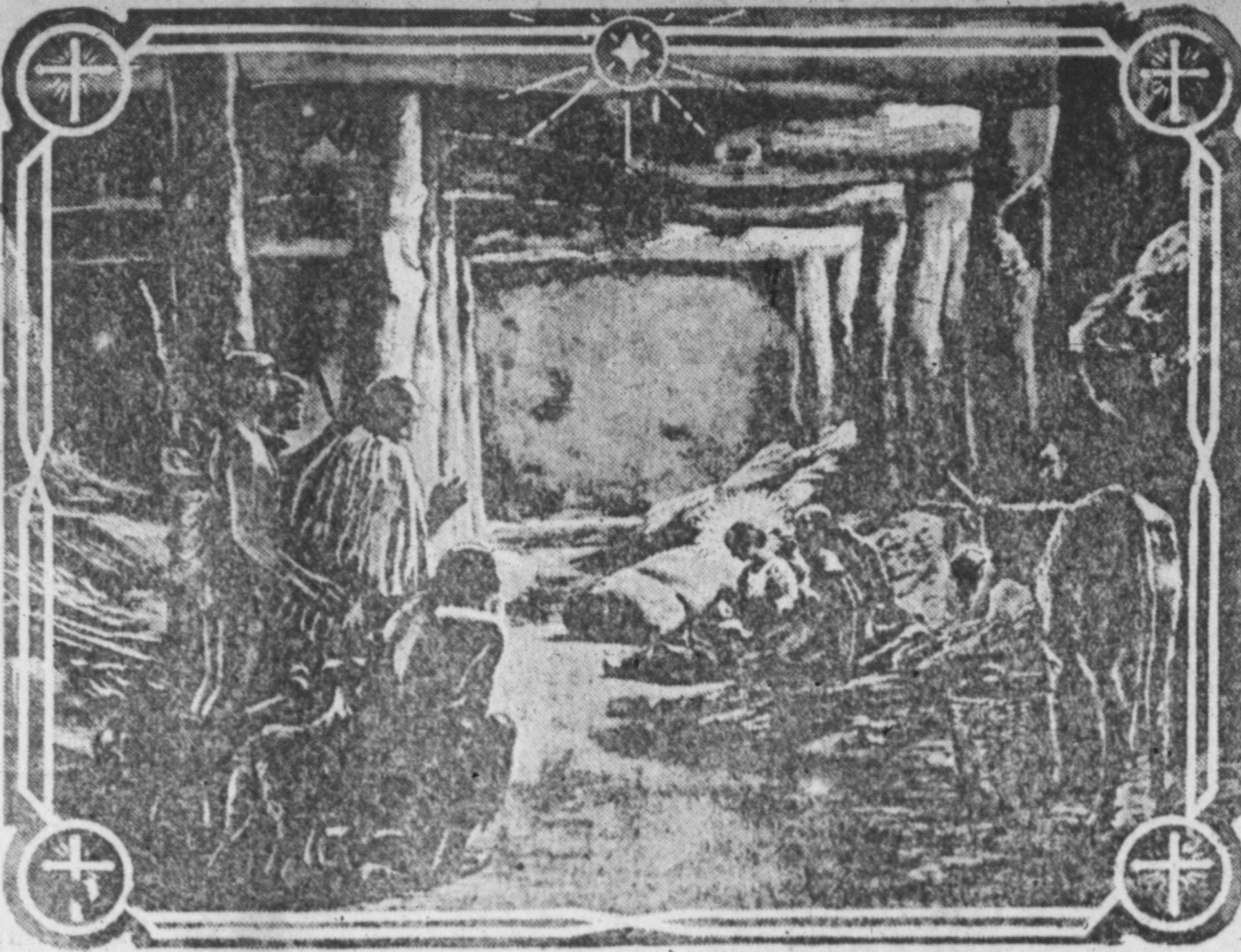

Carol Singing Is Dying Out

THE custom of carol singing out of doors at Christmas time seems to be dying out.

This is a great pity, for carols are a branch of folk music, the unconscious art of the peasant mind, a heritage of inestimable worth.

In many English villages there are carols peculiar to themselves, to be jealously guarded and retained for their use.

The Christmas carol dates from the birth of Christianity itself, the angels having sung their carols at the birth of Jesus Christ.

Among the early Christians carols were sacred hymns representing Christ's nativity. Now the name is given to a variety of popular metrical compositions from the simple record of the birth of our Lord to rude wail songs and rhymes of holiday revelry.

Probably no Christmas would seem complete without the well-known and popular hymn, "Hark! the Herald Angels Sing."

The word carol, which originally meant a dance, is thought to have come into our language either from the Norman French carole or from the Celtic carol.

In 1822 Davies Gilbert published "some ancient Christmas carols, with the tunes to which they were formerly sung in the west of England." In his preface he declared himself to be desirous of preserving them in their actual form, as specimens of times now passing away, and of religious feelings now superseded by others of a different caste.

Of late years some of the churches—chiefly in the larger cities—have held "Christmas carol services" during the Christmas season. This is an excellent movement, and might profitably be taken up by churches all over the country. Certainly if the churches can restore this old custom it will add to the enjoyment of the season.

France is exceptionally rich in carols, which are often drinking songs as in many European countries. We find many French carols translated into English, no doubt as a result of the intercourse which existed between dwellers on either side of the channel, in the days when English youths often pursued their studies in France.

There is a great deal of discussion as to which is the most popular carol. While it is impossible to name the favorite, there can be little doubt of the universal appeal of "God rest ye, merry gentlemen," whose plaintive melody has touched a chord in the popular mind.

Among modern compositions may be mentioned, "The Shepherds Left Their Sheep," by Alfred Hollins. Mr. Hollins is blind, but this affliction has not prevented him from becoming one of the finest organists and composers in Britain.

Washington Irving in his famous "Sketch Book" introduces us to most of the old English customs which have from time immemorial, attended the Christmas festival. Of his first night at Bracebridge Hall he says:

"I had scarcely got into bed when a strain of music seemed to break forth in the air just below the window. I listened, and found it proceeded from a band, which I concluded to be the waltz from some neighboring village. They went around the house playing under the windows. I drew aside the curtains, to hear them more distinctly. The moonbeams fell through the upper part of the casement, partially lighting up the antiquated apartment. The sounds, as they receded, became more soft and aerial, and seemed to accord with the quiet and the moonlight. I listened and listened—they became more and more tender and remote, and, as they gradually died away, my head sank upon the pillow, and I fell asleep."

In Pasquill's "Jests," a book published in 1604, an amusing story is told of a knight who gave a Christmas feast at which he entertained his friends and the tenantry.

The host ordered no man at the table to drink a drop "till he that was master over his wife should sing a carol." A pause ensued and then one poor male, more daring than the others, timidly lifted his lonely voice.

The knight then turned to the ladies, who sat at a table apart, and "bade her who was master over her husband," sing a carol. The legend says that forthwith "the women fell all to singing, that there was never heard such a catter-walking piece of music."
