JUDGE D. WALKER ACCEPTS POSITION WITH C. OF C.

The directors of the Chamber of Commerce at a meeting, Monday morning unanimously elected Judge D. Walker secretary to succeed Milton H. McConnell, who recently resigned to accept a position in Dallas.

Judge Walker moved here last April from Gilmer where he had lived for forty years. He was a successful teacher in the public schools for several years. He served the county as clerk for some time and was then elected County Judge and while in this office was the leading spirit in putting over a million dollar bond issue for his county. Some of our citizens have visited in that section this summer and are loud in their praise of the good roads in Upsher county that Mr. Walker assisted in a large way to build.

Before moving to Graham Mr. Walker visited many places looking for a western home. Several of the places were visited more than once but Graham appealed to him as the city with the brightest future. After carefully weighing the merits of many of the progressive cities he decided to cast his lot in Graham. He did not come to camp with us but bought a choice lot in one of the best sections of the city and built a large substantial two-story residence which is a credit to our fast growing city.

The directors feel that they were fortunate in securing Mr. Walker for this responsible position. He assumed the duties of his office immediately after his election and has been very busy all the week. On the day of his election he planned successfully for the excursion to Breckenridge Tuesday, and yesterday with other members of the Chamber of Commerce visited the Bunger field with the Star-Telegram oil editor, George R. Kelley. Mr. Walker stated that Mr. Kelley was especially pleased with the outlook in the Bunger section.

Mr. Walker is a Graham booster and we may expect great things to happen while he is secretary. He is already a Graham favorite. He came here to live and has taken a deep interest in all things pertaining to the progress of the city and the citizens. Let everybody join hands with him and the Chamber of Commerce and watch Graham grow. The population has almost doubled during the past twelve months and there is no reason why it should not double its present population during the next year.

POSTMASTER FOR GRAHAM WILL BE SELECTED, OCT. 14

The United States Civil Service Commission, at the request of the Postmaster General, announces a competitive examination for postmaster in Graham, October 14, 1921.

This examination is held under the President's Order of May 10, 1921, and not under the civil service act and rules.

Competitors will not be required to report for examination at any place, but will be rated upon their education and training, business experience and fitness.

Applications should be made to the secretary of the board of civil examiners at the post office here, or to the United States Civil Service Commission, Washington, D. C., for application Form 2241, and Form 2213 containing definite information in regard to the examination.

Application must be properly executed on Form 2241, and filed with the Civil Service Commission, Washington D. C., prior to the hour of closing business on October 14, 1921.

Large Crowd Joins Breck. Celebration

The Wichita Falls and Southern R. R. ran its fourth excursion Tuesday, celebrating the completion of its new road to the different places on the road. The first celebration, and we believe the greatest, was at Graham in April when the road was completed to this place. Next South Bend, then Ellisville and this week Breckenridge celebrated the completion of the road to that point.

The excursion started at Wichita Falls and at every place along the route the numbers were increased until there was a long train when it reached Breckenridge. When the train pulled into Graham there were eleven coaches including the baggage. Between 50 and 100 tickets were sold at Graham.

CHAMBER COMMERCE ISSUES BULLETIN GIVING ACTIVITIES

The Chamber of Commerce is mailing to its members a bulletin which shows that it has not been sound asleep as some had thought. The bulletin, which we give below, shows that some worth while things have been accomplished during the summer months when business conditions are not always at a high tide.

Large numbers of our people, returning from their summer vacations, have stated that Graham is the liveliest place to be found. The large number of buildings going up here now and many other proposed buildings show much activity in Graham.

The bulletin from the Chamber of Commerce follows:

"Perhaps you have wondered what your Chamber of Commerce has been doing the past few months. Notwithstanding these are times when money is scarce (and it takes money to accomplish things) we have gone steadily ahead.

"Visited our sister city, Ellisville, with the Odd Fellows band and celebrated with them the arrival of the first train.

"After a successful fight, retained a supervisor in Graham of the Oil and Gas Commission.

"Raised \$15,000 so as to insure gas for Graham.

