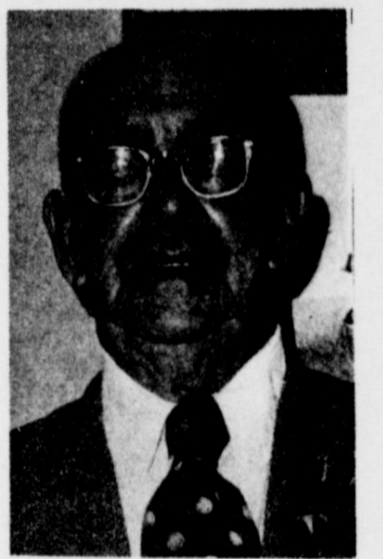
All proceeds from the tournament were donated to the Muleshoe Hospital Action Fund. Bouts and the winners are as follows:

Cotton Harvest Has Resumed Momentum

The High Plains cotton harvest was halted when rain and snow moved late Monday and Tuesday. Harvest resumed momentum as quickly as soil would support equipment, according to Paul R. Dickson, in charge of the USDA's Cotton Classing Office in Lubbock. "Most people we talk with say we will be through harvesting Christmas," he added.

The USDA's Agricultural Marketing Service reported Lubbock, Brownfield, Lamesa, and Levelland classed 201,000 samples during the week ending Friday, December 13. This brought the season's total to 544,000. On this same date last year the total was 1,459,000 Dickson said.

At Lubbock predominant grades this week were 51 and 42. Grade 51 accounted for 25 percent while grade 42 was assigned to 25 percent of the cotton samples. Twenty-nine

percent of these samples were reduced one grade because of bark. This is up from 24 percent the previous week.

The predominant staples were 31 and 32. Staple 32 amounted to 35 percent and staple 32 and 23 percent of the samples this week.

Micronaire readings in the premium range of 3.5 to 4.9 accounted for 20 percent of the samples. This compares to 27 percent the week before. Micronaire readings below 3.5 accounted for the other 80 percent this week.

Pressley Strength tests averaged 81,000 pounds per square inch.

Prices quoted by the Lubbock Cotton Exchange for the most predominant qualities in the 3.5 to 4.9 micronaire range were: Grade 51, staple 31 - 30.05, staple 32 - 30.60 cents per pound. For Grade 42, staple

Local Farmers Now Eligible For Benefits

Farmers in Bailey County are eligible for increased benefits under the All-Risk Federal Crop Insurance programs on cotton and grain sorghum for the 1975 crop.

David Buchanan, field representative from the District Office at Lubbock, said to day that insured farmers are now able to value their guaranteed production under the FCIC programs at a 17-40 percent higher level than a year ago depending upon which crop is insured.

The highest increase is in the cotton program where the price paid for losses was raised to 35 cents a pound from a previous high of 25 cents (or 28 cents, for some counties). Increases have been made in the grain sorghum program with prices up to \$2.50 a hundredweight from \$2.00 a year ago.

"These changes have been made to help insurance coverage keep pace with rising farm production expenses in the past two years," Buchanan says.

As production costs-- including fertilizer, seed, labor, chemicals and machinery--continue to increase at a rapid pace, it is more necessary than ever for Bailey County farmers to protect against crop destruction hazards beyond their control. This is especially true if borrowed money is at stake.

Buchanan will be in the county for a limited time advising farmers of the FCIC program changes for 1975 and taking applications from those interested in participating in the U.S. Department of Agriculture volunteer program.

During the 1974 growing season more than 12,000 farm units were insured in Texas, Oklahoma and New Mexico with Federal Crop Insurance protecting \$47.5 million worth of growing crops on nearly one million acres.

