He is erecting four re buildings, oil tanks, coal bins, It will be one of Graham's

est industrial plants. The machine shops will be housed a large building 50x150 feet. Five ensive lathes and other necessary uipment is now being installed in his building. In a separate building 50x50 feet is the large steel hammer and other machinery necessary for this part of the work. The machinery for threading pipe and casing is in a third building which is thoroughly equipped for all pipe work. Another part of the plant in which Mr. Allen takes great pride is the machinery for straightening pipe and stems. It is not necessary to heat them. Within thirty minutes after crooked pipes and stems are brought in they are straightened by the cold process and the driver is on his way back to the wells. The plant represents an investment of about \$100,000.00 and is quite an addition to Graham's indus-

We shall not give a detailed drilling report this week but more progress has been made than in any previous week. The fair weather has given an opportunity to work and the new gushers have quickened the spirits of every one interested in the oil business. Many wells are making records for quick drilling. The Young County Oil and Gas Company near the McCluskey wells, has been drilling sixteen days and is around 1,200 feet, This well will be completed before the holidays.

Each week will bring good news from the Young county oil fields. A more optimistic spirit could not be found than is present at Graham.

GASOLINE ABSORBING PLANT

The Oklahoma Petroleum and Gas Company are contemplating building a gas absorbing plant on their lease at South Bend for the purpose of converting the waste into gasoline. Around the oil wells is considerable waste that is now being converted into gasoline which formerly was lost.

This company has six plants of this kind in Oklahoma and is now contemplating the erection of one on their lease near their big well that came in last week at South Bend.

New enterprises are coming each week and with the new railroad Young county will soon be one of the leading oil counties of Texas.

NOTED READER WAS VICTIM OF HUN GAS

Sarah Mildred Willmer, Who Is to Appear Here Soon, Was Gassed While at Front Entertaining Yanks.

Miss Sarah Mildred Willmer, who comes to Graham on December 4, bears a unique distinction. She was gassed by the Germans in France, where she was serving as an entertainer with the United States army

When war came upon America Miss Willmer determined to do her bit-She was one of the first who saw the need for cheery entertainment for the Americans overseas. And she was one of the first to volunteer. The story of the difficulties she encountered and how her perseverence won, of how she packed so carefully the trunk she never saw again until she came back home, although it followed her all over Europe, is too long for telling here. In the end she did get to France and not only to France but where few women ever got with the American troops, right up at the front. It was while there that a wave of poison gas came over the American lines, with the result that this heroic little woman received an injury to her lungs that will leave its mark forever in her life.

Another less plucky might have been forced to abandon her career but Miss Willmer has continued in America to bring the same delight and pleasure she brought to the boys "over there" and despite her affliction stands today as she stood before the great war to save democracy, as perhaps the foremost woman reader on the American platform.

She ranks with the greatest of America's readers and dramatic impersonators---a most enviable position in the Lyceum world. Her recital here will prove one of the season's treats.

> Another change he will urge is to permit briefs in the Supreme Court to be typewritten, instead of the rule he said is costing litigants hundreds of thousands of dollars. For the protection of the court, he would limit the copies to an original and two carbons, thereby insuring legibility and

Judge Burkett will have a bonded warehouse bill in line with the bankers' plan so as to stabilize farm products, such as cotton, corn, rice, wheat oats, beans, peas and so on.

Lastly, Judge Burkett will insist on redistricting all the way down the line congressional, senatorial and representative. He said he will endeavor to get compact districts with similar interests as far as possible.

Chinese Tither Who Gives Nine-Tenths

A new kind of tither who gives nine-tenths of his income to God and lives on the other tenth has been discovered by a missionary in Medan, Sumatra. "At the close of a service one Sunday night at which a special appeal has been made for a collection, a Chinese coolie clothed in nothing more than a pair of trousers, came forward and handed twelve dollars to me. This coolie had been standing out in the dark near the window and eagerly drinking in what words of the gospel message his ears were able to catch. He was too timid or too askamed to come in, but as best he could was living a christian life. For several years since that time he has continued to make his contribution 34, \$8, \$12 at a time. Some said he must be a miser with a fortune stored away. In fact he was just a poor coolie going from house to house cutting wood, carrying water, sweeping and scrubbing. Today he is clean and well clothed and sits with the others in the meetings, but lives on one-tenth of his income and gives the other wished the money used for 'and answered that he wished good speakers might be sent to places round about, that people might learn as he had about Jesus." If all American christians were possessed of the spirit of this poor Chinese, how long would it take to evangelize the world?-Missionary Voice.

Woman's Work Songdo District Korea Miss Graham of Texas had charge of the work in the city of Songdo. with its population of 45,000 people. There are three churches in the city, with a combined membership of 1,000. About 300 of these are women.