"Raised \$6,000 in order that we may have proper fire fighting apparatus.

"The Rock Island desired to take off the Sunday Oil Special September 4, and would have done so had not our directors protested.

"Co-operating with the county we have employed Joel Edens at a salary of \$150 a month to keep the road to Bunger in repair.

"On September 24 our county farm boys will meet in Graham. Around 300 will be here. We are co-operating with County Agent Edgar Kemp and will give the boys a feed that date, besides giving the boy that makes the highest grade in agriculture a free trip to the Dallas Fair.

"As to publicity, no field has been played up more than Bunger and we lose no opportunity in letting the world know about Young county.

"We hope to announce in our next bulletin the securing of a brick plant."

F. F. F. HIGHWAY ASSOCIATION HAS GREAT MEETING

The F. F. F. Highway is a proposed highway from Fort Worth to New Mexico. It runs through Mineral Wells, Graham, Olney and many other western cities to New Mexico. The F. F. F. Highway Association closed an enthusiastic session of the association at Floydada last Friday. President Ford Shook of Fort Worth presided at the several meetings. During the session Thursday afternoon, reports were received from various delegates along the route, concerning the condition of the highway.

It was generally agreed that the F. F. F. Highway is one of the best in the State and that it is destined to be the most popular. Committees were appointed to look after finances, road marking, road improving and resolutions.

At 8 o'clock the delegates were tendered a banquet by the Mothers' Club of the city, with 180 visitors participating. The banquet was given in the basement of the Methodist church at Floydada and proved to be one of the most enjoyable events during the convention.

A number of the most prominent road men and newspaper men in the State addressed the banqueters and two hours were spent in a most pleasing manner. Ford Shook of Fort Worth, D. W. Jones of Clovis, N. M., R. J. Tauper of Los Vegas, and Curtis Hancock all made enthusiastic talks.

Friday the body settled down to business. As a result of this meeting funds were arranged to carry on the work of the association, it being agreed that \$4 per mile would be used during the coming year to mark and log the road. A fund of \$25 per county was set aside for publicity work, which is to begin at once.

The next business session of the association will be held at Crowell, Texas, on the third Monday and Tuesday in April, or just before the opening of the summer tourist season.

Notwithstanding the fact that there are several highways leading from various points in Texas to the mountains of New Mexico, delegates pointed out that because of its location the F. F. F. Highway will be the most popular in the future. As a matter of fact, the road leads almost directly west from Fort Worth, Mineral Wells, Graham and on to Las Vegas and the meeting will take the form of a jollification or outing.

In order that the work may go on speedily it was decided to divide the highway into three sections, namely, the New Mexico, the Panhandle and Eastern sections. District officers will have charge of the various divisions and special meetings will be held during October.

The Knights of Pythias lodge in Graham has been having fine meetings recently. J. H. McBride of Abilene has been in the city several days and has created much interest and enthusiasm in the local lodge.

The Bunger field continues to attract the attention of operators from all sections of the country. The Bunger and the Mexia fields came in about the same time and these two places are now before the country as no other places. Shallow production is the watchword among producers in North Central Texas and that is the reason for the rapid growth of the Bunger field.

During the past week operations have gone forward at a rapid rate. Three weeks ago there were less than ten derricks in the field, now there are more than twenty and before the year closes there will be more than fifty as this is the coming field in North Central Texas. It will soon rival the famous South Bend field only a few miles west.

The several distinct shallow sands in Young county from which producers have been obtained assures the long life of fields in this county. The three producers in the Bunger field are from the 1900-foot sand. These wells are producing from 100 to 300 barrels and have been drilled only a few feet in the sand. Ross & Tyrrel-Owen No. 1 came in at 220 barrels and is holding up well.

Ross & Tyrrel-Owen No. 1B is drilling around 700 feet.

Ross & Tyrrel-Grimshaw No. 1, rigging up.

Ross & Tyrrel-Grimshaw No. 1B, derrick.

Ross & Tyrrel-A. L. Lynn No. 1, rigging up.