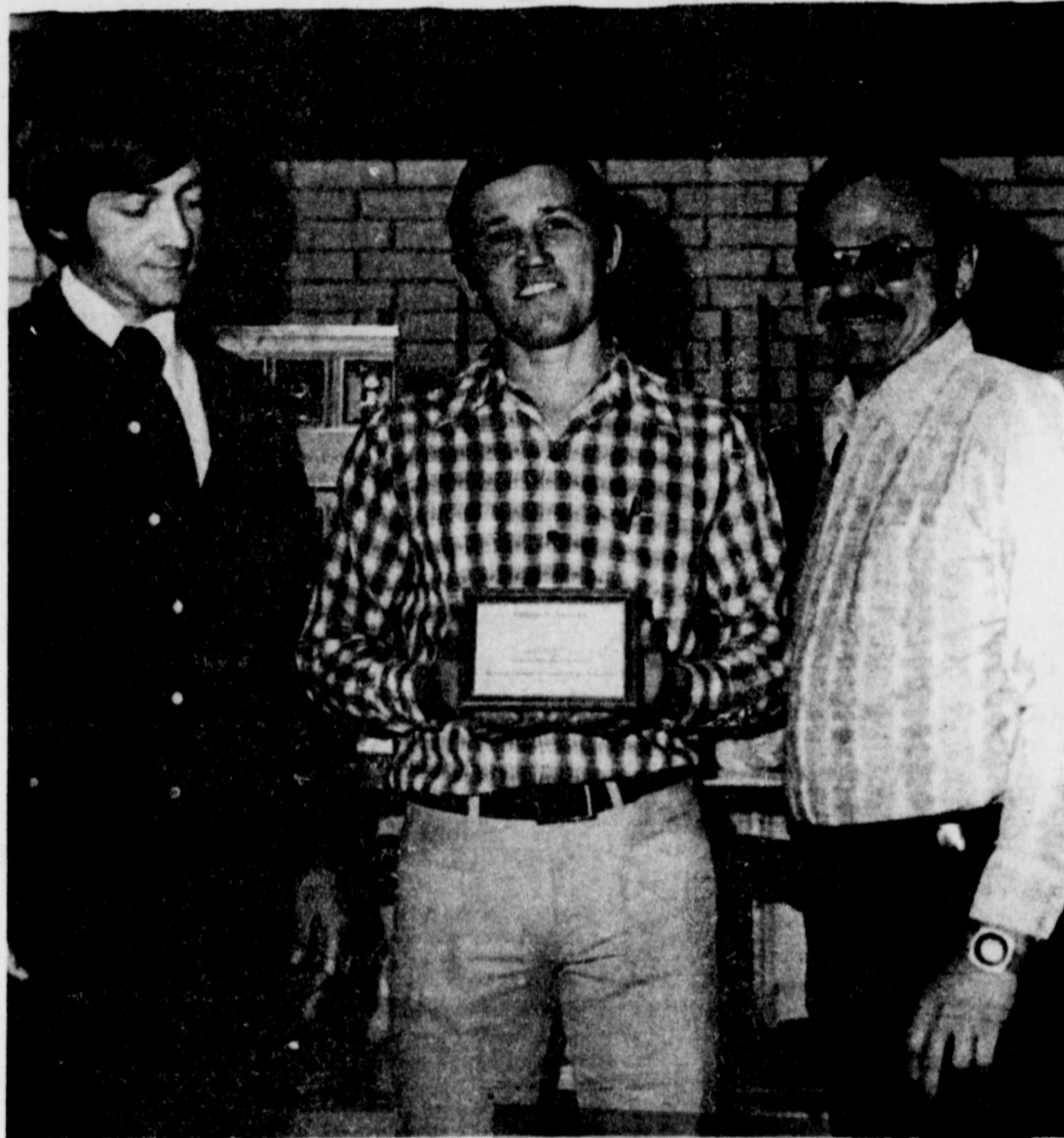
Pallbearers were Butch McCray, Lloyd Williams, Morris Killough, Jimmy Wedel, Ernest Bass and Boyd Landers.

Hatcher Is New Associate Pastor Here

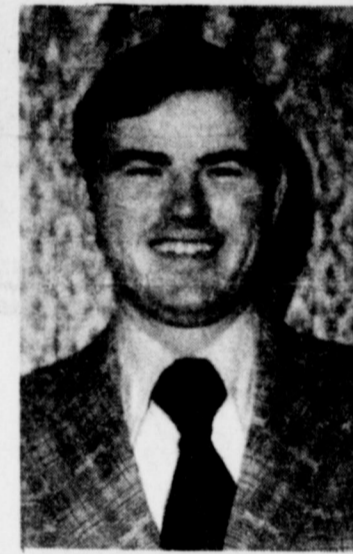
Jimmy Hatcher has accepted the call to be the associate pastor of the Trinity Baptist Church and will be working with the youth program as his main duties.

Evening Classes To Be Offered This Spring

The South Plains College Division of Continuing Education will be offering a second semester of evening classes for the Muleshoe Community College Center.

Registration will be held Tuesday, January 7, 1975, at 7 p. m. at the Muleshoe High School cafeteria.

Classes will begin January 16, 1975 and final exams will be held May 1 through May 7. The cost for three semester hours will be \$58.00 for six semester hours, \$61.00 and for nine semester hours, \$75.00

All credit courses will be held in Muleshoe High School. A minimum enrollment of 12 persons is required for a course.

Persons must be a high school graduate or possess the GED certificate. Persons without the

GED may apply for probationary enrollment to the Dean of Continuing Education at South Plains College.

