## RETARD PROGRESS OF MEXICO

 ers Rafused Estates, which Ow Refuse to Subdivide, Hindrance to Country

It has been said that 400 families in Mexico control the bulk of the land. We know that two, those of Terazzas and Del Rio, own between some $10,000,000$ to $12,000,000$ acres in the states of Chihuahua and Durango. The Terazzas estate is of $7,000,000$ acres. On it a herd of 75,000 cattle is mainfained. Express trains on the Central are hours in crossing it, and several railroad stations are located within its borders. These enormous "haciendas" contribute practically nothing to the support of Mexico, and, because their owners will not subdivide them into workable units, it is difficult to obtain the proper sort of immigration on which Mexico would flourigh agriculturally. It is the idea of the advanced party in Mexico to tax these lands both for the revenue which they ought to be yielding, but, more directly, to impel the "haciendos" to split up their estates. Mexi©p will sever make much of a showing until this ancient form of land ownership is abandoned.-Charles F Speare, in the Review of Reviews.

## HINTS TO HOUSEKEEPERS.

Miss Dorothy Duke Priestman, in her book on household decoration, gives some hints worth remembering. Among them she bints that curtains of one color should not be hung against wall paper of another. Two adjoining walls should be papered alike. or at least there should be so much similarity that the difference will not be noticeable Carpets of opposite colors should not be joined, or a rug should hide the joining. Great care should be exer ised in the selection when more than one oriental rug is to carpet a rooin.