Ross & Tyrrel-Askew No. 1, drilling around 250 feet.

Hedrick & Spoons-Driver No. 1, producing 200 barrels daily.

Hedrick & Spoons-Driver No. 2, rig.

Hedrick & Spoons-Driver No. 3, location.

The Union Oil Company-Askew No. 1 has been tubed and is producing about 100 barrels.

The Union Oil Company-State No. 1 is still fishing at 2475 feet. The superintendent of operations of this field has recommended several new locations and it will be only a short time until this company will probably be drilling on several of its close in pieces of acreage.

Cheney & Miller are spudding in their Grimshaw No. 1, offsetting Ross & Tyrrel's Owen No. 1B.

Cheney & Miller have made a location for their Grimshaw No. 2 offsetting the Driver producer.

The Barnes Production Company has shut down at 1935 feet for lack of water. Plans are being made to secure water at once so that the well can be brought in as early as possible.

Jackson & Cathcart-Lisle No. 1, drilling at 2840.

Paragon Oil Syndicate-Vick No. 1, underreaming to shut off water and test over 100 feet of sand tapped at 2122 feet. Oil is showing in sufficient quantities to make this well look like a real producer. The thickness of this sand looks good for the Bunger field.

Browning & Hodges are spudding their Durham No. 1 today.

The Godley Oil and Gas Company has rig up and will drill soon.

The Simms Oil Company will spud in immediately.

The Gulf Production Company has rig material on ground for Grimshaw No. 1 on northwest corner of southwest 60 acres of survey No. 39.

Sun Company has rig material on ground on Auburg survey for their Driver No. 1.

Burton & Florrie are moving rig to location on northeast corner of the north 80 acres of section 36 on Whittenburg land.

Applegate & Harlan are spudding in their Whittenburg No. 1 on the Taylor survey.

The Mercier-Casey-Jeffery No. 1, three and one-half miles north of Graham, is on the top of the sand. We hope to be able to give good news on this well soon.

The Farmer well, east of Graham, is drilling but we were unable to get the depth.

Miss Louise Graham left Sunday for Lynchburg, Virginia, to re-enter Randolph-Macon College.

FRANCE'S HEROIC DEAD.

The population of France on March 1, 1921, has just been made public, and it is shown that there are 2,500,000 less people in that country now than there were when the war started.

But when the war started, and for years before, France had lived in daily dread of Germany. Now France is free.

And every one of the missing two millions and more would regard the result as worth the cost.

Price Beach was appointed custodian of the court house and grounds some time ago. He has taken pride in his work and has kept the building and grounds in good condition. It has been so dry that the grass has not kept green but the flower beds are beautiful. The bed near the north entrance of the yard is exceptionally beautiful. The grass has been mowed regularly and the entire premises has at all times presented a pleasing appearance.

After November 19th it will not be unlawful in Texas to purchase liquor, and the purchaser will be a competent witness against the seller. This will be an ail to the enforcement of the prohibition law. Under the law as it is the buyer is equally guilty with the seller, and the testimony of the man who buys from a bootlegger is not sufficient to convict the seller. The man who buys may still be prosecuted for having liquor in his possession. The officers will have an easier time securing conviction under the law as amended.

The world's largest ship, the *Ma-jestic*, is soon to be placed in service on the New York-Southampton-Cherbourg line. It is now being completed at Hamburg and was to have been called the *Bismarck* by her original German owners. The giant craft is 2,000 tons larger than the *Leviathan*, will carry a crew of 1,100 and have passenger accommodations for 4,100. The ship's agents estimate that the space occupied by the 1,245 state rooms, engine and machinery equals that of about 800 average four-room apartments.

Labor Day there were many speeches made on Labor. Many of them were made by good men. Practically all of them whose remarks have been recorded, stress the truth that must be a "square deal" for both Labor and capital. But the square deal must extend further. Capital must have a square deal, organized labor must have a square deal, unorganized labor must have a square deal; and the general public must have a square deal. Until all the elements are treated with justice and with due consideration to their rights and needs, there can be no square deal. A deal that considers the interests of only a part of these classes can not be a square deal, but is a partial, and therefore an unfair, deal. It is hard for any of us to realize that there has not been a fair deal as long as it has been fair to us.—Bonham Favorite.

