EIGHTH. That said election was fraudulently and illegally conducted in that W. Slater, presiding judge of the election in Voting Precinct No. 17, known as Red Top box in said County, was a school trustee in and for School District No. 37, Young County, Texas, same being an office of trust as contemplated in the meaning of the law, and was thereby disqualified from serving in the capacity of presiding judge

in said election. NINTH. That said election fraudulently and illegally conducted in this, to-wit, that in Voting Precinct No. One, in the town of Graham, Texas, a large number of prominent and influential citizens coerced and intimidated voters by announcing that any person who voted for Newcastle and against the town of Graham in said election would be "boy cotted" and ought to be "tarred and feathered" and run out of Graham. That said persons congregated at or near said Voting Precinct No. One and that if they had reason to believe that the person would vote for the removal of the county seat from Graham, would make remarks calculated to, and which did deter many timid persons from so voting, which votes had they been cast, would have reversed the result of said election; that as a part of the scheme of coercion and intimidation a large number of persons congregated on the first floor of the court house of Young County, Texas, above which on the second floor the election was being held in said Voting Precinct No. One, and forced numbers of voters to run the gauntlet of their remarks and threats, and openly electioneered and canvassed for the town of Graham with each voter as he, would advance to the ballot box; that large numbers of prominent and influential citizens were permitted to congregate in and about the voting box of Precinct No. One, within the one hundred foot limits in open violation of the law, and that the persons intimidated large numbers of the voters and prevented them from voting for the removal of the county seat from Graham, which person and their votes would have materially effected the retion, coercion and intimidation.

That said election was fraudulently and illegally conducted because twelve persons, named in Exhibit D, and being resident citizens of Olney, Texas, and voting in said -box, that they and each of them owed to the City of Olney, Texas, a city poll tax lawfully levied and assessed and not having paid same, said poll tax being due for the year 1912.

SEVENTEENTH. That said election was fraudulently and illegally held because a large number of persons whose names can not be given at this time, voted in Voting Precinct No. 11, known as the Olney box, they having paid a poll tax in the City of Olney, Texas, but not having presented their poll tax receipts to the election officers, their affidayits with reference to said receipts. were not taken, but they were permitted to vote by the election officers in Olney without either producing their receipts or making affidavit that they had lost,

destroyed or misplaced them. EIGHTEENTH. I nav said electron was fraudulently and illegally conducted in that F. M. Burkett, one of the presiding judges of Voting Precinct No. 1, Graham box, whose duty it was to take the affidavits of the voters who had paid their poll tax, but who did not present them when voting at said election, did not discharge his duties with reference thereto, nor comply with the law, but wholly disregardful of his duty, affixed his name as presiding judge to the jurat of a large number of affidavits and distributed said affidavits, signed, to Wright McClatchey and others, who, if the oath was administered at all to said voters, administered the same, although Burkett, in attaching his name to said jurat, certified that he in person took the affidavit of the voter and that they had subscribed to and sworn to said affidavit before him, when as a matter of fact, only-a few, if any, of the affidavits on which voters were allowed to vote in the Graham box, were either subscribed to or sworn to before Burkett, presiding officer of Precinct No. t, Young County, Texas, as shown by his certificate attached to said affidavit; that in this way a large number of voters were permitted to vote who voted against the removal of said county seat from Graham, Texas, said list of voters being hereto attached, marked Exhibit E and made a part hereof.



TWENTIETH. That said election was fraudulently and illegally conducted in that some of the prominent and influential citizens of the town of Graham, in order to influence and bribe voters to vote against the removal of the county seat from Graham, approached voters and distributed sums of money to said voters 2 with instructions to said voters that they go and bet said amount | 2 so advanced by said citizens of 2 Graham, and that whatever was 2 won, if anything, would be div- 2 ided equally between the party 2 advancing the money and said 2 voter making the bet; that this 2 was an intimidating method used 2 by many prominent and influential citizens of Graham for the purpose of bribing voters to vote against the removal of the county seat from Graham to Newcas-

TWENTY-FIRST. That said election was fraudulently and illegally conducted in the City of Graham, which is located in Precinct No. 1, had, prior to Jan. 1, 1912, passed an ordinance levying and assessing a city poll tax on all residents of the City of Graham, Texas; that said ordinance was valid and in full force and effect at the time of said election, and that none of the voters, whose names are hereto attached, marked Exhibit F and made a part hereof, have paid said poll tax for the year 1912, although they were due to the town of Graham poll tax for the year 1912, and 5 were residents of the town of Graham on Jan. 1, 1912.

TWENTY-SECOND. That the following named persons, as shown by Exhibit F, hereto at- 5 all of whom voted in Voting Precinct No. 1, although they were residing in the County of Young and State of Texas, and for the year 1912 were due the State of Texas a poll tax for that year, participated and voted in said election in Voting Precinct No. 1 without having paid said poll tax due for the year 1912.

WHEREFORE, Premises considered, contestants pray for a hearing on the above statements, and upon hearing of the evidence of same, that the fraudulent and illegal votes so cast in said election be eliminated from the count and the true results of said election be declared, and if in the opinion of the Court it shall appear from the evidence that such irregularities exist in bringing about saidelection and in holding the same, and that the true results of said election is impossible to arrive at or doubtful to ascertain, that the Court shall declare said election to be void and shall order the proper officer to order another election to be held, and do such other and further things as is necessary in the premises as provided by law, and for such other and further relief, general and special, in law and equity, as these contestants may be entitled