Miss Graham did a great work visiting in the homes of the women, and secured the interest and regular attendance of about 90 in a weekly Bible class. Of the more than 100 enrolled in the class, about 80 completed a year's work and were given certificates for the same. She organized the women into missionary societies, and almost every woman in the church became an enthusiastic giving and praying member. The christian women of the city became so enthusiastic in their missionary spirit that the fire spread to the country, and now there are missionary societies in

nearly all the country churches. Miss Graham had five Bible women under her direction, four in the churches and one in the hospital. 



While the eagle has been given first place as the "national bird," some people have thought that the turkey should have been accorded this place because it is in so general use on our national feast day, and because it had been domesticated by the Indians long before the discovery of America by Columbus. The name was given in error, as it was supposed to have come from Turkey. which it did not, the common turkey being native to North America. But let the

turkey tell his own story: I can introduce myself as of the type vertebrate, because I have a backbone. I am classed as a bird because I am an animal that dresses in feathers

rather than in skin fike men or to wear wool like sheep, hair like a horse's or My order is gallinaceous, from a Latin word, meaning hen; and our order

is sometimes called rasores, also from the Latin, because we scratch for a living. We practice "the strenuous life" which others preach. My family is a large one, the Phasianidae, which includes most of the do-

mestic fowls and also pheasants, grouse and quall-nearly 100 species in all. You notice that I have some Jaw-breaking words in my scientific record, but my jaws are called mandibles, from a Latin word that means to chew, the upper and lower mandibles forming my bill.

The whole opening of my mouth is called my gape (broad a, please,) and sometimes the rictus; but that word should always be restricted to the back corner of my mouth.

You must have noticed how beautifully my neck is wattled. That word wattle is Old English and means a bag. The other name for my wattles, caruncle, comes from the Latin and means flesh.

I go bareheaded, but wear a great many feathers from my neck down to my tibia. Everybody's leg below the knee (including yours and mine) has two bones, of which one is the tibia.

My tibla is feathered. Below that is the tarsus (Greek-heel in vertebrates, the joint that bonds back, while the knee-joint bends forward), and this tarsus is bare of feathers, but covered with big scales. I wouldn't dare pronounce all the long words that go with this part of my anatomy, but it may be interesting for you to go turkey hunting in the dictionary for "sculated" and related wards. Look for "drumstick" and see why it is called "tibia-tarsus."

While on my feet and legs I'd better tell you something of my toes, of which I have four, besides the spur, this last-named weapon being mercifully denied to the females of our family. My first toe grows out in a seemingly awkward way behind the spread of my foot; but it is really a convenience when I want to clutch anything, as, for instance, the branch of the tree where



I generally roost. This toe is two-jointed and called the hallux. The second toe, the inner front one, is three-jointed; the third or middle one has four Joints, and the fourth or outer one has five joints.

Now, when you prepare me for the oven don't throw away my lower legs and feet, but clean them thoroughly with a brush and warm water, to which you have added a pinch of soda. Lay in cold water after a generous rinsing, and when you start the fire to roast my carcass put my legs (the tarsus only) and feet into a basin, cover with cold water and let them sit where they will simmer until the roast is done-when you have a foundation or stock for the most delicious broth. I could tell you how the chicken soup trade began in Washington Market with a poor woman who utilized what the marketmen threw away, only to buy back from her in the form of a bowl of steaming hot soup, for which they each paid her a dime-and she became rich from this humble beginning.

My "giblets," too (heart, liver and gizzard), are used by the thrifty housewife, who chops them fine after cooking them in the dripping pan with the "bird," and then adds them to the already rich gravy for "home consumption."

My gizzard is a sort of mill where my food is crushed, being the second or true stomach, after being softened in the first one, the "crop," in the lower part of the neck.

My wishbone has a longer name, furculum, from the Latin word that means fork. The meaning is obvious.

As to my plumage, first are the "contour feathers." These give outline color and are ornamental appendages. These feathers are moved by muscles which are located under the skin, give me a chance to "spread myself" by brushing the ground with my wings, erecting my body and tail feathers until I seem twice my usual size while strutting about and uttering my "gobble." That word, by the way, is Old English.

The tail feathers, the great quill feathers of the wings, are the remiges, or oarsmen, of our tribe. They do the heavy pulling in flight, as the oar does in rowing. These form the spread of the wing and are stiff, strong and "pennaceous," pen-like. My tail feathers and upper-tail coverts are tipped with a beautiful chestnut brown or bronze in my wild state, and with white in my tame state.

Let me tell you a bit of my history. Domestication has diminished my size and strength, dulled my plumage and improved my temper.

In the savage life of the forest I am likely to attack my own children (poults they are called) and be in return attacked and beaten off by my wife in their defense. Then I "get mad," and hunt up other maltreated turkey husbands whose hens will not let them run the house. We go away in groups of a dozen to a hundred, and we do the tramp act to perfection, until mating time arrives, when we generally get into a pretty fierce fight, a "free-for-all."