The bishop of London, at the age of 87, attributes his long life to the fact that he has always been a total abstainer, while out in Kentucky Elijah Brown, at the age of 91, says he has taken a drink every day since his teens. And there you are.

GO-TO-SCHOOL DRIVES.

For the first time in the history of the State many independent school districts, as well as country schools, are making an active campaign to induce all parents to see that their children attend school.

This comes about by reason of a change in the school laws. Hereafter the apportionment will be made on the basis of the actual attendance of pupils. If a district now has an enrollment of 200 and an attendance of only 150, it will receive from the State the apportionment for only the 150. This change was made in the law because it was discovered that some communities with large enrollments showed a very poor attendance. Therefore those with a large enrollment and small attendance get very much more free school money than they were really entitled to, while others get less than they were entitled to in proportion to the number of pupils actually taught.

The change is a proper one and just, and will enable all schools to get just what they are entitled to, no more and no less. It will have the further effect of very greatly increasing the interest of school boards, teachers and superintendents in the matter of seeing that all pupils who should attend school are actually there. It will do more even than the compulsory school law to awaken a keen interest in the welfare of the children.

It has been the history of the Graham schools for the attendance to surpass the scholastic enrollment but everybody should co-operate with the school authorities this year to see that every child is enrolled this term. As explained above the apportionment will be made on the basis of attendance. Let every parent and guardian see that their children are enrolled in school.

"SAFETY FIRST."

Since school is again in session the graveled street by the school building should no longer be used as a race course for automobiles. Complaints are being heard from various sources of the reckless driving by the building while children are on their way to and from school. More than one thousand children find their way to the school each day. Several hundred of these meeting on the streets each morning and at noon literally fill the streets near the school building. They become interested in various things and are wholly oblivious to the noise of cars.

Only two years ago a fine young lady was run down and killed in front of the school building and every year one or more children are run over by cars near the building. As far as possible cars should avoid driving on the street near the building while the children are assembling in the morning and at noon and while returning from school at noon and at 4 o'clock in the afternoon. If it is necessary to pass by the building, the driver should drive very carefully and slowly. Better be safe than be in a hurry.

Just a few days ago a bunch of cotton pickers walked out of a Cottle County field because they could not get more than one dollar per hundred for gathering the fleecy staple. Some of these people we know had been idle most of the year, howling for work and "cussing" the government because they could find nothing to do. When the time came for them to work, and there is plenty of it on every hand, they "strike" for higher wages. Such people have no sympathy coming. They are of the class who want something for nothing. They want the world to furnish them a living without giving the world anything in return. The working season will be over in a few months. Such people will go into winter quarters without money enough to buy a ton of coal, and then howl all winter because there is no work to do.—Paducah Post.

On last Thursday morning after a short visit in Graham, wife and I started for our home at Loving, via Indian Mound. We intended and did take dinner with Bro. B. W. Drum and wife, but before arriving at their nice home we met with a bad accident. An old rotten culvert with many holes in it stretches across the county road just south of Gentry Williamson's and our high spirited horse that we were driving became frightened and jumped across the bridge, breaking both tugs, one hip strap, jerking me out. I fell on my right hip and elbow, still holding to the lines. The horse drug me several feet before I could stop it, so my wife could get out. My injury was bad and painful. We patched up the harness with wire and started on again, but in about one and one-half miles came to another culvert fully as bad. I got out to lead over this one and received the end of the shaft in the small of my back. This hurt me again, but we finally arrived at Bro. Drum's where I received medical attention. In the evening we made it on home, but for several days I was confined to my bed. And why? Because of the carelessness of some road overseer. Now, this word of warning. Be sure and repair your culverts soon and cause you trouble, for you are surely responsible for the condition of your roads. Just a few minutes work may save some man's life.