Steps for admission include completing an application for admission (a social security number is required); have an official transcript from high school or college; College transfer students are required to submit transcripts of all previous college work (a transcript from each college attended); and each student must file an immunization certificate as required by state law. All of the above steps can be accomplished during registration as forms will be

furnished.

Classes to be offered during the spring semester include: Basic Accounting II and Introduction to Sociology to be held on Monday evenings, 7 to 9:30 p.m., Drawing I and Composition, Reading and Rhetoric on Tuesday, 7-9:30 p. m. and Thursdays will offer the Drawing I lab and History of U.S. since 1865 from 7 to 9:30 p.m.

City Awards Bids On Waterworks System

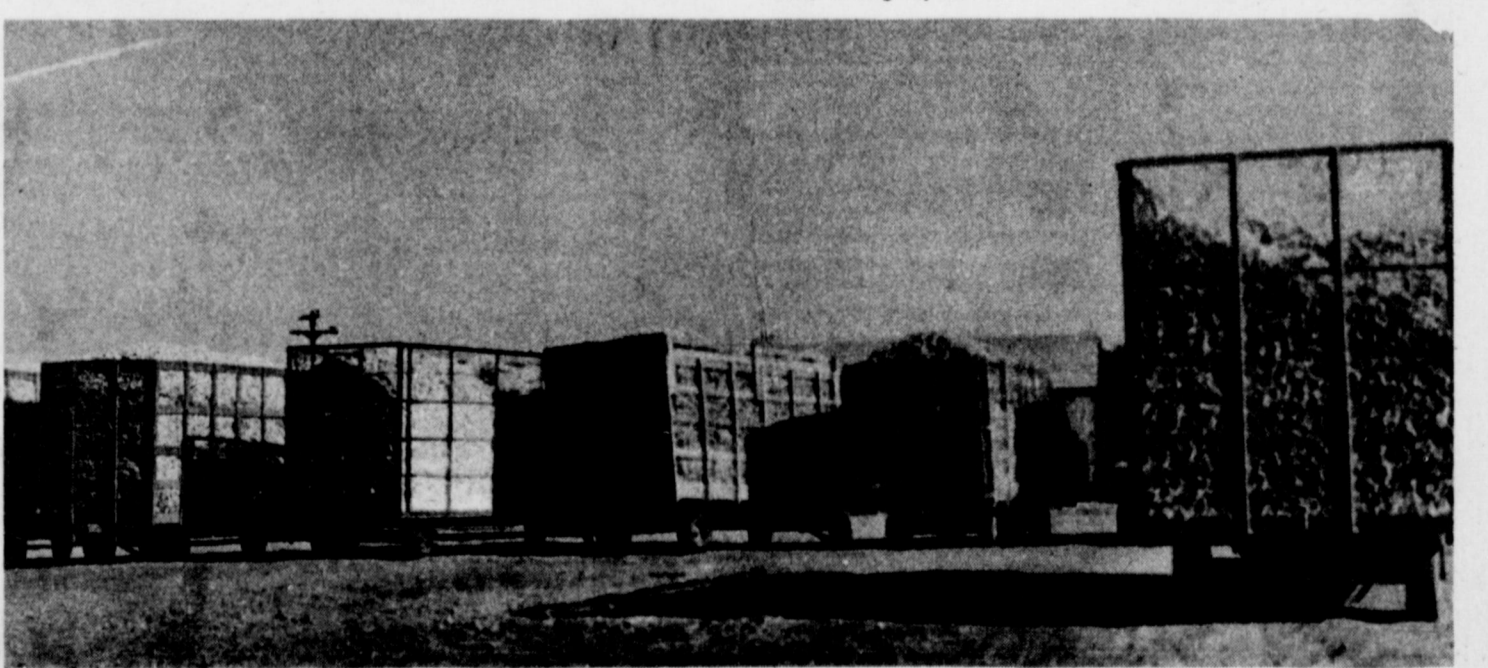
Muleshoe City Council met Tuesday, December 17, at 8:30 a.m. in the City Hall.

The council authorized the issuance of Revenue Bonds. The bonds which have been voted on were in the amount of \$210,000 and were sold to the Texas Water Development Board at the interest rate of 4.1 per cent.

They also passed an ordinance authorizing the issuance of Tax and Revenue Certificates of Obligations in the amount of \$265,000. These were sold to the Muleshoe State Bank (\$130,000) and the First National Bank (\$135,000) of Muleshoe. The schedule of payments will run from 1975 through 1983. The revenue bonds will be supported from the water and sewer revenue.

