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Better School Buildings.

The school buildings of Young county have been improved materially during the past five years. They will probably compare favorably with those of other counties, but outside of cities and towns few communities have yet realized the importance of modern schoolhouses and attractive school grounds. Sufficient attention has not been given to the selection of the site for the schoolbuilding. The purchase of a desirable site should be included as a legitimate and essential part of of the bond issue.