And now I want to say a few words about my good old friends, Bro. Drum and wife. It was a pleasure to me and wife to be in that nice home. We were friends 28 years ago when we lived at Farmer. At that time Farmer was a good little town, about the best in the county save Graham. We had a good live Baptist church. Bro. Drum and I were its deacons, and we've worked together many times and with perfect harmony. Later Bro. Drum moved to his present home at Indian Mound and I moved to Hawkins Chapel, now Pleasant View.

So taking it all in all, wife and I had a good day, if I did get crippled. I am now convalescing and think I shall be able to attend our Association as its clerk, hoping my crippled arm may be well by then.

Now, let us as people of Young county, get busy and build up our public roads, so that we may travel without endangering our lives or the lives of our families. People who go off on visits or on business on returning say they found the worst roads in Young county. Now let's lay down our pessimism, our mean, low, cursed stinginess and vote a good road tax, and build roads that we may be proud of. And that will help build up our country and be the means of a good desirable citizenship settling with us, for they will go elsewhere if we don't. I could say more on this, but this is getting rather long and will close by wishing and hoping for a better future.

NOT MANY HERE WHO SAW OLD DAM BUILT FORTY-THREE YEARS AGO

When W. A. Andrews and a force of workmen dammed off the water in the Clear Fork and went to work re-inforcing and raising the old mill dam a period of exactly 43 years had elapsed since anyone had ever seen the bottom of the dam.

In Eliasville today are only a few men who were here in 1878 when the two Donnell brothers, pioneers, stretched that dam across the river. W. T. Donnell was only ten years of age then, but he watched the men as they heaped wagon loads of rock into the river. S. H. and G. W. Hill are two others that were here then, and C. D.

(Doc) Yancey hauled rock for the work. Sam Roach and Henry DeLong were here, too.

Only a short time had elapsed when high water came, and the Donnell brothers saw their work ruined. Most of the mill was destroyed. It took all the money they had to build the project originally, and how they put it back better than it was before is a problem even to their children today. But they managed it somehow, and the old mill stands today as one of the most picturesque scenes in Texas today.

STATE TAXES NOT TO BE INCREASED.

Wichita Falls, Sept. 19.—Tentative be no increase in any State taxes this year, the Automatic Tax Board announced today after it had learned from the Secretary of State's office that the amendment increasing the Confederate pension tax from 5c to 7c had been defeated. The total State tax will remain at 62c—22c ad valorem, 35c school tax and 5c for pensions.

The board had previously fixed the pension tax at 7c, working under the impression that the amendment had carried. Today, however, an official canvass was ordered and it was found that the amendment had lost by a 1,716 majority. The board immediately changed the rate so as to conform to the present constitutional limit of 5c on the \$100 valuation.

METHODIST MISSIONARY NOTES

Mr. Editor:
Thinking your Methodist readers might be interested in the doings of our Central Texas Missionary Societies, I am sending a few clippings from the report of their recent conference held in Cleburne, Texas, from the President's message:

"The world goes where it is led. The whole destiny of any people depends on the quality of its leadership. The hope of the nation is a well trained youth. 'Train up a child in the way he should go and when he is old he will not depart from it.' We must save the children of America.

"There are 27,000,000 protestant children and young people in America who receive no religious training of any kind. In 1916 there were 21,888,521 children in the Sunday School of the nation, but in 1920 the numbers had shrunk to 15,617,000. Three out of every five Protestant children receive no religious instruction whatever.

