U. S. IS FACED BY GRAVE SHORTAGE OF NURSES

With an alarming shortage of competent trained nurses in the country. the American Red Cross has launched an intensive effort to recruit young women for the nursing profession, according to an announcement yesterday at the Southwestern Division of the Red Cross, with headquarters in St. Louis. A grave situation would instantly arise at any time should a serious epidemic strike the country or any large sectional area. In the event of an outbreak similar to the recent influenza epidemics the nursing personnel would be inadequate to meet the demands for nurses and the public health would be menaced, it was de-

The Red Cross will work in close co-operation with the three largest nursing associations of the country in the campaign to turn out more trained nurses and every inducement will be offered eligible young women.

Large numbers of girls have left the nursing vocation and have entered other professions or have gone into business. The training schools for nurses are getting less and less pupils and this, it is said by Red Cross officials, is due to a misconception that the life of a nurse is one of hardship or drudgery. Steps will be taken to remove this conception and portray the opnortunities of the nurse in the true light, it was announced.