Bids were also awarded for the city's waterworks system. The lowest bids were accepted, Universal Tank and Tower was awarded the bid for the overhead storage tank; High Plains Drilling was awarded the bid for drilling two wells; and Novak Construction Company was awarded the bid for the 12 inch loop. The completion date for the two wells is

120 days and for the loop, 90 days. For the overhead storage tank, it will be approximately two years.

Drivers Warned To Drive With Caution

The director of the Texas Department of Public Safety today warned that as 30 persons may die in Texas traffic during the Christmas and New Year holiday periods.

Colonel Wilson E. Speir estimated that 14 lives would be lost between 6 p.m. Christmas Eve and midnight Christmas Day. He said an estimated 16 fatalities are likely from 6 p.m. New Year's Eve to midnight New Year's Day.

Speir noted that the Christmas-New Year season is traditionally one of the most dangerous driving periods. He said the problem is compounded by the large numbers of persons taking holiday trips or driving to seasonal parties.

The DPS director urged drivers to be especially watchful on Christmas Day for youngsters trying out new bicycles, minibikes, and motorcycles. And he reminded parents that minibikes and motorcycles cannot be operated legally on public

streets or roads unless the vehicle is registered, has a state inspection sticker, and the operator holds the appropriate class of driver's license.

A more pointed reminder was directed to drivers who plan to mix drinking with their travels. Speir said DPS troopers have been directed to be especially watchful for motorists under the influence of alcohol.

He pointed out that the DPS will be conducting its holiday "Operation Motorcade" with extra numbers of troopers on duty throughout the Christmas and New Year periods. Speed, one of the chief factors in fatal accidents, will be checked by radar.

"We hope every Texas driver will join our year-end efforts to make the holiday season safe and happy," Speir concluded.

Tips On Selecting A Christmas Tree

COLLEGE STATION—Usually a major step toward the Christmas tree. And there are several pointers to remember when making your selection and then caring for the tree, says Everett Janne, a landscape horticulturist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service.

"It's important to get a tree that isn't too large for the allotted space, is well filled-out, and has a triangular shape," points out the Texas A&M University System horticulturist. "Check to see if the tree is fresh by shaking it. If only a few needles fall, you can be assured of its freshness and the tree will maintain its appearance longer.

"As soon as you get home, cut off about an inch from the butt end of the tree to facilitate moisture intake. This will help the tree maintain a fresh appearance. Put the butt end of the tree in a container of water and store it in a cool, shady place until you're ready to bring it indoors."

Before bringing the tree inside, Janne advises finding a location where it will be away from heating vents, radiators, fireplaces, stoves and television sets. Use a tree stand that holds water. Because of the

low humidity in most heated homes, the tree will need to be watered every day to keep the foliage fresh.

"It's important," he adds, "to check the condition of electrical cords and lights before putting them on the tree. A short in the wiring could cause a serious fire."

So, proper selection and care of your Christmas tree can help insure a safe Christmas. For safety sake, Janne also advises against leaving the lights turned on when no one is at home or when retiring.

HIGHLIGHTS

The Oklahoma Sooners are our national champions for the second year in a row... and Alabama, Ohio State, and Michigan are 2nd, 3rd, and 4th for the second year in a row. One particularly bright new face among the Top Twenty is Baylor, champion of the Southwest Conference. Michigan State is back in the group after an absence of a few years, and Vanderbilt and Brigham Young are welcome newcomers to our top forty.

Again in explanation: when we list our selected teams as the top teams, we are rating the 40 STRONGEST teams in the country, not necessarily the forty teams with the best win-loss record. A team's rating is based on the average of its performance against all opponents throughout the entire season. As we said before, calibre of competition is a major factor in determining a team's rating. Wisconsin, Arkansas, and Missouri, for example, are all four-time losers. Yet, based on their power quotients, they would be rated as favorites over 85% of the major college football teams.

To say that our forecasting average experienced some trying weekends is a bit of an understatement, but it finally managed to settle just a little below last year. 2,238 games were included in all our forecasts this year. We picked the winners in 1,650... missed in 539 (there were 49 ties), and finished with a final average of .754.

Comparing our ratings of the conferences in 1973 with those listed below for 1974, the Big Eight's first place lead over the Southeast Conference has been cut almost in half. And the Big Ten has moved into fourth place ahead of the Pacific 8 Conference. Conference ratings are based on each league's power quotient average determined from the ratings of all teams in every conference. Of the more than 65 football conferences, here are the twenty strongest in the nation:





3 Accident Investigated In County

This was 109 less accidents, 15 less killed, and 120 less injured in 1974 at the same period of time.

The ten traffic deaths for the month of November, 1974, occurred in the following counties; two in Hansford, one each in Cochran, Crosby, Dickens, Gray, Haskell, Hutchinson, Montague, and Throckmorton.