"The Jews are taught one hour each day, the Catholics four hours a week, and the Protestants but one-half hour a week. In the 16 states served in a large way by the M. E. church, South, there are 14,251,813 children growing up without the slightest religious influence. The childhood of our nation, in large numbers are learning nothing about God, about religion, or Christian ideals. 'We are threatened with a moral bankruptcy and how long can a nation call itself Christian when it permits such a situation to prevail, yes, how long can the nation itself stand? We need mothers—consecrated mothers to help correct this situation. Women get hold somewhere and help in this great battle. We must not build on the surface any more. We must build on the Rock of Ages, build on the secure foundation. We are not going to save the world by the evangelistic plan alone. The task is to make religion more educational and education more religious.' Christian character is not an event but a long process of Christian training. We must pay any sort of price to train

up this generation. Now is the time, even five or ten years may be too late. The youth of the world saved the world yesterday. Have we allowed them to come home with flaming indignation and with broken ideals because we did not keep faith with them? It is our business to help the fellow that is down, but our big business is to save those who are falling. Dr. Henry Snyder said: 'What the South is tomorrow is largely what two churches are going to make it.' Others not so numerous. There are now more 3,000,000 Baptists. A Baptist preacher quoted as saying there are 5,000,000. Dr. Snyder said he thought there were 10,000,000 of them for they are so busy and he was judging from the noise they were making. We are praying for the 2 1-4 million Southern Methodists to get so busy we will seem like 20,000,000. Let's get the vision of the world whole today and our relation to it. Our slogan: Cooperation and Preparation. There are 1,200,000,000 non-Christians in the world—you are a shorer of this task. There are thousands and thousands who have never heard the name of Jesus. God has chosen the United States as a recruiting station and training post in this great campaign to win the whole, round world. The way is all open to us. Nothing between us and Mexico, but the Rio Grande and it is dry most of the time. Think of the wonderful work in the opening of the Panama Canal. We stand face to face with Asia and Africa. It is ours to help bind up broken-hearted Europe. We thank God for Blanch Holland, who works for us today in Belgium. 'We are a wonderful people, crossed up of English, French, Scots, Irish, Germans, Scandinavians, etc. God has made a new race of us.' He raised up this energetic restless race to help bring the whole world to Christ. MRS. J. H. STEWART, Pres."

ORDINANCE NO.—

An Ordinance Regulating the Laying and Installation of Gas Pipes, Fittings and Appliances in the City of Graham; Requiring a License to Engage in the Business of Laying and Installing Gas Pipes and Fittings and Appliances in the City of Graham and Prescribing a Fee Therefor; Providing for Inspection by the City of Graham of all Gas Pipes and Fittings and Requiring a Certificate of such Inspection to be Obtained and Fixing the Fee Therefor; and Providing Penalties for any Violation Hereof: Be it Ordained by the Board of Aldermen of the City of Graham, Texas:

Section 1. Gasfitting. Certificate, Journeyman Defined.—It shall be unlawful for any person, firm or corporation to work at the business of gasfitting in the City of Graham, either as employer or journeyman, unless such person or some member of such firm or the manager of such corporation has received a certificate therefor required by the provisions of this Ordinance. The word "journeyman," as used in this Ordinance, shall be deemed to mean one who personally does any gasfitting, or any work in connection therewith, which would be subject to inspection under the provision of this Ordinance.

Section 2. Application and Examination Required.—Every person, firm or corporation desiring to work at the business of gasfitting in the City of Graham, shall make application to the Inspector of Plumbing for examination therefor; provided, however, that in case of a firm or corporation, only one member of the firm or the manager of the corporation shall be required to take such examination; and every person, firm or corporation desiring to work at the business of gasfitting in the City of Graham shall have an established place of business.

Section 3. Examination, Certificate, Fees, Power of Inspector.—Said Inspector of Plumbing shall examine all applicants desiring to work at the business of gasfitting in the City of Graham as to their particular knowledge of gasfitting. Such Inspector shall submit the applicants to some satisfactory form of practical test, and, if satisfied as to the competence of said applicant to work at the business of gasfitting, shall thereupon issue a certificate to each