We were introduced into Europe early in the sixteenth century, and in many places have become "naturalized," The wild members of our tribe are disappearing before the onward march of civilization, but we domestic turkeys are increasingly appreciated and are

that if the "turkey" money were applied to the national debt it would be wiped out in less than ten years. Turkey eggs are from nine to fifteen at a "clutch"—the next complement sometimes reaching twenty. They are highly prized for eating by some, and

are large, with white shells "freckled" with brown, Our young turkeys are delicate, needing careful watching for a few weeks, as the hen turkey is likely to take them off on long tramps in wet grass during the early morning, and they are not often able to endure this heroic treatment. We turkeys feed on grass, grains, fruits, vegetables, insects and even "gobble" young frogs and lizards, picking up a living almost anywhere,

CELEBRATION KNOWN TO ALL


Every Nation and Race Has Had Some Form of Thanksgiving for a Bountiful Harvest.

Thanksgiving day to made up from parts of celebrations of that day by other peoples. The time is taken from one, the feast from another, and the gathering together of the people from still another. Long before the white race came to this country the Indians held a festal day during this season of the year. They had a great feast of roasted deer and bear, boiled corn and stewed pumfikin, and the women and the warriors partook of it on equality. The feast was kept up far into the night, and was followed by a dance of the braves, keeping time to the songs sung by the dusky maids of the

Thanksgiving also owes something to the religious rites of ancient nations. The oldest of these is the Jewish feast of the tabernacles, with its magnificent festivities. The festival occurred annually, at the end of the harvest season, and continued for eight days. Sometimes it was held as early as the 25th of September, but never later than the 20th of October. It was the feast of the "ingathering" of the harvest of all the fruits, the corn, the wine, and the oil. The labors of the field were then over for the year, and the feast was an occasion of joyousness and gladness to the people. At this season the nation assembled in Jerusalem, where they lived in booths for seven days. Impressive ceremonies and processions took place each day, and at night the court of the temple was illuminated by lamps and flambeaux. At the end of seven days' joy the booths were dismantled and the people celebrated an eighth day of selemn rest.

The glory of the great Hebrew festival has long since passed away, but the fundamental principle—that every one should rejoice in the fruits of the harvest, together with the whole people of the land "before the Lord"has entered into the harvest observ ances of Christian lands.

THE ROMANCE OF WORDS

"DOLLAR."

WHILE the United States was the first to coin the plece of money known as the "dollar," the word Itself was coined long before, as evidenced by the fact that Shakespeare uses it frequently. In "Macbeth," for example, appears the

"Nor would we deign him burlal of his men Till he disbursed, at St. Colme's Inch. Ten thousand dollars to our gen-

This quotation, which sounds suspiciously like a. modern "strike order," proves that Shakespeare was familiar with the dollar, despite the fact that there were no coins of that name known prior to July 5, 1785, when the United States congress passed the resolution referring to the first money put out by the new government. Where, then, dld Shakespeare get the

The answer lies in the fact that "dollar" is an Anglo-Saxon corruption of the German "thaler," first coined about 1486 in the valley (or thaler) of Joachimsthal. The coin met with popular favor and, during the reign of Charles V, emperor of Germany, king of Spain-and lord of Spanish-America, it became the standard currency of the world. Shakespeare merely adopted a slight change of the name, thus antedating both the United States and Great Britain -for the first and only English dollar was coined at the Bank of England in 1804. (Copyright.)



Occasional new cases of plague in these cities shows the menace still to be present and in danger of being carried to inland towns. Rats perpetuate and transmit the desease trichinosis, so much dreaded by humans. They gnaw into boxes of dry goods and cut furs, silks, carpets, and leather goods. They gnaw matches and cut the in culation from electric wires, and so start many costly fires. They flood kitchens by gnawing through lead pipes, and cause disastrous floods by burrowing through embankments and levees. They consume grain, fruit and vegetables in the fields or orchards and continue their depredations in the shock, cellar and bir. They cut containers of flour and brtakfast foods and by pollution render unfit for food far more than they consume. The O. S. Public Health Service declares that in cities the rat population is at least equal to he human population and that in agricultural sections, it is from four to ten times as great. The annual upkeep per rat, estimated on pre-war values, was \$2.00 so that at present prices the annual cost of keeping a rat is at least \$4.00. Using these figures as a basis, R. R. Reppert, Entomologist Extension Service A. & M. College of Texas, estimates that this means that Texas rat population is at least 18,000,000 and that their annual cost is \$72,000,000. This is exclusive of fire loss and other damage due to them.

With such facts staring us in the face, the Extension Service A. & M. College of Texas feels that strenuous efforts should be made to encourage rat extermination compaigns and is prepared to render some valuable cooperative effort and assistance.
