#### BRYAN FOUGHT FOR DRY PLANK

William J. Bryan fought hard for speeches in support of the plank, almost brought the delegates to their feet with the magnetism and force of oratory, and started one of the soisiest demonstrations that the convention had seen. When he had concluded his reply to the advocates of a wet plank, the demonstration broke loose on the floor and wholly unaided by the band or any of the other Instrumentalities which had been effectively used to keep other demonstrations going, it proceeded spontaneously and resisted all efforts to get the convention back to order.

Mr. Bryan, standing smiling in the limelight at the edge of the speakers platform, and with tears of emotion running down his cheeks, reviewed a procession of prohibition enthusiasts who tore up their State standards and started moving a column of delegates about the hall. There was some unpleasantness about displaying State standards. During the demonstration some one bore the standard of Bryan's home State to the platform, reaching out, Bryan lifted it high above the rest, while the crowd

Mr. Bryan has been very active and enthusiastic about prohibition matters and when the convention refused to adopt his "bone dry" plank he was sorely disappointed. At the close of the convention Mr. Bryan said: "My heart is in the grave with our cause and I must pause until it comes back to me. My views on the convention's action in reference to the endorsement of prohibition are known. I regard it as a very serious mistake-it opened the door to the nomination of a wet candidate."

Franklin D. Rooseelt of New York, assistant secretary of the navy, was nominated for vice president. There was some difficulty in getting a running mate for Mr. Cox but, after some maneuvering, Mr. Roosevelt was nominated by acclamation.

Mr. Roosevelt sprang into political prominence in 1910 when he was drafted by the Democrats of the Twenty-Eighth New York Senatorial District, consisting of the counties of Duchess, Putnam and Columbia, in an effort to defeat Senator John F. Schlosser of Beason, who was a candidate for re-election. Roosevelt was successful, rolling up a majority of 356 in the Democratic landslide which carried John A. Dix into the Governor's chair. One of the stories still told of Mr. Roosevelt's first campaign is that he corralled the farmer vote by running on a platform which ad-

vocated uniform apple barrels. Mr. Roosevelt was re-elected in 1912, but resigned his seat March 17, 1913, to accept the appointment as Assistant Secretary of the Navy. His most famous exploit in the State Senate was his leadership of the insurgents who opposed the election of William F. Sheehan to the United States Senate. After three months' deadlock, James A. O'Gorman was elected with Mr. Roosevelt's concur-

For the benefit of those who are not familiar with Mr. Cox's record we give the following brief state- Oak and Southview streets.

James Middleton Cox was three times Governor of Ohio-an honor enjoyed by only one other Ohioan, Rutherford B. Hayes.

Born on a farm, educated in the public schools, a printer's devil, a school teacher, a newspaper reporter, a private secretary to a Congressman, owner, manager and proprietor of two newspapers, member of Congress for three years and three times Governor of his State is his record to date.

Business success paralleled his political achievements and through his own efforts Cox has amassed a fortune. Mr. Cox became the leader of the Democratic party in Ohio in 1912 when he was nominated for Governor. As one who had brought radical changes in the State constitution, he took the field in its behalf. His first term as Governor was devoted chiefly to forwarding the enactment of laws

But Ohio evidently was not prepared to assimilate all the new laws, nominated to head the Democratic for Cox was defeated for re-election. party in the coming presidential elec- But his party re-nominated him in 1916 and he was re-elected for a third term in 1918, being the only Democrat to win in Ohio.

Legislation for which Governor Cox is best known includes a model workmen's compensation law and a child afford. Accordingly they lost no time labor law which have been extensively copied by other States. Educators of the country say the Ohio school code, enacted under Cox's direction, have not even received half-hearted achievements.

Mr. Cox was born in Butler county, Palmer ran his vote up to the highest school and held his first position as park benches and play ground equiptook his first lessons. He spent first assignment in the reportorial