such applicant authorizing him to work at the business of gasfitting in such City. The fee for the certificate of any employing gasfitter shall be Three Dollars (\$3.00), and for a journeyman gasfitter it shall be Two Dollars (\$2.00). Such certificate shall continue in force one (1) year, but shall not be transferrable. All fees received from said certificates shall be paid into the treasury of the City of Graham. Said Inspector of Plumbing shall have the power and is directed to suspend, for a definite time, or cancel at the discretion of the said Inspector, any certificate or authority granted thereunder, if after notice and opportunity to be heard, the party named therein is found guilty by said Inspector of Plumbing of violating the terms and conditions of this Ordinance or the rules and regulations established by the Board of Aldermen under the authority of the charter or Ordinances of the City of Graham; provided, however, that no person holding a certificate as a journeyman or master plumber from the Inspector of Plumbing of the City of Graham shall be required to take the examination for gasfitting herein provided; but such plumbing certificate shall be accepted by such Inspector in lieu of the gasfitting certificate required by the provisions of this Ordinance.

Section 4. Inspector of Plumbing Duty.—The Inspector of Plumbing, or his duly authorized deputies, shall inspect all the new work or altering work relating to gasfitting in new or old buildings, the connections and use of such work, and shall report all violations of this Ordinance to the proper officers and shall also perform such other appropriate duties as may be required by the Board of Aldermen.

Section 5. That hereafter all pipes placed for the conveyance of natural gas in any house, residence, building or structure in the City of Graham shall be of the following dimensions:

For Houses Five Rooms or Less:

Main line to meter, 1 1-4 inch. Meter to small boiler or furnace, not less than 1 1-4 inch. Meter to first opening, three fires or less, 1 inch. Meter to first opening, more than three fires, 1 1-4 inch. Second to third opening, 1 inch. Third to fourth opening, 3-4 inch.

For Houses Over Five Rooms With Ten Fires or Less:

For more than ten fires or houses larger than ten rooms, the Inspector of Plumbing shall prescribe the necessary sizes and lengths. For houses of from five to ten rooms, the pipe from the main line to meter shall be 1 1-2 inch.

Section 6. All gas fittings used in such houses, building or structure, shall be of safe design; all pipes shall be wrought iron and all fittings malleable iron, brass or bronze and shall be free from all defects, and shall be installed without the use of lead pipe, calking tool, or rubber hose connections of any kind. Every connection of pipe and fittings shall be made by the joining of thread of iron pipe, or iron, brass or bronze fittings. No shoddy or defective pipe or fittings shall be used, and no paint, cement, preparation or dope of any kind shall be used on said pipe or fittings to close cracks, openings or defects, except that pure white lead shall be used on the threads of every joint connected.

Section 7. Every piece of pipe, fitting or fixture hereafter installed in the City of Graham shall be approved and inspected by the Inspector of Plumbing before any gas shall be turned into the same and the said Inspector shall test the line and fittings by means of a low pressure spring gauge or steam mercury gauge at a pressure of ten pounds to the square inch for fifteen minutes. No gas shall be turned into the line or fittings, either by the gas company, or the fitter or the consumer, until the same has been so tested and approved by the Inspector of Plumbing.

Section 8. Whenever any alterations or repairs are made in any line of gas pipe, leading from service box to any house, residence or struc-

ture, or any fitting therein, except setting stoves or lights and necessary fittings, the gas shall be turned off, and shall not be again turned on until inspected and approved, as provided in the preceding section.

Section 9. It shall be unlawful for any one not having a permit or license from the Inspector of Plumbing to turn gas on or off at the street box or to interfere in any way with said street box.

Section 10. Any violation of the provisions of any section of this Ordinance shall constitute a misdemeanor, and any person guilty of such violation shall be punished by a fine of not less than Ten Dollars (\$10.00) or more than Two Hundred Dollars (\$200.00).

Section 11. Inspector's fees shall be charged by the Inspector of Plumbing, as follows:
Five openings or less, \$1.50.
All additional openings, 10c each.
All re-inspections, after failure to stand test, same as above.

Inspector's fees to be paid by party securing permit.

Section 12. The finding or holding of any section or clause of this Ordinance unconstitutional or void shall not affect or render invalid the remaining sections or clauses hereof.

This Ordinance shall take effect from and after its passage and publication as the law directs.

Man Who Robbed Graham Bank Kills Arkansas Trusty

Tom Slaughter, who killed a trusty at Little Rock Sunday, is one of the bandits who robbed the Guaranty State Bank at Graham over a year ago and stole about \$4,000. Another of his band, Chas. Mimms, captured two weeks later when he held up the Oklahoma Cabaret in broad open daylight in Ranger. Little Rock, Sept. 19.—Tom Slaughter, notorious Oklahoma bank bandit, yesterday added another gory chapter to his long list of crimes when, in a sensational attempt to escape from the Arkansas penal farm, he killed one man and perhaps fatally wounded two others, all "trusty" guards, with a rifle smuggled to him. Bliss Adkisson, a draft resister serving eighteen years for murder committed when a posse tried to capture him and other resisters in the mountains of Cleburne county, was killed. Jim Morris and Dewitt Taylor, the other guards, were shot through the body and are not expected to live. Liburn Taylor, a convict, was wounded in the right leg by a guard. Slaughter was brought from Tucker, where the farm is located to the penitentiary here and is being held in solitary confinement. Preparations are being made to try him for murder in Jefferson county, it was stated.

Slaughter who, with Fulton Green, was convicted of the murder of Deputy Sheriff Row Brown of Hot Springs, about a year, was wanted in Oklahoma, Texas, Missouri, Kentucky and Pennsylvania, according to officers for bank robberies and murder. He had escaped from the Texas penitentiary just prior to the Hot Springs shooting after striking a fellow convict over the head with a shovel and seriously wounding him. Slaughter and Green were captured at Independence, Kan. Only the loyalty of the small band of trusty guards is said to have prevented the escape of 200 or more convicts. According to prisoners, Slaughter's plan for escape provided for other convicts to rush the guards as he shot them down, obtain their guns and join him in the fight.

600,000 WAR VETS ARE OUT OF WORK LEGION REPORTS

Washington, Sept. 20.—Asserting that there are from 600,000 to 700,000 veterans of the World War out of work, the American Legion, through its national legislative committee, has issued an appeal to employers throughout the country "to loosen their purse strings, lengthen their vision and make jobs for the men who kept American business safe from a German indemnity."

The Legion's appeal says that careful studies made by the organization in sixteen States indicate that there are 150,000 veterans out of employment in Pennsylvania, 100,000 in New York, 35,000 in Illinois, 30,000 in Massachusetts, 10,000 in Minnesota, 7,500 in Washington, 2,000 in Arizona and from 5,000 to 20,000 in all of the remaining States under survey.

It says that in a number of States veterans' relief laws, originally enacted to help needy Civil War veterans and amended to apply to World War veterans, are enabling unemployed ex-service men to obtain the bare necessities of life; that in States which have no such legislation American Legion posts are stripping their treasuries to keep "bread in the mouths and clothes on the backs of needy comrades." Continuing, the statement says:

"Today, more American veterans than fought at St. Mihiel, more American veterans than composed the first Army, compose America's army of the unemployed. Six hundred thousand jobless veterans are walking the streets of our towns and cities, wondering where the next meal is to come from."

"The American Legion believes that, had Congress passed the adjusted compensation bill, the present serious condition would never have come about; at least not for the veterans of the war. And it likewise believes that, should Congress, immediately upon reconvening, pass the relief bill, the condition would be greatly alleviated."

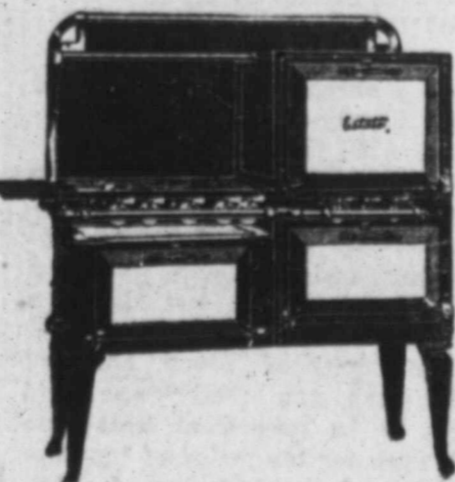
